Art Rocks! The Series

Art Rocks! features Louisiana stories as well as segments from across the country. Each week, the Louisiana Arts Calendar highlights current events throughout our state, and *Louisiana Treasures* – offering a glimpse of items, styles and themes that are unique to Louisiana. The series aims to capture your imagination, introduce you to new artists, and offer close-up views from communities around the country and our own backyard, places where art truly rocks!

Great Performances: Making Shakespeare - The First Folio

It is part of LPB's commitment to showcasing Louisiana's unique French culture and heritage.

Behind the Glory

In this limited series, LPB visits with the 2023 inductees into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame for indepth conversations and presents stories that transcend the sport. Also featured are weightlifting great health Imahara, sports journalist Lori Lyons, and baseball legend Ron Washington.

Taste of Louisiana with Chef John Folse & Company

Papa Noel: The Legacy of the Levee Bonfires

This program explores the rich history behind the annual St. James Parish holiday bonfire tradition. This ritualistic Christmas Eve celebration, which dates to the 1800s, is told through personal interviews and storytelling sessions as the people of St. James Parish share what has been passed down generation after generation. For three weeks, the producer joined families and bonfire clubs as they prepared, joining in on everything from sourcing materials to the construction of their elaborate structures. It all culminates as crowds gather to witness the lighting of the bonfires.

Though the grants focus on housing and economic growth, the Chairman says the real goal is to create a self-sufficient Native community. In this segment, LPB's Kara St. Cyr sits with Chairman Pierite as he explains his goals for the Tunica-Biloxi Tribe.

Walter Anderson: The Extraordinary Life and Art of the Islander

Why Louisiana Ain't Mississippi... or Any Place Else!: Part I

Louisiana is a human gumbo that exists nowhere else in America. This two-part documentary series shares the story of Louisiana's disproportionate contribution to America's music, arts, sports, history, and politics. You can't talk about Louisiana without talking about water, especially the mighty Mississippi River. In Part I, we begin at Louisiana's beginning, exploring places such as Poverty Point, the swamps of Acadiana and visit the Coushatta Pow-Wow. Plus, the founding of New Orleans, which becomes the port gateway to the New World long before Ellis Island.

Why Louisiana Ain't Mississippi... or Any Place Else!: Part II

Our storytelling adventure continues, as we take viewers from one end of the state to the other to show you all the ways Louisiana is a jewel, not just to those of us who live here, but to the entire world. More people come to Louisiana from all parts of the world producing an amazing culture full of talented artists, soulful musicians, bombastic politicians, and some of the biggest names in sports. Explore our history through the stories of Shreveport's Municipal Auditorium, the rich New Orleans music scene with Irma Thomas, Winnfield's Louisiana Political Museum and more.

Finding Cajun

It also explores how cultural and racial labels in Louisiana have shifted, especially over the past 70 years, and considers the stakes of maintaining (or losing) heritage languages in the United States.

Louisiana has the highest maternal mortality rate in the United States, with 66.8 deaths per 100,000 live births in 2020. Lack of access to quality health care, racial disparities, and social determinants of health are all factors in Louisiana's poor maternal health outcomes. To combat these dismal numbers, the Louisiana Department of Health, private organizations, and advocacy groups have developed solutions they believe will improve the state's maternal health.

The American Buffalo

Ken Burns and the team at Florentine Films return with this two-night, four-hour dramatic story of the near extinction and improbable rescue of America's national mammal. Once numbering in the tens of millions and sustaining the Native people of the Great Plains for untold generations, the buffalo was driven to the brink of extinction. But then an unlikely collection of people rescues it from disappearing forever. Ken Burns recounts the tragic collision of two opposing views of the natural world—and the unforgettable characters who pointed the nation in a different direction.

A cold front this week should bring some relief from the swarms of mosquitos that have descended on homes and backyards around the state. Louisiana is experiencing a proliferation of the mosquito population, which defies the conventional wisdom that when the temperatures dip, the mosquitos disappear.
