The hijackers of September 11 led such outwardly ordinary lives they moved through Europe and America virtually unnoticed. They plotted in broad daylight, weaving a web of terror from the simple routines of modern life. American flight schools taught them to fly, local banks helped them move money, libraries provided computers and the Department of Motor Vehicles supplied essential IDs. Everywhere they went they blended in -- unnoticed and unsuspected. FRONTLINE traces the hijackers' movements across four continents, following clues they left behind to unearth the stories of the individuals inside Osama bin Laden's terror network.

Pornography is one of the hottest industries in America and with the growth of films, magazines, retail stores, and the internet, business is booming. With the first jury trial for obscenity since 1993 scheduled to begin this month in Los Angeles, FRONTLINE investigates the battle that will soon engulf the multibillion dollar pornography industry and its distribution partners, some of America's best known corporations.

It was a robbery gone wrong, and when it was over, a woman had been shot in the head. And that's where the problem with this ordinary crime begins. Police apprehended 16-year-old Terence Garner and charged him with the crime. Garner insisted he was innocent. The co-defendants said they had never met him. Another man with the name "Terrance" surfaced and confessed to the crime, then recanted and was let go. FRONTLINE investigates a bizarre case of injustice where two men with the same name are implicated in the same crime and one - Terence Garner -- is sentenced to 32 years in prison.

With unprecedented access to evidence -- including documents, audio tapes and startling footage of murders and mayhem -- FRONTLINE explores the dark side of lawlessness that has crippled this once-proud force.

"Mount Rushmore" A temperamental artist's determination propelled the largest sculptural project in history. Gutzon Borglum directed dozens of ordinary Americans in the creation of what some called a monstrosity and others a masterpiece.

27-Jan-02 900PM - 120 Minutes, Documentary: AMERICAN EXPERIENCE (AMEX 1405) Miss America

This two-hour special tracks America's oldest beauty pageant from its inception in 1921 to paint a vivid picture of an intrinsically American institution. At its core, this is a human story - inspiring, infuriating, poignant and funny. Sherry Jones narrates.

10-Feb-02 1000PM - 60 Minutes, Documentary: AMERICAN EXPERIENCE (AMEX 1208) Jubilee Singers: Sacrifice And Glory

THE AMERICAN EXPERIENCE: Jubilee Singers: Sacrifice and Glory is a documentary about a group of unknown singers from Fisk University in Nashville, Tennessee. The Jubilee Singers perform at many public events trying to win the heart of the nation. Two members of this group are former slaves and others still in their teens. They sing spirituals such as "Steal Away" and religious anthems of slavery. Music historians, Horace Clarence Boyer, John Hope Franklin, Toni Anderson, and Katherine Preston, give insight on the Jubilee Singers and their success across the nation.

19-Feb-02 900PM - 90 Minutes, Documentary: AMERICAN MASTERS (AMMS 1507) Ralph Ellison: An American Journey

AMERICAN MASTERS explores the life and work of influential author Ralph Ellison, whose landmark novel *Invisible Man* won him a lifetime of awards and honors. The program features a tribute from Nobel Laureate Toni Morrison, interviews with critic Stanley Crouch, author Shelby Steele, author and political activist Amiri Baraka and Harvard University Professor Cornel West, rare archival footage, never-before-seen photos from Ellison's family albums and powerful re-creations of scenes from *Invisible Man*, the first time any of the novel has been filmed.

05-Jan-02 1200AM - 17.6 Minutes, Interview/Discussion/Review: CHARLIE ROSE (COSE 010005)

In the second segment, Rose spoke with actress Kristin Scott Thomas about her recent film, "Gosford Park." She talked about her recent return to the stage, her past filmography, why she had wanted to work with Robert Altman for a long time, how she views her character in "Gosford Park," Altman's approach to directing, her admiration for Robert Redford as a director, what makes a bad experience in acting, her upcoming projects, and her work with Kevin Kline in "My Life as a House."

15-Jan-02 1200AM - 8.7 Minutes, Interview/Discussion/Review: CHARLIE ROSE (COSE 010011)

In the third segment, Rose talked with filmmaker Ken Burns about his latest film, "Mark Twain." Burns explained why he decided to use Mark Twain as his latest subject for a film, his interest in the mechanics of American culture, why Mark Twain was considered the funniest man of his time and how he is one of the few 19th century humorists who is still considered funny, the different levels of the life story of Samuel Clemens, the significance of the nomenclature "Mark Twain," how he hopes that the documentary will help prevent "Huckleberry Finn" and Twain's other works from ever being banned again, and how Ken Burns rates this documentary among his other works.

14-Jan-02 800PM - 120 Minutes, Documentary: MARK TWAIN (MKTW 101)

In the first episode, Burns takes viewers on a journey through Sam Clemens' early days along the Mississippi River, to the small river town of Hannibal, Missouri. Clemens grows up, stumbling from adventure to adventure until he begins to evolve into Mark Twain, the humorist and writer who would revolutionize the way Americans viewed themselves and their language. The episode ends with the publication of Adventures of Huckleberry Finn, a novel that has been banned in hundreds of libraries and schools across the country ever since.

15-Jan-02 800PM - 120 Minutes, Documentary: MARK TWAIN (MKTW 102)

In episode two, Burns explores the other side of the writer - an American icon who, through tragedy and bad financial decisions, falls hard with failure. In contrast to the wildly successful Twain, Clemens is an inept businessman who squanders his fortunes on pipe dream patents and bad investments. Clemens turns to the lecture circuit and tours extensively, leaving behind his beloved Hartford home and, often, his family, to pay off his creditors.

02-Jan-02 800PM - 60 Minutes, Documentary: MILL TIMES (MILT) Mill Times

This animated program features a story that centers on a small New England community similar to Pawtucket, Rhode Island, where the first textile mill in America was established by Samuel Slater. The live action segments, hosted by David Macaulay, take us from Manchester, England, to Lowell, Massachusetts. Along the way, the host guides viewers through the technological changes that transformed the making of textiles, which became a key component of the Industrial Revolution that swept across Europe and America in the late 18th century.

OREGON SHAKESPEARE COSTUMER – We'll meet the designer who creates the costumes for the Ashland Shakespeare Festival, and some of the people who help create the magic on stage. MASON WILLIAMS – He composed the Grammy awarded "Classical Gas," and won a Grammy as a comedy writer on the Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour. Williams lives in Eugene and has contributed to Oregon's musical community for decades. PORTLAND TAIKO – Part music and part theater, Portland Taiko combines the modern and traditional in their exuberant performances. We'll take you behind the scenes.
