This last development may have had the most destructive and terrifying effects, giving rise to the Blitz over London, the firebombing of Germany and the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

The jet engine was one of the most defining pieces of mid-20th-century technology. It led to revolutionary change in aerial combat and in the military role of the airplane. Huge risks were taken by designers, test pilots and combat air crews as they pushed the limits of technology and human endurance; when Chuck Yeager broke the elusive sound barrier in 1947, science, secrecy and speed became defining tools of the Cold War. Sabres and MiGs battled in the skies of Korea, high-speed spy planes challenged national boundaries and jet-powered helicopters were integrated into military aviation.

The record-breaking flights, the aerial exhibitions and races, the interviews to support her favorite causes, the endless speeches and promotional commitments, together with household responsibilities, health problems, and financial worries, combined to push Earhart to the point of exhaustion. In 1937, she set out to accomplish yet another first:to circle the earth along the equator on an east-west flight. Friends warned that her preparations were hurried, even careless. When her plane disappeared without a trace, the "First Lady of the Air" was instantly transformed into an American legend.

Description: Ahmet Ertegun, a young Turk - literally - with an immigrant's passion for the African-American music he heard in the rigidly segregated Washington, DC, nightclubs of the 1940s, recognized that "all popular music stems from black music, be it jazz or rock 'n' roll or rap." He exported these unique sounds to England, where they merged with the European sensibility, and then imported that fusion back across the ocean. "The Atlantic Sound," which sprang from the small record label Ertegun co-founded in 1947, was a revolutionary new genre, single-handedly influencing the future direction of contemporary music. Ertegun wrote music, produced music, defined careers and changed lives. "He found Ray Charles, he introduced Eric Clapton to Aretha Franklin, he fell asleep on Mick Jagger," says Rolling Stone founder Jann Wenner in AMERICAN MASTERS "Atlantic Records: The House That Ahmet Built."

During the Revolutionary War, he distinguished himself as a military hero and as General George Washington's most trusted advisor.

As Marshall explains in a blog post from April 3, 2005:"It would have been impossible for me, for instance, to have written most of what I've written on Social Security over the last few months if I didn't have literally thousands of people reading their local papers and letting me know what they're seeing or reporting back from townhall meetings or giving me the heads up on things that are about to break on the hill.
