Health & Education	Report: Alcohol And Drug Related Deaths Decreasing In Iowa	Statewide	<i>Morning Edition/All Things Considered</i>	5/26/20:5a-10p	:45	A new report by the non-profit Trust for America's health found that drug-related deaths rates in Iowa decreased by 15 percent while alcohol-related deaths decreased by 4 percent from 2017 to 2018. The report found opioid-related deaths decreased by 31 percent, synthetic opioid-related deaths decreased by 13 percent and cocaine-related deaths decreased by 32 percent. However, Iowa saw a 4 percent increase in other psychostimulant-related overdoses for drugs like meth.
