Tens-of-thousands of children in the country illegally are on their way to a public school near you for a taxpayer funded education and the Department of Education says they're entitled to it. For months we've heard horror stories of disease ridden Border Patrol processing centers with children passing and contracting measles, tuberculosis and scabies. There's no word yet from the Department of Education or local school districts about whether children in the country illegally will be properly vaccinated before starting school for the fall term. Many schools in places like Arizona and Texas start school next week. According to the Federation for American Immigration Reform, illegal immigrations put a strain on Arizona at a cost of \$1.3 billion per year. In Texas last year, illegal immigration cost the state \$12.1 billion. The majority of the cost comes from illegal immigrants using, but not paying for healthcare systems, K-12 education and incarceration.

While the AHA stresses that e-cigarettes should be closely monitored to keep them from being a "gateway" product for other nicotine products, there is a place for them to help people quit smoking. But, the authors stressed, "There is not yet enough evidence for clinicians to counsel their patients who are using combustible tobacco products to use e-cigarettes as a primary cessation aid," and should only be used when other treatments have failed or are not adopted. The AHA's proposed guidelines, developed by an expert advisory group working with those researching e-cigarettes and tobacco control and prevention, largely support those being considered by the FDA. When exactly the FDA will make a final decision is unclear.

The survey, conducted August 20-24 among 1,501 adults, finds the share saying that both approaches should be given equal priority has fallen from 47% to 41%, while the percentage prioritizing enhanced border security and stronger enforcement of immigration laws has risen eight points, from 25% to 33%. There has been little change in the percentage saying the priority should be creating a path to citizenship for people in the U.S. illegally (25% in Feb. 2013, 23% today).

**Topic: RESPIRATORY ILLNESS SICKENS MORE THAN A THOUSAND CHILDREN**

**Synopsis:** Doctors in ten states have seen about a thousand cases of children who have a severe respiratory illness. This rare respiratory virus is suddenly becoming more common, and that's bad news for children in particular. The symptoms look like those of a bad cold (runny nose, coughing, sneezing, and fever), but it can be much more serious especially for some youngsters. Over the past three weeks, at least a thousand kids- in these ten states have been stricken with a respiratory illness that the CDC believes is the ENTEROVIRUS 68. There is no vaccine for this virus, and the scary part is that doctors say this strain is so new they are still trying to figure exactly how it is transmitted.

That's why in the aftermath of the new disappointment and anger of many activists to the President by the new delay, some are calling for greater political participation of the Hispanic community, but others consider looking for new alternatives. Even some activists consider the possibility of creating a third political front in the absence of action of bipartisanship on immigration. Pro-immigrant groups plan for the next few days a series of direct actions on President Obama and the Democratic Party, including protests at fundraising events for candidates or the party itself.

In Waco, Texas, for example, the community is more than 30 percent Hispanic, but the police department of 231 full-time sworn officers has only 27 Hispanics. Across the United States, there are police departments that still look like Ferguson, Missouri; a largely white police force protecting a mostly black community.

**Topic: HOME DEPOT PAYMENT SYSTEM BREACHED**

**Synopsis:** Home Depot confirmed on Monday that hackers had broken into its in-store payments systems, in what could be the largest known breach of a retail company's computer network. The retailer said the exact number of customers affected was still not clear. But a person briefed on the investigation said the total number of credit card numbers stolen at Home Depot could top 60 million. By comparison, the breach last year at Target, the largest known attack to date, affected 40 million cardholders. The retailer operates 1,977 stores in the United States and 180 in Canada. That is about 400 more than Target had when it was compromised. Target's breach went on for three weeks before the company learned about it, while the attack at Home Depot went unnoticed for as long as five months.

**Synopsis:** About 475 children have been treated at Missouri's Children Mercy Hospital in Kansas City, at least 60 of who are in intensive care. The CDC confirmed at least 19 cases of enterovirus D68 were found at the hospital. The Children's Hospital Colorado in Denver told the



Denver Post that more than 900 children have been treated for respiratory illnesses in the past three weeks, including 86 admitted to the hospital. At least five children at Rocky Mountain Hospital have been admitted to intensive care, but the CDC has not yet confirmed D68 in Colorado.

Hundreds of people strolled around the Memorial's twin reflecting pools dotted in parts with personalized memorials to individual names. The Memorial's twin reflecting pools are each nearly an acre in size. They also represent the largest man-made waterfalls in North America and stand where the Twin Towers once stood. The names of every person who died in the 2001 attacks as well as the World Trade Center bombing in February 1993 are inscribed into the bronze panels edging pools in memory of the largest loss of life from a foreign attack on U.S. soil and the greatest single loss of rescue personnel in American history.

These steps include creating stronger passwords and using two-step authentication.

**Synopsis:** A new pilot study suggests that signs of autism symptoms can be erased if babies begin therapy even before they can toddle. Researchers have long taken the "earlier the better" approach to treatment, but this tiny study - in just seven children - is the first to look at starting therapy in the first year of life. The research, run by the University of California Davis' MIND Institute, provided directed therapy to babies ages 6-9 months old that were identified as having early signs of autism, such as an inability to make eye contact, lack of babbling and fixations. By the time the seven babies reached their third birthday - a time when autism can reliably be diagnosed - five didn't show any autism symptoms and a sixth had only mild symptoms. The treatment now needs to be tried in many more children to make sure that it can be consistently helpful, said study co-author Sally Rogers, a professor and developmental psychologist at UC Davis.

**Topic: DEPORTATIONS OF UNDOCUMENTED IMMIGRANTS DECREASE BY 20 PERCENT**

**Synopsis:** President Barack Obama has quietly slowed deportations by nearly 20 percent while delaying plans to act on his own potentially to shield millions of immigrants from expulsion. The Homeland Security Department is on pace to remove the fewest number of immigrants since 2007, according to an analysis of its data by The Associated Press. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, the federal agency responsible for deportations, sent home 258,608 immigrants between the start of the budget year last Oct. 1 and July 28 this summer, a decrease of nearly 20 percent from the same period in 2013, when 320,167 people were removed. Over 10 months in 2012, Immigration and Customs Enforcement deported 344,624 people, some 25 percent more than this year, according to federal figures obtained by the AP.

**Synopsis:** A solid majority of California voters believes local police have a tough job and do it well, but nearly a third say law enforcement targets minorities unfairly, according to a new USC Dornsife/Los Angeles Times poll. The survey found attitudes toward police split along racial and ethnic lines: Blacks, Latinos and Asians were substantially more likely than whites to say that police are too aggressive or treat whites better than others. The contrasting views reflect persistent tension between law enforcement and minority communities in California - even decades after police clashes with African Americans sparked the 1965 and 1992 riots in Los Angeles.

**Topic: SOFTWARE GLITCH SENDS REGULAR COLORADO DRIVER'S LICENSES TO IMMIGRANTS**

**Synopsis:** A software glitch mistakenly sent regular Colorado driver's licenses to hundreds of immigrants living in the United States illegally, rather than the special licenses they were supposed to get. The special driver's licenses created for the first time this year for immigrants do not have an intended disclaimer that makes it clear the holder cannot vote, according to authorities. Specifically, the cards do not have a black band near the top indicating that the license does not offer voting privileges and is not for "public benefit purposes." The glitch resulted in errors that invalidated 524 driver's licenses for those living in this country illegally.

**Synopsis:** General Motors' compensation expert in cases involving faulty ignition switches has determined that 19 wrongful death claims are eligible for payments from the company. Attorney Kenneth Feinberg has received 125 death claims due to the faulty switches in older-model small cars such as the Chevrolet Cobalt. He says in a report issued Monday that the rest remain under review or require further documentation. GM hired Feinberg to compensate victims of crashes caused by the switches. GM has blamed the switches for at least 13 deaths, but lawmakers have put the death toll closer to 100. Feinberg also has received 320 claims for compensation due to injuries. Of those, 12 have been deemed eligible for payments so far. The switches can slip out of the run position, causing engines to stall.

**Topic: CONNECTICUT AND NEW YORK - POSSIBLE CASES OF ENTEROVIRUS D68**

**Synopsis:** Connecticut and New York are the two latest states to report possible cases of Enterovirus D68, the respiratory illness suspected of hospitalizing hundreds of children in 21 states in the South, Midwest and now Northeast. New York became the first state on the East Coast to report cases of the virus that has been attacking children, especially those with asthma. On Friday, the New York State Department of Health announced the virus has been confirmed in more than a dozen children in the capital region and central New York. Onondaga County Health Department's Medical Director Quoc Nguyen said two patients were in Onondaga County. Although Enterovirus D68 has caused concern, particularly among parents of young children, enteroviruses themselves are common. The CDC estimated that 10 to 15 million people are infected with them each year. The Enterovirus D68 strain, in particular, dates to 1962 and hasn't been widely reported in years, which experts said could be part of the problem.

FLIC, in coordination with about 70 other organizations, is spearheading the pro-driver license campaign to accomplish these major goals: gathering 10,000 signatures from the public statewide supporting driver licenses for the undocumented; and knocking on the doors of 20,000 voters statewide urging them to vote for candidates who support the drive.

A U.S. Army general will lead the effort. Help build 17 new health care facilities in the region with 100 beds each. **Synopsis:** Federal researchers reported on Tuesday that the number of Americans without health insurance had declined substantially in the first quarter of this year, the first federal measure of the number of uninsured Americans since the Affordable Care Act extended coverage to millions of people in January. The number of uninsured Americans fell by about 8 percent to 41 million people in the first quarter of this year, compared with 2013, a drop that represented about 3.8 million people and that roughly matched what experts were expecting based on polling by private groups, like Gallup. The survey also measured physical health but found little evidence of change.

**Synopsis:** The United States does not have enough primary-care physicians. There are huge swaths of the nation, especially rural and inner-city areas that lack any primary-care physicians. The Department of Health and Human Services estimates that the shortage is at least 16,000 doctors. Missouri will allow medical school graduates to work as "assistant physicians" treating patients in underserved rural areas, even though they have not been trained in a residency program. In the U.S., at least one year of residency after medical school is usually required to practice medicine independently. Most medical school graduates spend at least three years in residency before starting to practice on their own. Under the new law, an assistant physician must have passed the first two sections of the national licensing exam for doctors but not the final one. If they want to become full-fledged physicians, they will still have to pass the last test and do a one-year residency.

Earlier this year, the ACLU's Colorado chapter notified the sheriffs they could be held liable for potential civil rights violations if they continued to hold people at the request of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement. So-called ICE detainers ask that local law-enforcement agencies hold a person for up to 48 hours after they are eligible for release, but recent court rulings have held that the requests are voluntary and do not have the force of law.

A total of 706 babies and 43 employees were possibly exposed to the infected worker between September 2013 and August 2014, the health department said. Health and hospital officials were working to contact the affected families and would provide screening and follow-up care free of charge.

By the close of open enrollment in April, 6.7 million Americans had chosen a qualified health plan with premium tax credits, and many more have since enrolled in a QHP through a special enrollment period and received tax credits. Each of them will need to file a form 8962. The Congressional Budget Office estimates that 30 million Americans are potentially subject to the shared responsibility requirement, and that 23 million of them may qualify for an exemption. Many of the 23 million will have to file form 8965.

Listeria primarily affects the elderly, pregnant women, newborns and people with weakened immune systems. Symptoms include fever, muscle aches, headache, stiff neck, confusion, loss of balance and gastrointestinal problems.

At the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Dr. Tom Frieden said the patient left Liberia on Sept. 19, arrived the next day to visit family and started feeling ill four or five days later. He said it was not clear how the person became infected.
