The University of Alabama's board of trustees will consider whether to return a record \$21.5M gift. The donor encouraged students to boycott the university following passage of Alabama's controversial abortion law that makes performing an abortion a felony in virtually all cases. The legal battle over the Alabama's abortion ban officially got underway last week. Both the American Civil Liberties Union of Alabama and Planned Parenthood Southeast filed suit on behalf of the state's three abortion clinics. They say the new law is blatantly unconstitutional.
