have a Tempe corporate office, which employs about 300 people. They are being offered 45 days of employment.

AZ wagered six billion dollars on sports. The state took in over 28 million in taxes on those wagers. But other states are making a lot more money. AZ applies a 10 percent tax on gaming profits. Other states apply a bigger tax. Gaming bill sponsors had warned against higher taxes saying it would "not work". Other states like New Hampshire, made nearly 23 million while New York, with a little more than double the bets, earned 23 times as much in taxes. Some states have started to

revisit their deals with the gaming companies.

Last year had the warmest La Nina on record-La Nina usually brings cooler temps. Experts say that pattern will change and bring warmer trends during the summer. Arizona and surrounding states are in a tough spot, wildfires are becoming more common and severe.

Scientists are focusing on the southwest as weather patterns point to warmer summer trends. The AZ Climate study says warmer temps

mean less water in our region because of evaporation. However, it also means, rain will fall harder and lead to more flooding. More rain doesn't mean the drought will go away. Experts say there is too much carbon dioxide in the air which is heating up the Earth, and sparking all

the severe weather.

River water. Multiple states in the SW were told to reduce their water use by the federal government to preserve the river. California has priority access and is not willing to compromise. Arizona says it's time for equal access. At stake is the potential for AZ to face the strictest

water cuts, due to concessions made in 1968 before building of the Central AZ Project. But experts say it still isn't enough for California to agree to the proposal, stating, "it's time for California to help solve the water crisis and be an equal partner". They also say Arizona is running on borrowed time and needs to start imposing Colorado River water restriction by this summer, at the latest.

Salt River Project is also doing releases from the Verde River reservoir because it is close to capacity.
