



WEEK OF APRIL 1

Gov. Cuomo signs the 2014 budget into law---and, as that happens, several thousand gather at the Empire State Plaza to call for the repeal of the SAFE Act; bizarre DWI story out of Bethlehem, as a woman called police and told them she was too drunk to drive. She was. BAC was a .31; fatal fire in Troy, and the victim was a 19-year-old woman who was almost due to give birth; Bethlehem re-assessments and unhappy property owners; Michael Corts, GM of the Washington Ave. Armory, after a court ruling that overturned the city's ban on rave parties; Catholic Diocese says it will keep Bishop Maginn HS right where it is, until at least the end of the 14-15 school year; resignation of Nuskayuna school superintendent Susan Kay Salvaggio.

Ordination ceremony of Bishop Edward Scharfenberger, the new head of the Albany Roman Catholic Diocese; student found dead in UAlbany dorm room—2nd time in 3 weeks; Union hockey coach Rick Bennett named Division I Coach of the Year; home care worker from Wynantskill accused of killing a man she'd been hired to take care of; Green Party gubernatorial candidate Howie Hawkins launches his campaign; Troy fatal fire now determined to be arson; son of Rensselaer's police chief sentenced to 3-9 years in prison for a fatal DWI crash.

WEEK OF APRIL 14

Tax deadline stories; Union College men's hockey team wins NCAA National Championship at Frozen Four in Philadelphia; new president at College of St. Rose; on-going coverage of the closing of North Adams Regional Hospital in Massachusetts; one of a number of on-going stories about the process to locate a casino in the Capital Region; Momentive in Waterford files for Chapter 11 bankruptcy; Sen. Chuck Schumer promises to secure FEMA money to help fix Troy's crumbling seawall; police re-open a cold case—stage search for remains of Scotia teen Craig Frear, who vanished in 2004; missing Schenectady woman found in some brush on the side of a hill in Collins Park in Scotia;

WEEK OF APRIL 21

Continuing coverage of the casino process, as Saratoga Casino & Raceway unveils plans to locate a casino in East Greenbush; Siena poll shows Gov. Cuomo's numbers down a bit, but still leading Republican Rob Astorino by 30 points; NY Post says a "mass exodus" is expected from the Cuomo administration after the November election; Knox man who burned his own house down then prevented firefighters from putting the fire out has been sentenced to 2-7 years in prison, and ordered to make \$150 thousand in restitution; Rep. Chris Gibson launches his re-election bid; a court case keeps the Buffalo Jills cheerleaders off the field.

WEEK OF APRIL 28

Lifetime ban of LA Clippers owner Donald Sterling over racial statements; State legislature deals with a number of bills aimed at putting a dent in New York's heroin epidemic; Lawmakers also continue debate about NY's medical marijuana bill; city of Albany will use a state grant to improve the plaza along Broadway at the foot of the Hudson River walkway; pre-trial preparation for the fraud trial of former Senate Majority Leader Joe Bruno; residents of Albany's South End are calling for an immediate halt to

oil tanker cars carrying crude from North Dakota; National Grid predicting a bit of a spike in electric bills because of a colder-than-normal March; Vermont governor says his state is launching a massive re-paving effort following our tough winter.

WEEK OF MAY 5

On-going coverage through this week and next of the fraud trial of former State Senate Majority Leader Joe Bruno; New York state honors 20 police officers who died in the line of duty, including State Police Trooper David Cunniff, who was killed when his patrol vehicle was hit by a semi while in the midst of a traffic stop along I-88; Albany County legislature seeks local control of so-called "puppy mills." Two arrests in an identity theft scheme at Albany Med. A nurse is accused of using her access to patients to steal personal information; Lt. Gov. Bob Duffy says he will not run for re-election with Andrew Cuomo; Troy's Ark Charter School is fighting SUNY's order that it close because of poor performance.

WEEK OF MAY 12

Former top adviser to Gov. George Pataki—John Cahill—says he will run for attorney general; Officials of Saratoga and Glens Falls Hospitals are looking at "possible opportunities" for collaboration; Canadian Pacific Railroad looking at a fine for waiting 5 hrs to tell anyone about a train derailment at the Port of Albany; Malta man who fell from a scaffold while being chased by Saratoga Springs police last summer has died of his injuries; Republican gubernatorial candidate Rob Astorino names Western NY sheriff Chris Moss as his running mate; Fresh Market opens a second store in Saratoga Springs; Joe Bruno found not guilty of all charges in federal court.

WEEK OF MAY 19

Two people dead after being hit by an Amtrak train in Washington County; an arrest in connection with a disturbing animal abuse story---a horse shot to death with a bow and arrow. Son of the horse's owner is facing charges; virtually all school districts across the region approve school budgets; efforts to pan powdered alcohol from the shelves; Gov. Cuomo names his running mate for the coming campaign—former Buffalo-area congresswoman Kathy Hochul; former Gov. David Paterson named head of the state Democratic Party; controversy over a plan to lengthen the runway at the Saratoga County Airport; wall-to-wall coverage of tornadoes that touched down near Duanesburg in Schenectady County.

WEEK OF MAY 26

Constyruction underway on a new state campground at Schodack Island State Park; Schalmont schools toss out some English and Math test scores, because students may have been exposed to questions from a previous test; bear cub euthanized by the DEC after it was hit by a car and fell out of a tree; fund-raising drive for a World War II veteran whose benefits were cut to \$6.00/month.

WEEK OF JUNE 2

Former Nassau County police officer arrested in Saratoga for killing his wife. Body of Kathleen Wilkinson was found in the house; continuing coverage of the casino process with a public meeting in Schenectady; Fordham Law Professor Zephyr Teachout announces plans to challenge Gov. Cuomo in a Democratic primary this fall; Siena College president Fr. Kevin Mullen resigns to serve as provincial minister of Holy Name Province; a court challenge to Albany County's cyber-bullying law; no plans to re-open Collins Park Beach in Scotia this summer, because of lingering damage from Tropical Storm Irene; reaction to a "D-Day Money Bomb" on behalf of Rob Astorino.

WEEK OF JUNE 9

More coverage of the casino siting process; Trinity Copeland of Troy sentenced to 25-life for killing her father; new plan for a new Rexford Bridge; court appearance for an area priest accused of inappropriate conduct with a 15-year-old girl; Troy police arrest a man for the stabbing death of Amber Fernald.

Schenectady celebrates opening of Mexican Radio restaurant; body of woman who fell out of a raft on the Kayaderosseras Creek found in Ballston Spa; UAlbany's long-time Athletic Director, Lee McElroy, is retiring at the end of the month; SPAC says the New York City Ballet will return with a 2-week residency in 2015; Ellis and St. Peter's announce plans for a new joint venture; mistrial in the Malcolm Smith corruption case; As the legislative session comes to an end, lawmakers reach a deal with Gov. Cuomo on bills to combat the state's heroin epidemic, and to set up a system for medical marijuana for those with debilitating illnesses; two-year moratorium for rating teachers with Common Core test scores; NYRA increases prices at the Saratoga Race Course.

Murder charges against a Saratoga County teenager tossed out after a grand jury rules Matthew Brown was justified for stabbing his mother's fiancé, Derick Clark; mother and son looking at arson charges in Schenectady; 5-member Senate Independent Democratic Conference will establish an alliance with traditional Democrats after the November election; more than 960,000 New Yorkers have signed up for insurance under the state's new marketplace; fire kills 1 in an apartment building in Scotia; 2 dead in Latham—the apparent result of CO poisoning.
