Schemes		<p>Issue: Sextortion is a crime because it is illegal and wrong for an adult to ask for pay for demand graphic images from a minor, yet this is happening at an increasing rate. The criminal targets youth online, usually males, pretending to be friendly or want an intimate relationship. As soon as the youth sends the images, that is when the harassment and threats of violence or exposure begin. The FBI's campaign to stop 'sextortion' aims to educate caregivers and youth and give them resources if they have been the victim of this type of crime.</p>

An easy reporting system to report crimes and how effective it is	Bonneville Crime Stoppers	<p>Bonneville Crime Stoppers recently expanded to serve 17 counties and is now called East Idaho Crime Stoppers.</p> <p>Issue: East Idaho Crime stoppers is a free, completely anonymous tip line that helps law enforcement, local agencies and citizens collaborate to stop crime in East Idaho communities. East Idaho Crime Stoppers wants to let citizens know how effective the program is at stopping crime and how individuals can help by submitting tips or donating at IFcrime.org</p>	This aired on all listed stations on 2.12.23 between 6-7am 9 minutes
Unclaimed Property	Idaho State Treasurers Office	<p>Topic: Neal Larson and Julie Mason interview Idaho State Treasurer Julie Ellsworth about unclaimed property.</p> <p>Issue: Idaho State Treasurer's office oversees \$228 million of unclaimed property in Idaho and is making a push to get it back to its rightful owners. People can go to yourmoney.idaho.gov and search their name to see if there is any unclaimed property for them to claim. Fentanyl Abuse in Eastern Idaho Statistics from the DEA	Bonneville County Sheriff Office	<p>Topic: Heather Sampson interviews Bonneville County Sheriff Samuel Hulse about the phytanyl crisis.</p> <p>Issue: Sheriff Hulse shares the DEA statistic that 60% of "dirty thirty" pills are lethal. The pills look like a pharmaceutical OxyContin 30mg pill, but fentanyl is getting into most other illicit drugs as well. Over 120,000 people have died from fentanyl in the last year. Sheriff Hulse wants to educate the public about the dangers of fentanyl, encourage those with opiate addictions to seek recovery, encourage the public to report any trafficking they witness, and encourage citizens to contact their representatives and push for a proposed mandatory minimum trafficking weight for fentanyl to be added to Idaho law.
