The concern is the actual total could be ten times higher. For many victims, the trafficker comes in from outside the family. A proposed new Interstate Ten Bridge across Mobile Bay is on hold and matters may get worse tomorrow. The Mobile Planning Organization decided to not vote on whether to include the bridge on its list of projects. That inclusion is needed if the project is going to get federal funding. Tolls on the new bridge and where the overflow traffic may go are just some of the issues that has local motorists buzzing. APR Gulf Coast

8/29 Selling kids: How it happened to me.

For the past thirteen months, the APR news team has been investigating human trafficking in Alabama. Support groups for trafficking survivors say one thing they deal with are misconceptions. For example, they cite the belief that most sex trafficking victims are foreign nationals. A study by the U.S. Department of Justice says over eighty percent of sex trafficking victims in the United States are U.S. citizens. In part four of our ongoing series, APR's Pat Duggins spoke with women who represent two generations of trafficking survivors on how it happened to them.
