CAPITOL UPDATE – Sundays at 10:30AM

Capitol Update is a half-hour program that explains the most significant developments in Florida's Legislative, Judicial and Executive branches - in everyday terms. Through in-depth reporting, regularly occurring segments – such as “Budget Watch” and “Bill Track” – and live interviews, Capitol Update provides viewers across the state with a clear, concise and balanced view of state government in action. ***Please note that beginning on Monday, March 6, CAPITOL UPDATE will air daily, Monday through Friday at 5:30pm and 11pm for the duration of the Legislative Session. The programs on Fridays will be a recap of the week's activity and also air on Sunday.***

3/31 & 4/2 - #201720 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government action. This week's topics include: The House and Senate revealed their budget proposals for the upcoming fiscal year; A nearly \$300 million tax cut proposal was unveiled in the house; The Constitution Revision Commission held its first meeting in Orlando.

4/7 & 4/9 - #201725 Capitol Update is a weekly review of State government action. This week's topics include: An analysis of the \$4 billion budget gap between House and Senate spending plans; Senate Appropriations Committee approval of a modified plan for water storage south of Lake Okeechobee; A review of House and Senate action on gaming.

4/14 & 4/16 - #201730 Capitol Update is a weekly review of State government action. This week's topics include: The House and Senate passed their respective budgets this week; A review of the debate in the full House before the vote to approve a charter school initiative; A Senate committee approves a bill that would implement the Constitutional Amendment creating property tax breaks for solar equipment.

4/21 & 4/23 - #201735 Capitol Update is a weekly review of State government action. This week's topics include: The full House of Representatives approved a bill that would eliminate Florida's no-fault PIP auto insurance system; Senator Frank Artiles (R-Miami) resigned after apologizing on the Senate floor for directing vulgar, derogatory terms at other Senators at a private Tallahassee club Monday night; The Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission voted 4 to 3 not to authorize bear hunting for the next two years.

4/27 & 4/30 - #201740 Capitol Update is a weekly review of State government action. This week's topics include: The House Speaker and Senate President announce budget allocations – an agreement on the bottom line for the state budget; Senators and Representatives negotiate in conference throughout the week to try to hammer out an agreement on gambling laws; The Senate bill to remove the “alcohol wall” between grocery stores and liquor sales was approved by the full House by a margin of one vote, and heads to the Governor.

CAPITOL UPDATE continued

5/5 & 5/7 - #201745 Capitol Update is a weekly review of State government action. This week's topics include: The House and Senate published a state budget at 2:43 p.m. triggering the 72-hour waiting period required before they can vote; The House and Senate both approved a resolution to place a constitutional amendment on the ballot that would expand the homestead exemption; Both chambers also passed a bill designed to streamline the process for people to object to public school books and other instructional materials.

5/14 - #2010 Capitol Update is a weekly review of State government action. This week's topics include: Team coverage of the end of the 2017 Legislative Session, including final debate and voting on budget bills during the extended session Monday; A look at some of the bills signed by Governor Rick Scott this week, including SB 10, which will create a reservoir south of Lake Okeechobee to reduce runoff east and west; State Forestry firefighters join local agencies trying to get several wildfires across the state under control.

5/21 - #2011 Capitol Update is a weekly review of State government action: This week's topics include: The Florida Supreme Court ruled that most county-level votes to expand slot machines aren't valid under state statutes or the Florida Constitution; Florida's unemployment rate dropped from 4.8% to 4.5%, as the Governor continued to criticize the Legislature for slashing economic incentives for business; The Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission met with reporters around the state, urging everyone to take steps to protect bears and keep them out of neighborhoods, especially during the spring mating season when bears are on the move.

5/28 - #2012 This special edition of Capitol Update reviews legislation signed into law by Governor Rick Scott so far, including: Senate Bill 10, which creates programs and funding to build a reservoir south of Lake Okeechobee to reduce runoff east and west when the lake level gets too high; Legislation establishing statewide regulations for ride-sharing companies like Uber and Lyft; A public records measure designed to make it safer for murder witnesses to come forward and testify.

6/4 - #2013 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: Governor Rick Scott signed the state budget, vetoed billions in spending items, and ordered the Legislature to return in special session to consider changes in education, tourism marketing and economic development spending; State leaders urged Floridians to be prepared for storms as the 2017 Atlantic hurricane season begins; A review of some of the bills signed by the Governor this week.

6/8 & 6/11 - #2014 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: Team coverage of the special session of the Legislature, including final agreement on medical marijuana and spending plans for education, economic development and tourism, and funding to speed up repairs to the dike around Lake Okeechobee; A review of the bill signed by the Governor that sets up a system for distributing Deepwater Horizon oil spill funds; Three civil rights pioneers were inducted into the Civil Rights Hall of Fame at the Capitol.

6/15 & 6/18 - #2015 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: The Governor signs a sweeping K-12 education reform bill into law, but vetoes a higher education bill; House Speaker Richard Corcoran joins the Governor touring the state to tout the budget approved during the special session; State leaders join a crowd of thousands in Orlando to memorialize victims of the Pulse Nightclub shooting rampage last year.

CAPITOL UPDATE continued

6/22 & 6/25 - #2016 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: The State University System Board of Governors met in Tampa for three days, reviewing university plans and performance funding; Governor Rick Scott went to Connecticut and New York on a business-recruiting tour; The Board of Governors of Citizens Property Insurance Corporation voted to recommend an increase in property tax rates for most Citizens' customers.

6/29 & 7/2 - #2017 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: The Governor signed or vetoed bills in the last batch from the 2017 Legislative session; The Florida Supreme Court heard oral arguments in the case over the Governor's decision to remove capital cases from a State Attorney who said she would not seek the death penalty; The state paid tribute to former Supreme Court Chief Justice Parker Lee McDonald, who died Saturday at the age of 93.

REEL SOUTH #210 “Red Wolf Revival” (30 minutes) *aired Thursday 4/27 at 8pm, Sunday 4/30 at 10am, and Monday 5/1 at 12:30am.*

By Rosh Patel and Madison McClintock. Three decades ago, the nearly-extinct red wolf was reintroduced in North Carolina. While this flagship conservation effort paved the way for reintroducing several other species across the country, today fewer than 100 wild red wolves remain - and their fate hinges on significant biological, political, cultural and economic challenges. *(Note: this episode tied in with LOCAL ROUTES’ story on Red Wolves, and aired in place of LOCAL ROUTES at the above times as a follow up to the local story.)*
