The date they are set to begin isn january 2 and they will target those who entered the US illegally since 2014 and who were denied by a court the right to stay in the US. here is how to deal with a raid situation: do not open the door to your domicile, they have to slip your deportation order under the door, a person should not provide his/her name or their country of origin. The raids will include whole families (adults and children) who have deportations orders.
REPORT OF POLICE KILLINGS IN 2015	NOTICIAS UNIVISION 11:30PM	01/02/2016	11:33 PM	1:45	Young black men were nine times more likely than other Americans to be killed by police officers in 2015, according to the findings of a Guardian study that recorded a final tally of 1,134 deaths at the hands of law enforcement officers this year. Despite making up only 2% of the total US population, African American males between the ages of 15 and 34 comprised more than 15% of all deaths logged this year by an ongoing investigation into the use of deadly force by police. Their rate of police-involved deaths was five times higher than for white men of the same age. Paired with official government mortality data, this new finding indicates that about one in every 65 deaths of a young African American man in the US is a killing by police.

ICE RAIDS TAKING PLACE	NOTICIAS UNIVISION 11:30PM	01/03/2016	11:32 PM	2:52	<p>The detentions of at least 11 families across the country marked the first day of an effort by the government to find and deport Central American migrants who sought refuge in the U.S. and stayed illegally, immigrant advocates said Saturday. Unlike a string of immigration raids in the mid-2000s, agents do not plan to conduct workplace raids or other mass enforcement actions, but will instead target addresses for families with deportation orders. In Norcross, Ga., on Saturday, Joanna Gutierrez said her niece and niece's 9-year-old son were taken by Immigration and Customs Enforcement agents, who arrived in an unmarked car and presented Gutierrez with a warrant for a man she didn't know. Gutierrez says she told the agents they needed a warrant to enter her home. They told her they didn't, she says, and walked inside, checking every room in the house and waking her children. "They were shaking from fear," Gutierrez said of the children in a phone interview Saturday night. After searching the house, the agents showed Gutierrez a photo of her niece, 30-year-old Ana Lizet Mejia. Mejia fled Honduras when her brother was killed by gangs. She entered the U.S. illegally with her son as part of a wave of Central American migrants seeking refuge from violence in the summer of 2014. Mejia had never missed a court date, Gutierrez said, and wore an ankle monitor provided by the court. Obama administration officials said in late December that they would step up deportations of those who had already been told to leave the country. In Texas, six Central American families detained in the raids are expected to be brought by Monday to the South Texas Family Residential Center about 70 miles south of San Antonio, according to Mohammad Abdollahi, a spokesman for RAICES, a San Antonio-based legal advocacy group for immigrants.</p>

In a prime-time, televised town hall meeting, Obama dismissed what he called a "conspiracy" alleging that the federal government - and Obama in particular - wants to seize all firearms as a precursor to imposing martial law. He blamed that notion on the NRA and like-minded groups that convince its members that "somebody's going to come grab your guns." Obama defended his support for the constitutional right to gun ownership while arguing it was consistent with his efforts to curb mass shootings. He said the NRA refused to acknowledge the government's responsibility to make legal products safer, citing seatbelts and child-proof medicine.

More than 17,300 minor immigrants were apprehended when attempting to enter the country between the start of October and the end of December, according to statistics released by the U.S. Customs and Border Protection. That figure is more than twice the nearly 8,000 apprehensions that were recorded during the first three months of fiscal year 2015. The apprehensions of family units between October and December also increased by 187 percent over the same time period the previous year. More than 21,400 family units were caught crossing the southwest border, nearly three times the approximately 7,500 apprehended during the first three months of fiscal year 2015.</p>

Though the immigration matter does not appear on Friday's list of cases to be heard during the current term, the nine justices still have time to add it to the docket. A three-judge panel of the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans voted 2-1 in November to uphold a judicial injunction blocking implementation of Obama's immigration measures. The injunction was granted in February by Andrew Hanen, a U.S. district judge in Brownsville, Texas, in response to a suit filed by Texas and 25 other states - all governed by Republicans - contending that Obama exceeded his constitutional authority.</p>

It was the last Democratic matchup before voting begins in two weeks, and both sides were eager to rumble as polls showed the race tightening in the leadoff states of Iowa and New Hampshire. Clinton rapped Sanders, the Vermont senator, for voting repeatedly with the National Rifle Association, and then welcomed his weekend reversal of position to support legislation that would deny gun manufacturers legal immunity. She rattled off a list of provisions that she said Sanders had supported in line with the NRA. Sanders, in turn, said Clinton's assertion that he kowtowed to the gun lobby was "very disingenuous" and pointed to his lifetime rating of a D- from the NRA. On health care, Sanders released his plan for a government-run single-payer plan just hours before the debate, and used his opening statement to call for health care "for every man, woman and child as a right." Clinton, by contrast, urged less sweeping action to build on President Barack Obama's health care plan by reducing out-of-pocket costs and control spending on prescription drugs.</p>

Immigration and Customs Enforcement hired a contractor to help some immigrant families find transportation, housing and low-cost lawyers, hoping that getting them on stable footing will make them more likely to attend court hearings that determine whether they should be allowed to stay in the country or deported. When immigrants show up for court, federal authorities can keep track of asylum cases to ensure those who lose return home. Advocates want immigrants to attend the hearings because they believe many of those arriving from El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras have a strong shot of winning asylum but must be in court to do so. Judges routinely issue deportation orders for those who don't show. As many as 800 families who pass an initial asylum screening can join the program in Los Angeles, New York, Washington, Chicago and Miami starting Thursday. Caseworkers will help newly arriving immigrants with tasks such as finding transportation to immigration court and enrolling their children in school. Later, they will help those who lose their bids to stay in the country head home. The program will cost \$11 million a year and reach a tiny sliver of the 54,000 Central American immigrants with children who have arrived on the southwestern border since October 2014. It comes as the Obama administration faces court-imposed limits on the detention of immigrant families and as authorities began arresting those who lost their asylum cases in raids earlier this month. Those eligible for the program include pregnant women, nursing mothers and immigrants with mental illness. Since 2014, immigrant families have been sent to family detention centers or released and told to appear in immigration court. Nearly 790 deportation orders have been issued for immigrants with children who have arrived since July 2014 and were detained. More than two-thirds were for those who didn't show up for hearings. FLINT, MICHIGAN WATER IS CONTAMINATED WITH LEAD	NOTICIAS UNIVISION 11:30PM	01/24/2016	11:36 PM	2:13	<p>F or nearly two years now, the residents of Flint, Michigan, have been slowly poisoned by lead in their drinking water. Now, as the National Guard delivers bottled water, the media and politicians debate who's to blame. If this plays out the usual way, some low-level people will be forced to resign. (That's already started.) And senior decision-makers will dodge accountability by claiming "no one could have foreseen" what happened. But this is too expensive and important a problem to accept the usual blame game. We need to look past the witch hunting and address the underlying, systemic causes of Flint's woes. Flint, Michigan, is not an isolated case; many similar crises will come our way if we don't deal with the root causes. The stakes are high: Flint's mayor says it will cost up to \$1.5 billion to replace the city's aging pipes. Expensive medical care will be required for the 6,000 to 12,000 children who have been exposed to lead poisoning. Beyond that, some of these children will suffer an irreversible loss of mental capacity. It might not be enough to require institutional care, but it may permanently diminish their ability to provide for themselves and contribute to Flint's economy. Total economic damage could exceed \$10 billion, counting the direct costs of repairs, the direct cost of medical care and the reduced economic productivity among those poisoned.</p>

According to this first draw sampling for residents across the city, the average lead levels for 10.646. The average lead level for residents of this particular neighborhood was 12.173. Anything over five is considered the trigger for health intervention, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. In zip code 48503, 4.03 percent of the population is Latino - which is higher than the 3.7 percent average for the city. During the Flint water crisis, the state and city have neglected and were desensitized to the particular concerns of Latinos. Some claim that locals interested in obtaining bottle water are being asked to provide social security information, the state of Michigan says that no such ID is required (This raises concerns about exposing some to Immigration raids). Michigan's attorney general announces that a former prosecutor and a retired head of the Detroit FBI will play key roles in an investigation into Flint's water crisis as part of an effort to seek answers and prevent potential conflicts of interest in the ongoing probe. Perhaps as many as 1,000 are not going to water distribution centers, they're not calling 211 and they're not getting deliveries. It's because they're scared. These people are undocumented immigrants living in Flint, mostly on the city's east side. It's hard to imagine, but many of them weren't even aware of lead in Flint's water until a couple weeks ago.</p>

But federal health officials and other infectious disease specialists say so far that seems unlikely. There are several reasons for Bell's cautious optimism that isolated cases that show up in the U.S. could be contained. The first is that the two species of mosquitoes that could be capable of transmitting the virus, <i>Aedes aegypti</i> and <i>Aedes albopictus</i>, live mostly in the southern, more tropical parts of the U.S. That makes it likely that transmission would be limited primarily to these areas. And for various reasons, the chain of events and conditions the virus needs in order to spread is more easily disrupted in the U.S. than elsewhere.</p>

Rick Snyder says officials have identified about 200 Flint children with elevated blood-lead levels since the city's water crisis was exposed in the fall. Snyder disclosed the figure during a tele-town hall event Wednesday with nearly 8,000 listeners. He says the state is working to ensure all kids are tested. Michigan officials had said earlier Wednesday that water samples in Flint are "trending better," but that it's too soon to give the go-ahead to residents to resume drinking unfiltered water. Department of Environmental Quality Interim Director Keith Creagh said the test results are not statistically valid because there's no guarantee homeowner-provided samples are coming from homes at higher risk. Further testing continues.</p>

The bill prohibits what it says are "sanctuary policies" by some municipalities. But Palacios says it would cost taxpayers and turn people in communities against each other.

More than 640,000 students attend LA county schools in approximately 1,000 schools, 70% of the student body are latinos (mexicand and central american), 2,000 are refugees.

La mayor Erick Garcetti, a son of immigrants participated in the workshops to help those eligible to become US citizens.</p> <p>Arturo Vargas of NALEO anticipates helping about 200 persons in hopes of preparing them to vote in the November presidential elections. Maria Macias has tried but failed to pass the citizenship exam, now wants to try again. Candidates for citizenship must have lived in the US as permanent residents for at least 5 years, have demonstrated good moral character and also pass a test on US civics and also an English proficiency test (There are some exceptions such as persons over age 50 and 20 or more years as permanent residents or 55 years of age and 15 as legal residents). Nationally, there is approximately 4 million Hispanics who are legal residents and are eligible to become citizens, almost 1 million live in Los Angeles.</p>

Dr. Bernard Rosenfeld noticed what had happened and contacted lawyers. None of the women in the complaint won compensation, but, this sets a precedent.</p>
