



WEEK OF JULY 1

Rotterdam Town Supervisor Harry Buffardi on a boil-water order in effect after 4 water main breaks earlier in the week. In addition, three town employees were hit by lightning while they were working at one of the sites; story about travel during the upcoming 4th of July weekend; murder-suicide in East Greenbush; off-duty New York State Trooper commits suicide; preview of the 4th in Albany, including the first-ever performance by Paul McCartney in Albany; strong storms in the region knock out power in some neighborhoods on the 4th; a town judge in Colonie who reads the Declaration of Independence every 4th of July.

WEEK OF JULY 7

Gov. Cuomo signs bill legalizing medical marijuana in New York state; Albany County Executive Dan McCoy on efforts to restore Lawson Lake County Park and rehabilitate its buildings; cleanup work continuing in Rotterdam after a series of water main breaks; One person dead after a Hudson River rafting bus overturns in Lake Luzerne; Owners of Hoffman's Playland confirm plans to close the amusement park for good at the end of the season in September; 4 people dead after a tornado hits a small community between Utica and Syracuse; Albany mayor Kathy Sheehan on what the city will do after a new fire truck is found to be too heavy for the floor of the station it was supposed to occupy; new program in Albany to make sure kids get a good lunch during the summer; Big crowds in Watervliet as Price Chopper opens a new supermarket on the site of what used to be St. Patrick's Church; unique summer job in Schenectady, as about a dozen students will conduct a "dog census."

WEEK OF JULY 14

Details on an Amtrak train/pedestrian crash in Schenectady, which was later determined to be a suicide; soldiers from the NY National Guard gearing up for annual summer training; Preservation League of New York state has picked 5 vacant industrial buildings, and will help owners get through the process of re-developing them; Great Escape opens Marshal Wild Windy Bill McKay's "jail" as a museum; continuing coverage of the process to land a casino license in upstate NY; a tour bus en route to NYC from Quebec overturns in Essex County, leaving one person dead; Saratoga Race Course opens for the summer; Republican gubernatorial candidate Rob Astorino moves to create his own ballot line.

WEEK OF JULY 21

Coverage of serious crime problems in Troy, beginning with a series of arson fires in a 10-block radius in Lansingburgh; a Bronx man sent to the Albany County jail after police say he sold counterfeit tickets to the Justin Timberlake and Bruno Mars concerts at the Times-Union Center; Conviction of Pablo Cruz on murder charges. He'd been accused in a hit & run crash involving a bicyclist, in which he led police on a chase all the way to Rotterdam, with the victim's body still lodged in his truck; coverage of a New York Times report that supposedly details attempts by the Cuomo administration to shut down the anti-corruption Moreland Commission; The governor, meanwhile, signs a series of bills, including one raising the fine for stealing someone's pet to \$1,000.

WEEK OF JULY 28

Gov. Cuomo defends his handling of the anti-corruption Moreland Commission; city of Albany launches a food drive; group founded by former CNN anchor Campbell Brown challenges New York's teacher

tenure system; Hillary Clinton signs copies of her book in Saratoga Springs; new Siena poll shows only a slim margin of approval for a casino in the Capital Region; Gov. Cuomo announces plans to visit Israel; A Troy police officer arrested on allegations that he tipped off drug dealers when State Police were about to raid a suspected drug house; Lord & Taylor announces plans to open a new store at Crossgates Mall; Reports that US Attorney Preet Bharara in Manhattan is looking into Gov. Cuomo's handling of the Moreland Commission, along with allegations of witness tampering and obstruction of justice; Local "heroes" honored at a Tri-City ValleyCats game; Albany County sheriff Craig Apple announces the largest heroin bust in the county's history.

WEEK OF AUGUST 4

Major power outage in Albany knocks out service to about 5,000 downtown customers; Albany County DA David Soares launches new effort to combat sex trafficking in the Capital Region; DWI story that's a little noteworthy—Albany woman crashes her car into a firehouse on Long Island, drunk, and with a stolen python wrapped around her neck; Coverage of the death of a 2-star general in Afghanistan, who was a native of Guilderland, and a graduate of RPI. Severe flash flooding in a relatively small area of Albany; Sen. Chuck Schumer promises to use his "clout" in Congress to pass legislation that would allow family members of those with physical or developmental disabilities to set up tax-free accounts; On-going coverage of two dogs in Schenectady who attacked and killed a smaller animal. A judge would eventually order both animals euthanized.

WEEK OF AUGUST 11

Details of a double murder and suicide at a home in Palenville, that ended when the gunman, a state parole officer, shot himself while being pursued on I-81 north of Binghamton; Siena poll says most people think corruption is a serious problem in Albany, but few are aware of the Moreland Commission, which Gov. Cuomo shut down earlier this year; judge in Brooklyn rules that Zephyr Teachout is eligible to be on the Democratic primary ballot for governor; NASCAR driver Tony Stewart strikes and kills a fellow driver in Canandaigua after the other driver got out of his car in the middle of a race to challenge Stewart; backers of a casino in East Greenbush hold a job fair—even though the state is still months away from awarding a license; new track announcer, Larry Collmus, introduced at the Saratoga Race Course; state releases results of Math and English exams; police in the North Country investigate the kidnapping of two Amish girls in St. Lawrence County. Two people would later be arrested; city of Albany weighs an offer from Rensselaer mayor Dan Dwyer...\$10 million for your support of a casino on the Hudson riverfront.

WEEK OF AUGUST 18

U.S. Mail carriers in Lansingburgh now have armed escorts from the Postal Service following a series of shootings in the area; city of Glens Falls receives no initial bids for the Civic Center; toddler injured in Northumberland after a speeding car hit a home along route 50; State AFL-CIO not endorsing Gov. Cuomo's re-election effort; Double homicide in Troy, as a man and woman are bludgeoned to death; UAlbany introduces its new athletic director, Mark Benson, who comes from Old Dominion University in Virginia; court appearance in Colonie for a man accused of assaulting a woman as she was walking along Watervliet-Shaker Rd; A permanent home for innovative Tech Valley High School on the campus of SUNY CNSE; new legal twist to a 2012 Northway crash that left two Shen students dead, and two other HS students injured. Families of Chris Stewart and Deanna Rivers have filed wrongful death lawsuits against the man responsible for the crash, Dennis Drue; State takes STAR tax exemption away from about 320,000 homeowners for various reasons; citizens group "Take Back Troy" stages rally to draw attention to problems in the city; coverage of the implosion of the Wellington Annex in downtown Albany—to make way for the city's new convention center.

WEEK OF AUGUST 25

Hiker falls off Poestenkill Gorge in Troy and drowns; Burger King's acquisition of Tim Hortons, and plans to move HQ to Canada, spurs more debate about tax inversion; Troy's mayor and police chief say no to demands to re-instate the Street Crimes Unit after a seemingly non-stop series of shootings in the Lansingburgh neighborhood; Demolition for some vacant buildings along Sheridan Ave in Albany---made infamous after being pictured as a visual clue on "Jeopardy." The subject---urban blight; First excerpts of Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand's new book show some of her colleagues called her "porky" after she had a baby. Another gave her waist a squeeze and said he liked his girls "chubby." Coverage of the 2014 meet at Saratoga winding down, including the retirement of track announcer Tom Durkin; NY Times does not endorse Gov. Cuomo's re-election effort, but *does* endorse Zephyr Teachout's running mate, Tim Wu, for Lt. Gov.

WEEK OF SEPTEMBER 1

Coverage of the start of the new school year in the Capital Region; Divers discover ammunition, possibly from the 1870's, at the bottom of Lake George; Gov. Cuomo signs legislation that will make boat owners responsible for cleaning their craft to ensure that invasive plants or animals don't find their way into a body of water; Gubernatorial debate between Republican Rob Astorino and liberal Democrat Zephyr Teachout. Gov. Cuomo was a no-show; State Education Commissioner John King, Jr. visits a high school in Troy; Reports that the Gideon Putnam Hotel in Saratoga Springs, known for lavish weddings, will now host a \$5000 divorce weekend package.

WEEK OF SEPTEMBER 8

Two people killed in the crash of a single-engine Cessna at the CSX rail yards near the South Albany airport. They're later identified as a flight instructor and his student; Coverage of the September primary election. Gov. Cuomo easily defeats Zephyr Teachout, despite losing convincingly in the Capital Region; SUNY Board of Trustees gives its okay to a new name for CNSE. The new college, consisting of campuses in Albany and Utica, will be the SUNY Polytechnic Institute; Coverage of events and ceremonies marking the 13th anniversary of the 9-11 terror attacks; Albany County Sheriff Craig Apple is furious after two Naval officers try to get through security with something that looks like a bomb; Congressmen Paul Tonko and Chris Gibson react to President Obama's strategy for combating ISIS. Clock ticks down to the end for Hoffman's Playland, but there are reports the rides will be sold to Huck Finn's Warehouse on Erie Blvd. in Albany; 100th anniversary of Thacher Park.

WEEK OF SEPTEMBER 15

DOT launching several initiatives designed to make it safer for pedestrians along Central Ave/State St. from downtown Albany to downtown Schenectady; Guilty plea from a Wynantskill woman charged with killing an elderly man she'd been hired to take care of; Albany Common Council begins discussion of legislation to place red-light cameras at up to 20 intersections in the city; Federal EPA rejects most of Gov. Cuomo's plan to use Clean Water funds to pay for the construction of a new Tappan Zee Bridge; Latin teacher Charles Giglio of Gloversville named New York's Teacher of the Year; Saratoga County DA Jim Murphy resigns in order to ensure continuity for his office as he seeks a county judgeship. Longtime assistant Karen Heggen is sworn in as Acting DA and will seek a full term in November; One step closer for those working for a Congressional Medal of Honor for Albany's Sgt. Henry Johnson; local reaction to the IPO of Alibaba, called the largest in history.

WEEK OF SEPTEMBER 22

State Gaming Facility Board hosting an all-day public comment session on upstate casinos; new Siena poll says we're more concerned about money than ever, and in a lot of case, just barely staying above water; Sen. Chuck Schumer supports a bill to ban the 10 worst toxic flame retardants. FBI Director James Comey visits the Albany field office, and says counter-terrorism is still the Breau's #1 priority.
