This year, Ohio joined more than 20 other states in banning the sentence in most cases with Senate Bill 256. The Bill allows juveniles a parole hearing after serving 18 years, or if serving time for homicide, a hearing after 25 to 30 years.</p>

But while communities can use covid funds to hire more officers, the former Police Captain argues that can't be the only solution. Independent researchers warned an Israeli spyware company, N-O-S Group, developed a tool to secretly take control of nearly any Apple computer, Iphone or watch. Experts call it a "Zero-click Exploit" because it does not require a user to click on a link or download a file to allow someone to take over their device. Instead, the spyware exploits a flaw in the Imessage app, allowing others to gain control of the device without the user knowing they've been hacked.
