LAST STAND OF THE TALLGRASS PRAIRIE chronicles the history of this biome through the Flint Hills of Kansas, the last remaining stretch of the United States' tallgrass prairie. The program is hosted by and features music by musician Lyle Lovett.

Along the way he left his signature on many trees, so hikers can trace his steps today. Muskrats--Trapping wildlife is an issue that still spurs debate, but it's a tradition that's dying out in Oregon. Muskrat trapping, for instance, has gone from being a lucrative business in the 1930s to being a hobby pursued by few. In the Lower Klamath National Wildlife Refuge, on the California-Oregon border, local trapper Pat Collins still sets rat traps, but now his work is serving several functions: It's a form of recreation, a source of income, and a way to keep the rat population in check. For nature lovers who enjoy a walk in the woods or a trip to the zoo, Oregon now has a unique outdoor experience that combines both. Just south of Bandon on the Oregon coast is the West Coast Game Park, the largest wild animal petting park in America, and home to over 450 species.

Their floating research lab is a high-tech boat equipped with the latest sonar technology, capable of measuring incredible detail on the lake bottom almost 2,000 feet below. Orienteering The ability to read maps has been turned into a competition with the sport of orienteering. It began in Europe as a military training exercise, but now orienteering is gaining popularity as a recreational activity for outdoor enthusiasts.
