**Discussion:** The Duval County Public Schools district is continuing an intense local discussion about renaming nine public schools. Most of the school names have associations with the Confederacy. Kimberly Allen is the Executive Director of 904WARD, an organization with a mission to end racism in Jacksonville. She joined to discuss renaming the schools.

Series Title: "First Coast Connect with Melissa Ross: Climate Change in Jax"

**Airdate:** 3/9/21 **Duration:** 52:55

Discussion: The Jacksonville City Council's Special Committee on Resiliency has unanimously

approved its final report, which outlines many of the threats climate change poses to

Jacksonville, and lays out recommended actions the city can take to protect itself. The 90-plus page report will serve as the foundation for the work that will be done by the city's future Chief

Resiliency Officer. We spoke to City Councilwoman Randy Defoor, Chair of the City Council's Special Committee on Resiliency; Adam Rosenblatt, a biology professor at the University of North Florida, who is also a subject matter expert for the resiliency committee and a co-founder of the Jacksonville Chapter of the Citizens Climate Lobby; and Ashantae Green, Supervisor of Duval Soil & Water Conservation District Group 4. She is also a subject matter expert for the resiliency committee, and the outreach and communications coordinator for the advocacy group Resilient Jax.

### **Politics**

Series Title: "First Coast Connect with Melissa Ross: Protest Bill Controversy"

**Airdate:** 3/17/21 **Duration:** 52:55

**Discussion:** A bill that seeks to prevent violence at protests is moving through the Legislature. However, it has drawn strong bipartisan criticism around Florida. The bill is supported by Gov. Ron DeSantis. Opponents say it would criminalize free speech and run against the First Amendment. Patricia Brigham, president of the League of Women Voters of Florida joined us with more on this bill.
