He says they're going to have to devise a plan to eradicate this creature without hurting any other bugs, trees, plants or creatures.

Brian kept it up for about 7 minutes until Tigard police arrived to take over. TVF&R emergency responders weren't far behind and they got to work. About 17 minutes later, Mark woke up and asked: "where's my bike?" - Brian actions kept blood pumping through Mark's brain and surely saved his life. He had no pulse and would not have made it. Brian wants people to get CPR training because it could end up saving a life.

It's a 115-year-old Portland non profit that provides children's mental health services, as well as programs for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. She offers insight, into the state of mental health services in our country, how to really see it when someone you know or love or care about, is in trouble. And, what you can do about it.
