News & Views for January 2, 2022

Guests: Prof. Gene Nichol and Heather Hunt of the N.C. Poverty Research Fund at UNC Law School

A new report from researchers Gene Nichol and Heather Hunt of the N.C. Poverty Research Fund at UNC Law School examines the scandal of child poverty and hunger in North Carolina. The report is called "The persistent and pervasive challenge of child poverty and hunger in North Carolina," and in it, Nichol and Hunt delve into the sobering facts and data surrounding this persistently dire situation and present numerous powerful observations and human stories shared by an array of interviewees with firsthand experience in serving people in need.

Though it tells a sobering story, this report constitutes the latest in a long line of 'must reads' from the Nichol/Hunt team and deserves to be an essential resource for local, state and federal policymakers, human service providers, advocates, academics, journalists, and all North Carolinians who desire to make their state a better place to live.

Recently, I caught up with Nichol and Hunt for an extended conversation and in Part One we discussed some of sobering statistics from their report – including the remarkable fact that one-in-five North Carolina children are living in poverty.

In Part Two of our conversation, Nichol and Hunt related some of the stories and observations they collected from a number of heroic service providers working to combat poverty in our state and also shared their take some current law and policy debates – like the longstanding Leandro school funding case and proposals to extend the federal child tax credit – with the potential to make a real impact on the problem.

2. ENVIROMENT

News and Views for January 9, 2022

One wishes it weren't so, but it's beyond debate at this point that the environmental crisis confronting our state, nation, and planet figure to grow even more daunting in 2022. Whether it's the global climate emergency and the massive new demands it's placing on public infrastructure, the rapidly expanding problem of water polluted with PFAS, or the unintended consequences of even well-meaning plans like the effort to convert hog waste to biogas, environmental challenges (and the policy debates to which they give rise) will be much in the news in the coming year.

Fortunately for North Carolinians, we're lucky to have one the of the nation's best and most experienced environmental journalists closely monitoring these issues in NC Policy Watch environmental reporter, Lisa Sorg. And earlier this week we caught up with Lisa to take a brief look ahead at some of the issues she'll be watching closely in the new year.

3. DOMESTIC TERRORISM

News and Views for January 16, 2022

Guests: Congressman David Price and Professor David Schanzer, a Duke University expert in domestic terrorism

America marked the one-year anniversary of the deadly attack on the U.S. Capitol last week with a number of commemorative events across the country.

In Washington, there were moments of silence on the floors of both the House and Senate, followed by calls to heal a divided nation.

One of the most thoughtful reflections on the January 6th incursion came in a special online conversation hosted by veteran North Carolina Congressman David Price with Duke University Professor David Schanzer of the Sanford School of Public Policy. Schanzer is also the Director of the Triangle Center on Terrorism and Homeland Security.

Professor Schanzer believes that what we witnessed that day was evidence of a growing domestic terrorist movement, with Donald Trump using incendiary rhetoric to stoke violence and overturn the legitimate results of the 2020 presidential election. Price and Schanzer discuss why events of that day cannot be dismissed and how current moves in state legislatures could be used to used to block legitimate votes from being counted. Both men also discuss risks to our democracy if the truth of the January 6th incursion is not made widely public. The bipartisan House Select Committee investigating the January 6 Capitol Hill riots is expected to release an interim report on the events later this summer.

4. HEALTH News and Views for JANUARY 22, 2022

Guest: Veteran health policy journalist Rose Hoban We're now closing in on the two-year anniversary of the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic in the U.S. and thanks to the recent rise of the extremely contagious omicron variant of the virus, it's clear we're not out of the woods yet. Indeed, the latest reports from public health officials show that North Carolina is shattering previous records for infections and hospitalizations and it's quite possible that the death rate could spike to new heights as well in the coming days. And while many people have taken some solace from the fact that many infected individuals are displaying less severe symptoms than with previous COVID variants, this may not be a function of the virus itself. As veteran health policy journalist Rose Hoban of North Carolina Health News told us in a conversation we had earlier this week, there's reason to suspect that widespread vaccinations and other advances we've made in treatment are likely what's been saving us of late from a truly catastrophic situation.

5. JUSTICE News and Views for JANUARY 30TH 2022

Guest: Attorney Yurij Rudensky of the Brennan Center for Justice The issue of political gerrymandering has been much in the news of late across the country with the enactment by several state legislatures – including North Carolina's – of maps designed to rig electoral outcomes and disenfranchise voters of color. Proposed legislation in Washington would have gone a long way toward ending this noxious practice, but it ultimately came up short thanks to the Senate's arcane filibuster rule. Recently, in order to get a better handle on where things stand – including in North Carolina where the state Supreme Court will hear a challenge this week to the state's new legislative and congressional maps, we caught up with one of the nation's top experts on the subject – attorney and redistricting specialist Yurij Rudensky of the New York-based Brennan Center for Justice.

6. CONGRESS News and Views for FEBRUARY 6TH, 2022

Guest: Congresswoman Deborah Ross

Last January 3rd, Raleigh lawyer Deborah Ross was sworn in to her first term in Congress, and to describe the 13 intervening months as extraordinary would be an understatement. Between the U.S. Capitol insurrection, the pandemic, the political strife fomented by former President Trump, the blatant gerrymandering undertaken by North Carolina Republicans, and dozens of other controversies, Ross has endured a unique initiation to Washington politics.

To her great credit, however, Ross has coped with this challenging situation by turning her office into a veritable beehive of activity. Not only has she spoken out on scores of issues, helped funnel millions in federal relief to North Carolina, and provided service to remarkable number of constituents, she's actually sponsored and passed legislation into law – something that's extremely rare for a first-year lawmaker.

Earlier this week, the congresswoman took a few minutes from her busy schedule to share with us some of her reflections on this tumultuous past year as well as some of the issues on the policy front burner at the start of 2022. Issues discussed: pandemic, economic recovery, redistricting, the U.S. Supreme Court's vacancy, and the future of the Equal Rights Amendment.

traditional schools. What's more, a number of charters have run
into serious problems.

Recently, NC Policy Watch education reporter Greg Childress reported on an eastern North Carolina charter called Three Rivers

Academy that allegedly padded enrollment numbers, paid families so students would attend class, fudged student records, and took other troubling actions to keep state funds flowing. Earlier this week, we sat down with Childress to discuss the situation at Three Rivers and why state officials are so concerned.

It's been almost a decade now since President Obama and a Democratic Congress enacted the Affordable Care Act. Since that time, 38 U.S. states have taken advantage of the law to expand their Medicaid programs to cover millions of Americans who had been trapped in the coverage gap – with incomes too low to afford private insurance and too high to qualify for public subsidies.

Unfortunately, North Carolina Republican legislative leaders have kept our state as one of the holdouts – a decision that's left hundreds of thousands of working people uninsured and led to thousands of premature deaths. Now, however things may finally be changing. A GOP-led legislative committee is looking at finally expanding Medicaid in our state and recently we got a chance to get an update on this issue -- as well as the latest on redistricting and the pandemic -- with veteran Durham County-based state Senator, Mike Woodard.

Well, another election year is upon us and now that the state's gerrymandered electoral maps have been made at least somewhat fairer, the 2022 primary election is less than two months away.

And while the gaps between Democrats and Republicans appear to remain as wide as ever, they aren't the only divisions that will be on display for voters in the coming weeks. In the GOP, for instance, candidates loyal to Donald Trump and his outrageous claims about the 2020 election and admiration for Vladimir Putin will do battle in some instances with those who reject such extreme stances.

Earlier this week we sat down for a special two-part conversation with one of the state's top electoral observers, Meredith College political science professor and pollster, David McLennan. In Part One of our chat, McLennan shared his thoughts on, among other things the Democratic and GOP Senate primaries and some of the key races in the state's newly configured congressional map.

In Part Two of our conversation, we dug into some of the other congressional races, and also examined some bigger issues impacting our politics in 2022 – including the ongoing growth in unaffiliated voters, the huge and negative ongoing effects of gerrymandering, the impact of Russia's war on Ukraine and the hardships it's helped cause for the U.S. economy, and the worrisome and unfounded decline in voter confidence in elections that's given rise to harassment and even threats against election officials.
