SILENT SACRIFICE shares the experiences of Japanese Americans who were living in the San Joaquin Valley prior to Executive Order 9066. Interviewees discuss what drew them to the area, the businesses and farms their families established, and both the discrimination many faced in their adopted land as well as the friendships they formed. They then reveal the shock and confusion felt in the immediate aftermath of Pearl Harbor and the tragic and disorienting uprooting of lives as families were forced to abandon their homes and move into temporary assembly centers before being sent to permanent internment camps.

For the next decade, this "awakening" took hold, state by state, until the 19th amendment to the U.S. Constitution was ratified. After a 70-year struggle, American women finally had the right to vote. Courage in Corsets: Winning the Vote in Washington State is the story of the women whose personal courage, political savvy and sheer tenacity won the vote for all women in Washington. It is the story of women of all races, creeds, and economic status who struggled together to improve the quality of life for themselves and their communities; who convinced men of the benefits of women's voting rights; and who brought new life to the national campaign. The story of these courageous women profoundly affects every woman in America today.
