



NEWS STORIES REPORT, 1ST QUARTER, 2015

810/103.1 WGY

WEEK OF JANUARY 1

We begin the new year with a major story, and comprehensive coverage on the death of former NY Gov. Mario Cuomo, the father of current Gov. Andrew Cuomo, including reaction from political allies and adversaries. Owners of Kokopellis bar in Troy close the troubled bar, and blame Troy police for their problems. Changes at the top at the State Thruway Authority, and there are indications we may see more on this story in the weeks and months ahead.

WEEK OF JANUARY 5

Funeral services in New York City for former NY Gov. Mario Cuomo; Congressman Chris Gibson announces this will be his last term in office, touching off speculation that he might run against Gov. Cuomo in 2016. Beginning of the 2015 legislative session at the Capitol; In Vermont, thanks to a quirk in state law, the state legislature ends up electing the governor. And in Massachusetts, Charlie Baker takes the oath of office.

WEEK OF JANUARY 12

Town Supervisor in Windham arrested on felony and misdemeanor charges, accused of eavesdropping on town employees; task force releases series of recommendations on future of Albany's Bishop Maginn High School (Bishop Edward Scharfenberger will eventually decide to move the school to the former Cathedral School and sell the current Bishop Maginn building); State Education Department says many schools don't report cases of violent and disruptive behavior in the schools. Gov. Cuomo delivers State of the State speech, and later in the week, unveils a new economic development initiative. 10 arrests at four massage parlors in Colonie, and Sheriff Craig Apple says this is really designed to help identify victims exploited as sex workers; new housing for homeless veterans in Schenectady; demolition begins at the former Beech-Nut factory in Canajoharie.

WEEK OF JANUARY 19

Local reaction to President Obama's State of the Union message; Coverage of the NFL investigation into under-inflated footballs used by the New England Patriots; study from Credit Cards.com finds more than 7 million Americans have a credit card or bank account their spouse doesn't know about. Comprehensive coverage of the arrest and arraignment of Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver, and his subsequent resignation from his leadership post; reaction to the arrest of Sheldon Silver, and a continued call for ethics reform at the Capitol.

WEEK OF JANUARY 26

CDPHP and New York Oncology Hematology reach a deal that ensures cancer patients will be fully covered for NYOH's services; Coverage of New England blizzard, including local Red Cross volunteers; selection of Carl Heastie as Assembly Speaker, local DWI Super Bowl weekend crackdown.

WEEK OF FEBRUARY 2

Truck driver suspected in the death of a state trooper along the Thruway in Montgomery County now facing manslaughter and criminally negligent homicide charges; New Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie promises "much-needed reforms;" Saratoga County preservation group wants to see most of the former Mt. McGregor Prison site transferred to the State Parks office; Group of terminally ill New Yorkers and doctors want to open the door for helping a mentally-competent patient end his or her life;

DOT looking at design alternatives for a section of I-890 in Schenectady; Grand Jury indicts Tiffany Van Alstyne in the death of 5-yr-old Kenny White; One of the owners of the Kokopellis bar in Troy is charged with assault stemming from a shooting at a private party last month; Albany police identify the intersections where red-light cameras will be installed.

WEEK OF FEBRUARY 9

Continued coverage of winter storms, with yet another blast expected for upstate New York and New England; More concern over the so-called “bomb trains” that go through Albany’s South End; Gov. Cuomo is saying he will crack down on delinquent property taxpayers who abuse the STAR rebate program; Court appearance for Tiffany Van Alstyne, charged with killing her cousin, Kenny White; Saratoga County Supervisors passing a measure that will allow limited sales of “sparklers” and other novelty fireworks during certain times of the year; 4-year-old boy struck and killed by a garbage truck in downtown Albany; animal rescue group in Columbia County takes charge of a cat found literally frozen to a county road.

WEEK OF FEBRUARY 16

More winter weather, with brutally cold sub-zero temperatures and wind chills; Search expands for missing Clifton Park teen Henry Ytterburg, eventually found in Florida; Big human interest story from Ithaca, which is, on its web site, suggesting that people visit Florida; Employee of State Office of IT Services indicted on 57 criminal charges for putting in for time when he wasn’t there; new Huck Finn’s Playland will open in Albany’s Warehouse District on Memorial Day; DOT prepping for its first big construction project—replacement of bridges that carry the Northway over Albany-Shaker Rd.; Former Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver indicted on three criminal charges after being arrested in a federal bribery case last month.

WEEK OF FEBRUARY 23

Albany police chief Steven Krokoff announces plans to leave his post, and become chief in Milton, Georgia, north of Atlanta; Report from “Albany Promise” focuses on 4 key issues, early childhood success, 3rd grade literacy, 4th grade math, and college/career success; Gov. Cuomo calls for a crackdown on sexual assaults on college campuses; Assembly Minority Leader Brian Kolb thinks he should be one of the “three men in a room” during the budget process; NY state’s casino location board re-opens bidding from developers for a license in the Southern Tier.

WEEK OF MARCH 2

National Weather Service says February was the coldest in more than 80 years; State Police establish a 24-hr hotline to take reports of sexual assaults on college campuses; Gov. Cuomo pushes his minimum wage proposal; An estimated 13,000 (mostly from NYC) rally at the Capitol for charter schools; Glens Falls Civic Center closes as part of an upper back wall collapsed; Story on the death of Cardinal Edward Egan, former archbishop of NYC Diocese; Delta plane skids off LaGuardia runway as it was attempting to land; Huge fire destroys several apartment buildings on Jay St. in Schenectady. Eventually, the remains of four people are found inside. Cause of the fire is determined to be accidental. NCAA lowers the boom on Syracuse University men’s basketball and Coach Jim Boeheim, reducing scholarships, suspending Boeheim for 9 games, and putting restrictions on recruiting. Boeheim will announce that he is retiring in 3 years.

WEEK OF MARCH 9

Continuing coverage of the aftermath of the Schenectady fire, and the piece-by-piece demolition of the buildings impacted; Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand (D-NY) takes a strong stand in favor of medical marijuana;

State Assembly unveils its \$160 billion "Families First" budget; Albany School Board President Dan Egan says he will challenge incumbent County Executive Dan McCoy in a primary election this fall; Comprehensive coverage of the death, at age 76, of long-time WGY morning show host Don Weeks. "Uncle Don" woke up the Capital Region for 30 years, from 1980 to 2010. Albany's Washington Ave. Armory says no more music events following a brawl on March 6 in which 6 people were stabbed. Coverage of the death of a State Police recruit during a training run. Donald Fredenburg had taken the oath only three days before he collapsed; UAlbany men's and women's basketball teams return to the NCAA tournament....and the story of Peter Hooley goes nationwide. Hooley, whose mother died halfway into the season, hit a 3-point shot with 1.6 seconds to play to give UAlbany the America East championship.

WEEK OF MARCH 16

State Liquor Authority suspends liquor license of Washington Ave. Armory; Armory will announce a total management and security change, and suspend all events; Troy police unveil new anti-gang initiative, aimed at 5th-graders; Schenectady mayor Gary McCarthy declares state of emergency in the area around the apartment buildings that burned on March 6; Albany County Comptroller Mike Conners says he will run for a 6th term, despite a diagnosis of cancer; Gov. Cuomo and Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie cut a 2-way deal on ethics reform; The owner of two Colonie motels has agreed to tear them down and re-develop the properties in exchange for avoiding fines and possible jail time; First day of spring, and we get...snow. UAlbany women and men both lose in the opening round of the NCAA basketball tournament.

WEEK OF MARCH 23

Troy mayor Lou Rosamilia says he will not seek a second term in office; rally at the Capitol for a \$15/hr minimum wage; New future and a new location for Albany's Bishop Maginn HS. School will move to the former Cathedral School on Park Ave, and the Diocese will sell the existing building; A federal judge says Albany County has, again, violated the Voting Rights Act by not creating a 5th County Legislature minority-majority district; Mixed martial arts again being debated in the State Senate; Troy City Council President Rodney Wiltshire says he will seek the mayor's job---despite apparently not having the support of either the city or county Democratic Party, Albany County Family Court judge will decide on April 10 whether Brenda Van Alstyne will regain custody of Kenny White's two surviving sisters; Cohoes mayor George Primeau is not running for a second term. Piping-out ceremony for Albany police chief Steven Krokoff.

WEEK OF MARCH 30

Gov. Cuomo, Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie, and Senate Majority Leader Dean Skelos announce budget deal.
