Dear John:

As we have discussed over the course of the past year, and most recently, last Friday, in accordance with the APTS/NCTA/PBS understanding (the "Understanding"), this will confirm WHUT's desire for Comcast to move forward with implementing digital only carriage of WHUT's digital signal on certain Comcast cable systems. Unless otherwise defined herein, all capitalized terms shall have the same meaning as set forth in the 2005 NCTA, APTS, PBS digital carriage agreement entered into between the parties (the "Agreement").

As you are aware, in order to allow WHUT sufficient time to implement its post-digital transition strategies, WHUT instructed Comcast to defer digital only carriage of WHUT for an interim period, in lieu of continued analog (downconverted) carriage.

As you know, in accordance with the Agreement, Comcast has not designated WHUT as a "Primary Public Station" on any HDTV Cable Systems. Pursuant to the Understanding, with respect to "Secondary HDTV Cable Systems" (HDTV Cable Systems where Comcast does not designate WHUT's station as a Primary Public Station), each Secondary HDTV Cable System will retransmit up to 4 WHUT digital programming streams. You have indicated that at present, WHUT is transmitting only a high-definition ("HD") signal and a standard-definition ("SD") simulcast of that HD signal. Comcast will (a) display WHUT's SD signal on its current two-digit display channel (generally channel 19 or 32) in SD format, and (b) launch WHUT's HD signal on display channel 202 on such systems offering HD service. As I explained Friday, as we roll out our expanded ~100-channel HD offering, we plan to dual illuminate the current HD channels (located in the 200s) together with ~50 new HD channels, all in a new, expanded HD lineup in the 800s. WHUT-HD will appear on these lineups on channel 802 in the Washington, DC Designated Marketing Area (DMA), and channel 807 in the Baltimore DMA.

It is important to note that Comcast customers must have a digital converter box or other suitable digital device in order to continue to receive WHUT programming. Our local marketing team will work with you during the days/weeks leading up to the implementation of your election to help insure a smooth transition for your viewers who may not yet have the necessary digital equipment. Note that while analog-only Comcast customers in Secondary HDTV Cable Systems will lose access to WHUT (analog) programming, customers with appropriate HD televisions and equipment will gain access to WHUT's HD signal.

As discussed, Comcast will implement WHUT digital carriage election on January 5, 2010. By January 2010, we anticipate the expanded HD lineup (with WHUT-HD in the 800s) to be activated in Charles and Calvert counties in the Washington, DC DMA, and in Annapolis and Anne Arundel county in the Baltimore DMA. More lineups will come on line gradually over the course of 2010.

Please acknowledge your agreement with this clarification by signing below, and returning a fully executed copy to my attention.

We look forward to working with WHUT in making this transition as smooth as possible for our customers and WHUT viewers.
