



WEEK OF APRIL 1

We start the quarter with an important local story—coverage of the death of Donald “Dontay” Ivy after being Tased by Albany police—reaction from Acting chief Brendan Cox; speculation about the future of the First Prize Center in Albany; Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand continues her push for paid family leave; Albany County proposes a bill to ban the display of tobacco products in chain drug stores; man accused of helping to build a “death ray” asks the judge to dismiss charges against him.

WEEK OF APRIL 6

Defense rests in murder trial of former New England Patriots TE Aaron Hernandez; closing arguments in the Boston Marathon bomber case; JetBlue announces service from Albany to Orlando & Ft. Lauderdale will begin December 10; Sen. Chuck Schumer talks about having a clear path to having the Democrats’ top leadership post in the Senate after Sen. Harry Reid retires; debate over FEMA funds to build a new Public Safety Building in Schoharie County; Montgomery County man has been found guilty of sexually abusing 6 boys, who’d been invited to work on his farm; Speculation begins to build that Gov. Cuomo might seek a third term; coverage of the trial of Herman Robinson, accused of raping an underage girl for 7 years, and killing the child he’d fathered with her. Robinson would be found guilty on all charges, and sentenced to 100 years in prison; new study says Albany is one of only a handful of cities where a woman might earn, on the average, a salary equal to, or higher than a man; State Comptroller Tom DiNapoli says the state will foot the bill for most, but not all, of former Senate Majority Leader Joe Bruno’s legal costs; Albany judge rules that Brenda Van Alstyne cannot have custody of murder victim Kenny White’s surviving sisters;

WEEK OF APRIL 13

Common Core testing begins for New York students this week, and thousands of parents statewide will opt their children out of the tests; Governor’s office says more and more people are getting tickets for texting while driving; life in prison for former Patriots TE Aaron Hernandez; criticism building of Gov. Cuomo’s Start Up NY program; a grand jury now reportedly looking into business dealings of State Senate Majority Leader Dean Skelos; coverage of a traffic jam on the Northway after a tractor-trailer fire around Exit 10 that sparked a brush fire; Tri-City Valley Cats organization work to renovate four area little league fields;

WEEK OF APRIL 20

Mudslide closes a stretch of the Normans Kill between Albany and Bethlehem—workers have to dig a trench to mitigate possible flooding problems; Gov. Cuomo in Cuba for a 24-hour trade mission; Rensselaer County Democrats endorse Patrick Madden in Troy’s mayoral race; Colonie Police chief Steve Heider announces plans to retire after 42 years with the department; Comcast walks away from a controversial \$45 billion merger with Time-Warner Cable; vandalism spree in Schenectady and Halfmoon. Two men arrested for damaging more than 100 cars with BB guns; tribute to victims of violent crime, featuring remarks from Nancy Crowe, a woman beaten as she walked along Watervliet-Shaker Rd. in Colonie last year; Bizarre situation in southern Albany County, as a herd of buffalo got loose from a farm in Schodack, crossed the Hudson River, and eventually had to be killed over fears of public safety; more details released over red-light cameras, which will be installed this summer.

WEEK OF APRIL 27

Riots break out in Baltimore following the death of an African-American man in police custody; Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie says his chamber will pass 5 separate bills strengthening NY’s equal-pay laws; families of those who died in police custody in NY ask for a special prosecutor to investigate such cases; families of ill children seek emergency access to medical marijuana in New York (state’s program won’t be up and running until next year); FEMA approves \$37 million for a new jail and public safety building in Schoharie County; preview of the Freihofer’s Run for Women in Albany; Saratoga Springs pushes motorcycle safety;

WEEK OF MAY 4

U.S. Attorney Preet Bharara announces the arrest and indictment of State Senate Majority Leader Dean Skelos. Skelos thus becomes the second legislative leader in NY to face corruption charges this year, and like Sheldon Silver, Skelos will resign his leadership post, but will remain in the Senate. After several days of negotiations, John Flanagan of Long Island will be elected Majority Leader; State officials pay tribute to police officers killed in the line of duty; (and following this event, Skelos would comment on the allegations against him, calling the complaint a “press release.” New England Patriots are accused of deflating footballs during the AFC Championship Game; GE releases a first-of-its-kind report on its impact in the Capital Region.

WEEK OF MAY 11

Albany County Legislature chairman Shawn Morse announces plans to run for mayor of Cohoes; Gov. Cuomo’s long-time live-in girlfriend, Sandra Lee of the Food Network, undergoes surgery for breast cancer; the governor begins a strong push for an education tax credit; DWI case involving former child star David Cassidy is finally settled; teenage girl from Clifton Park dies after falling 50 feet off a cliff at the Plotter Kill Preserve in Rotterdam; North Adams, Mass police advise people not to chase bears through the woods with a dull hatchet while drunk. No problem. Parents in Ballston Spa protest the planned firing of one of the Assistant Principals at the high school; State wage board will hold a series of public hearings on the possibility of raising the minimum wage for fast-food workers to \$15/hour; federal jury sentences Boston Marathon bomber Dzhokhar Tsarnaev to death; Schenectady police arrest Derek Rodriguez, 23, in a series of arsons.

WEEK OF MAY 18

State Senate Republicans try again to pass a measure that would set up a violent crimes registry for felons out on parole; opposition forms to Gov. Cuomo’s proposed Education Tax Credit; A Saratoga Springs police officer is put on leave (and eventually fired) after a confrontation with

a motorist that led to the suspect being pepper-sprayed; U.S. Attorney Rick Hartunian passes out more than \$9.6 million in forfeited assets, stemming from a highly-publicized bust of an internet gambling ring several years ago; Colonie town officials close the door on an illegal boarding house in the 1200 block of Central Ave. New rules for street musicians in Saratoga Springs; new push to solve some missing persons cases—drink coasters featuring the image of any one of 8 people reported missing years ago; deadly shooting in the 300 block of First St. In Arbor Hill in Albany; several companies now say they want to win a state license to distribute medical marijuana; State DEC is now calling for a more thorough environmental impact statement before it OK's a crude oil heating facility at the Port of Albany; Hall of Fame Classic in Cooperstown to draw thousands.

WEEK OF MAY 25

Maryellen Elia, former superintendent of schools in Hillsborough County, Florida, is named State Education Commissioner; Charter Communications offers up a plan to merge with Time-Warner Cable; new polls say Gov. Cuomo's favorability and job performance ratings are way down; Young woman in the Herman Robinson case speaks about her life following Robinson's conviction; former NY Gov. George Pataki announces plans to run for President; Troy police ramp up their investigation of a fatal arson—two people would eventually be arrested; Rep. Paul Tonko sponsors legislation to create a panel that would govern the drug testing of horses; tentative opening date set for the new Huck Finn's Playland in Albany.

WEEK OF JUNE 1

After 97 years, Sgt. Henry Johnson of Albany is awarded the Medal of Honor in a White House ceremony for his bravery in World War I; An Albany church known for its work with inner-city kids has been ripped off. Victory Christian Church lost several thousand dollars worth of equipment; Siena study shows CEO's "don't get it" when it comes to the problems of women in the workplace; New York Archbishop Cardinal Timothy Dolan joins Gov. Cuomo in calling for passage of the Education Tax Credit; reaction to the Medal of Honor ceremony for Sgt. Henry Johnson; Albany County Sheriff Craig Apple talks about a big drug bust in Green Island; project aimed at bringing new life to state parks is detailed at Thacher State Park; Animal Advocacy Day at the State Capitol; former Public Works Commissioner in Rensselaer avoids jail time in scrap metal scheme; Former Albany County Legislature Minority Leader Christine Benedict plans to run against incumbent Colonie Town Supervisor Paula Mahan; Deputy Chief Jonathan Teale nominated to replace Steve Heider as Colonie Police Chief; Albany Med fund-raising effort is called a huge success.

WEEK OF JUNE 8

Coverage of what will no doubt be one of the biggest stories of the year. Two convicted murderers, Richard Matt and David Sweat, break out of the Clinton Correctional Facility in Dannemora, sparking a manhunt that continues as this report is being written. Authorities allege that the two had help from a prison worker, Joyce Mitchell, and a prison guard, both of whom are arrested on several criminal charges. This story will take several bizarre twists, involving tools smuggled in with frozen hamburger meat, and paintings from one of the suspects supposedly destroyed by the prison guard. Severe thunderstorms roll through the area, bringing down power lines and branches; Albany tourism officials hold a "hospitality" summit, and announce the first event at the still-under-construction Capital Center; Rotterdam Square Mall sold to a Turkish firm that plans to invest \$10 million to add a bowling alley, restaurants, and an aquarium; cancer treatment center opens at Troy's St. Mary's Hospital;

WEEK OF JUNE 15

Owners of Willard Mountain Ski Resort in Washington County file for Chapter 11 bankruptcy; strange controversy over the head of the NAACP chapter in Spokane, Washington, after Rachel Dolezal's parents say she's not black; Gov. Cuomo announces agreement on a campus sexual assault policy that includes "yes means yes," a clear, affirmative agreement between partners; Albany County and the AAU enter into a partnership for a summer sports program for teens; B-29 WWII-era plane flies into Albany Int'l Airport; state legislature goes into overtime after failing to reach deals on several big-ticket issues, including NYC rent control; Albany mayor Kathy Sheehan formally nominates Brendan Cox to serve as the city's next police chief; Price Chopper says it will not sell cigarettes at its new Market 32 stores; inmate at the Saratoga County jail dies only hours after his arrival; Gunman in Charleston, South Carolina, kills 9 people inside an historically black church. He's captured in North Carolina, and the incident sparks a discussion about racism and the Confederate flag.

WEEK OF JUNE 22

NYRA offers a preview of the 2015 Saratoga meet; coverage continues of the two escaped prisoners from the Clinton Correctional Facility; fire destroys the pool house at the Tawasentha Park in Guilderland. Pool closed until about the 4th of July; Albany Bishop Emeritus Howard Hubbard hospitalized after a heart attack; General Electric announces a 4-year deal with its employee unions; Legislative leaders reach agreements with Gov. Cuomo on several big-ticket issues, paving the way for lawmakers to adjourn the session; Siena and Albany announce plans to continue their basketball rivalry; Dzhokhar Tsarnaev apologizes to victims, and is sentenced to death by the judge; 33 arrested at Fall Out Boy show at SPAC; Rep. Paul Tonko reacts to Supreme Court ruling on tax subsidies for Obamacare; Colonie Town Board confirms Jonathan Teale as its new police chief; Supreme Court OK's gay marriage in all 50 states.

Deloris McIntosh of Safehouse in Schenectady says her organization sends employees out to find teens who are trying to live on the streets. McIntosh says the teens may know their lives are in chaos but don't know how to fix them. They become desperate for change and decide to run away from home. For some of them, returning home is not an option. Safehouse serves about 150 young people between the ages of 16 and 20 each year, giving them a place to stay for up to 30 days and then helping them get home or find other permanent housing. DISABILITY SERVICES	CLEARVIEW - LIVING RESOURCES	<p>Fred Erlich, CEO of Living Resources joins us to talk about the work they do. Living Resources been at the forefront of some groundbreaking programs for individuals with developmental disabilities and acquired brain injuries. Most recently, the organization opened the first Barrier-free Smart House in New York State, which is designed to serve people with disabilities while allowing them to maintain an independent lifestyle. Also in the past several years, Living Resources has identified and moved to serve the needs of older members of our community who would prefer to age in place. Very often senior citizens can stay in their own homes provided they have some support services, be they practical or medical in nature. Erlich talks about the cost benefit for the community and client by expanding services to help people stay in their own homes longer. Fred has been with Living Resources since it was founded in 1974.
