Last year, that number had risen to 152. We go along on this year's survey with Cowlitz Indian Tribe ecologist Nathan Reynolds and Mt St Helens National Volcanic Monument manager Tedd Huffman to look for these charismatic megafauna, with the additional treat of collecting the rare tufts of goat wool that Cowlitz elders once wove into highly valuable blankets.
