CAPITOL UPDATE - Sundays at 10:30AM

Capitol Update is a half-hour program that explains the most significant developments in Florida's Legislative, Judicial and Executive branches - in everyday terms. Through in-depth reporting, regularly occurring segments – such as "Budget Watch" and "Bill Track" – and live interviews, Capitol Update provides viewers across the state with a clear, concise and balanced view of state government in action. Please note that the 2015 Legislative Session began on Monday, March 2nd and runs through May 2, 2015. During that time, WFSU will be airing Capitol Update every weeknight at 6pm and 11pm. The Friday/Sunday airing is a recap of the week's events.

4/3 & 4/5/15 - #201525 Capitol Update is a weekly round-up of Florida's Legislative events: The House and Senate appear to be headed for a showdown on the health care budget, with the Senate including funding that would provide coverage to hundreds of thousands of Floridians, and leaders in the House saying they will not approve that plan; The Senate passes a school testing reform bill; The Senate also passes a prison reform bill.

4/10 & 4/12/15 - #201530 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics this week include: Governor Rick Scott sides with House leaders in refusing to support the expansion of health care to 800,000 Floridians; The House passes more than \$690 million in tax cuts that includes a reduction in the taxes Floridians pay for their phone service and cable television; The Senate debates whether to repeal a Florida law that prohibits gay couples from adopting children.

4/17 & 4/19/15 - #201535 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics this week include: Lawmakers say they are still nowhere near solving the health care funding debate that has budget talks at a standstill; A bill lawmakers hope will help more children find forever families heads to the governor; Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission move forward with a plan to allow black bear hunting in Florida.

4/24 & 4/26/15 - #201540 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics this week include: Latest on the healthcare budget debate in the House and Senate, with one week left in session; 93 members of the House support an alimony reform bill; The House gets its first look at a bill that would regulate hydraulic fracturing, also known as fracking.

4/30 & 5/3/15 - #201545 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics this week include: A recap of developments in the last week of regular session in the legislature, including the early sine die by the House and subsequent actions by the Senate; Senate Democrats asked the state Supreme Court for a writ of mandamus to compel the House to return to session; the court refused, but at the same time said the early adjournment by the House appeared to be a violation of Florida's constitution; A look at bills that passed and others that failed before the regular session ended.
