AgDay is a nationally syndicated TV program that focuses on agricultural news, agribusiness and country living.

This twenty-five second local weather forecast airs once per hour, seven days a week. The program informs viewers of current weather conditions and the upcoming forecast.

### **News- airs Monday-Friday 6 a.m. to 7 a.m.**

WBUI airs a simulcast of WICS NewsChannel 20 Sunrise five days per week.

### **The National Desk—airs Monday-Friday 7 a.m. to 8 a.m. and 9 p.m. to 10 p.m.**

The National Desk is hosted by anchor Jan Jeffcoat, providing commentary-free news coverage, highlighting important stories occurring in cities and towns across the country.

<b>Agriculture</b>	AgDay	7/3/2023	Various	The USDA is now calling for 94.1 million acres of corn. That's up 6-percent or 5.52 million acres from last year which is much higher than its predicted in March and way above the trade predicted. Soybeans are down 5-percent from last year, with 83.5 million acres.
<b>Agriculture</b>	AgDay	7/10/2023	Various	Slower US Ag exports in May resulted in a record trade deficit. US ag exports were down 3 percent in May, totally just under 14-billion-dollars. Imports increased more than 4 percent to almost 17-billion dollars. This leaves a record trade gap of 3-billion dollars. The export number has been the smallest since September of 2022. One weakness is that soybean exports dropped 2-billion dollars due to China and other soybean export customers have moved their business away from US to Brazil.
<b>Agriculture</b>	AgDay	7/17/2023	Various	The strike at two of Canada's busiest ports appears to be coming to an end. Canadian dockworkers and their

				employers agreed to a tentative 4-year labor deal. During the 13-day strike, major supply chains in Canada and the US faced extensive snarls at the Port of Vancouver and the Port of Prince Rupert. The freight rail traffic to US fell nearly 50 percent in just one week during the strike. Commodities affected included non-metallic minerals, chemicals, crude oil, petroleum products, and forest products.
<b>Agriculture</b>	AgDay	7/24/2023	Various	Russian cruise missiles are destroying farm storage building on Friday. The reported damage was to grain terminals destroying a hundred tons of peas and 20 tons of barley. This is retaliation for damage of a crucial bridge between Russia and the Moscow annexed Crimean Peninsula. Potential military targets can be ships traveling to each other's Black Sea Ports.
<b>Agriculture</b>	AgDay	8/1/2023	Various	Interest rates are not at the highest point they have been in 22-years. The Federal Reserve set its benchmark lending rate at 5.5 percent last week. This is marking the 11th

				rate increase since it started fighting inflation last March. The Fed signal they are not done raising interest rates. Everything in agriculture is more expensive today and this will continue to cut into farmers pockets.
<b>Agriculture</b>	AgDay	8/7/2023	Various	The Senate recently passed and amendment to the National Defense Authorization Act to boost federal reviews and limit foreign purchases by foreign investors for certain countries. This would restrict ownership from China, Russia, Iran and North Korea. The concern is that adversaries might buy US land to gain influence. Foreign land should have to be addressed at a national level.
<b>Agriculture</b>	AgDay	8/17/2023	Various	For the first time since Russia ended the Black Sea Grain deal, a ship has departed the Ukrainian port of Odesa. The ship has been stuck in port since February of last year. The Hong Kong-flagged container ship left the port and is traveling through a temporary corridor established for civilian vessels to and from the Black Sea ports

				of Ukraine. It has been reportedly heading to Bosphorus carrying more than 30-thousands tons of cargo.
<b>Agriculture</b>	AgDay	8/24/2023	Various	China has downgraded their interest rates to try and stimulate their economy. The equity market has pulled out 4-billion-dollars from China's economy. The red flags are almost daily with their economic data, the commodity market really needs China to support their economy. China wants to stop reporting their youth employment, this is probably due to their record high of over 25%. They do not want word to get out into the Chinese markets. This information could throw us into more of a financial crisis.
<b>Agriculture</b>	AgDay	8/29/2023	Various	US and China are hoping to warm up the chilly ties between each other. The US Secretary of Commerce Gina Raimondo is traveling to the country. Gina is the fourth high profile official to visit China in recent months. Chinese leader Xi Jinping's government looks to revive foreign investor interest in China.

				China is trying to reverse a deepening economic slump. Raimondo and Chinese counterpart agreed to exchange information on US export controls that have angered China. She's hoping this will reduce misunderstanding on national security policies.
<b>Agriculture</b>	AgDay	9/6/2023	Various	The USDA is projecting ag exports will be 172-billion dollars next year. That's down 5.5-billion from this year's revised forecast. Economists say that's largely due to lower exports of soybeans, soybean meal, and dairy products.
<b>Agriculture</b>	AgDay	9/13/2023	Various	There was an explosion at the AMD facility in Decatur, Illinois. The company is reporting that some operations at the plant are down at this time. Five employees remain in the hospital after being injured in the explosion on Sunday evening. The company is still evaluating the damage and the cause of the fire. The concern is a long outage could put pressure on crop prices going into harvest.
<b>Agriculture</b>	AgDay	9/19/2023	Various	Ukraine is challenging Russia's Black Sea port

				<p>blockade while sending ships through the Black Sea. Ukraine has dispatched empty ships to collect grain shipments for the first time in almost two months. Two vessels, have confirmed their readiness to use the route to port of Chornomorsk. The plan is to load approximately 20-thousand-tons of wheat destined for Africa and Asia. It's a risky move, since Russia has stated it would treat ships bound for Ukraine ports as potential carries of weapons. Russia has repeatedly targeted key river ports with drone attacks.</p>
<b>Agriculture</b>	AgDay	9/28/2023	Various	<p>Lawmakers are running out of time on an agreement to avoid a government shut down. The shutdown could happen this Saturday, which would furlough millions of federal employees, leave the military without pay, disrupt air travel, and cut off other services including many through the USDA. On Tuesday, Senate leaders announced a deal on a 45-day stop gap resolution. The 79 page</p>

				<p>draft bill includes 6.2 billion dollars in aid for Ukraine. House republicans will likely not pass. The House speaker Kevin McCarthy along with house republicans advanced appropriation bills that experts say have no hope for passing the Senate.</p>
