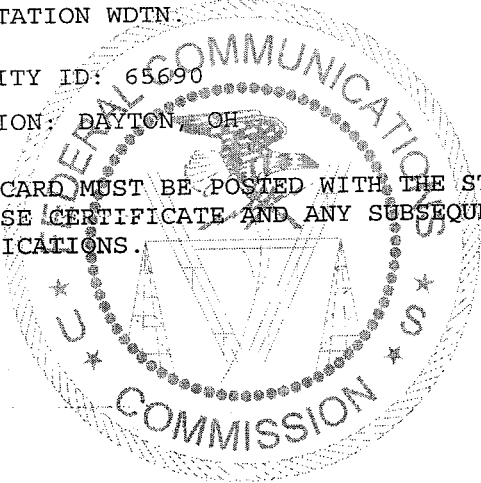

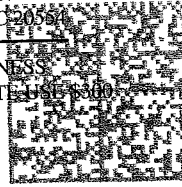

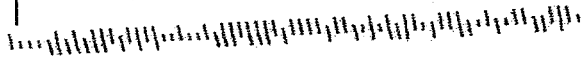

On Wednesday, January 4, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, other cities are also being considered for the Montgomery County Fair. Trotwood Mayor Mary McDonald hopes fair officials consider her city. She says the event would boost Trotwood's growing economy, five months after the city took a major hit with the closing of Hara Arena. This report lasted 15 seconds.

On Monday, January 16, 2017, at 11pm, **WDTN News** reported, the 15th annual Flyin' to The Hoop wrapped up tonight. The event showcases the best high school basketball players in the Nation and here at home. Organizers say this event brings in about two million dollars each year to the local economy. 20-thousand people came out to watch the games over the holiday weekend. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Thursday, January 19, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, two new Chick-Fil-A locations are now open in the Miami Valley. Doors opened at 6 this morning in Kettering and Troy. People camped out overnight because the first 100 people in line got free Chick-Fil-A sandwiches for a year. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Friday, January 27, 2017, at 6pm, **WDTN News** reported, a local training company expands to a new facility and increases its class

offerings. Promark Custom Training Solutions will now offer more than 3-thousand hands-on classes for businesses and organizations of any size. The goal is so they can receive the same high quality training in business skills as larger corporations. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Friday, February 3, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, the U-S economy added 227-thousand jobs in January, exceeding economist predictions. The Labor Department conducted the job survey during the second week of the month, while President Obama was still in office. President Trump has promised to create 25 million jobs in the next 10 years. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Monday, February 13, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, tens of thousands of protesters took to the streets in several Mexican cities yesterday opposing President Trump and his policies. A fake wall went up in Mexico City to protest the President's immigration stance and plans to build a border wall. On Thursday, January 12, 2017, at 6pm, **WDTN News** reported, a Fairborn man is behind bars after a drug investigation. The Fairborn Police Department and Greene County Ace Drug Task Force served a search warrant in the 11-hundred block of Adams Street. They found a possible meth lab. And police are looking for William Estep. If you know where he is, call Fairborn Police. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Tuesday, January 24, 2017, at 4:30pm, **WDTN News** reported, Dayton Police put three men behind bars Monday after a drug bust. Donald Mills, Donald Smith, and Robert Goodson, were all arrested on charges related to trafficking. The Montgomery County Range Task Force served two search warrants, one on Tampa Avenue and another on Glenwood Avenue. There, the found meth, a "large quantity" of heroin and marijuana and "several thousand" dollars in cash. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Thursday, January 26, 2017, at 11pm, **WDTN News** reported, Huber Heights Police are looking for three shooting suspects. It happened in the 48-hundred block of Neptune Drive. Police are calling this a home invasion and they say the suspects are all white males when they arrived on the scene this morning, they found a man inside his home with a gunshot wound to the leg. Officers with k-9's searched the area but came away empty-handed. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Friday, January 27, 2017, at 11pm, **WDTN News** reported, according to the police report, a suspect broke through the window pane of a door and got inside Brim Hat Store on East Fifth Street. Deantre Reece and Robert Wallace Junior were arrested Tuesday on possession charges. Both are currently in the Montgomery County Jail. SWAT Officers and Narcotics Bureau Detectives raided a home in the 12-hundred block of West First Street. They say they found drugs, three guns, drug paraphernalia and cash inside. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Friday, February, 10, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, the children of an Arizona woman who was ordered deported during an immigration check-in Wednesday are now with her in Mexico. The undocumented immigrant was detained Wednesday and deported within 24 hours. Her lawyer claims it's a direct result of President Trump's crackdown on illegal immigration. The woman was convicted eight years ago of working here illegally. U-S Customs Enforcement Officials say she committed a crime, was placed under a deportation order and her time had come. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Monday, February 13, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, Senator Rob Portman meets with local law enforcement to talk about the

ongoing fight against our drug epidemic. This week, the senator will introduce the "Synthetics Trafficking and Overdose Prevention Act." It's designed to help stop dangerous synthetic drugs Fentanyl and Carfentanil from being shipped from overseas through the U-S Mail system. It would require information on shipments from foreign countries before they enter the U-S. Just since last year, overdoses in Montgomery County have doubled. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Friday, March 10, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, an airline passenger arriving from the Dominican Republic was busted at New York's JFK Airport for smuggling drugs in his pants. Juan Carlos Galan Luperson, a U-S citizen, seemed nervous and his pants seemed tight. Border Patrol Officers found packages of cocaine strapped to both of his legs. Luperon now faces federal narcotics smuggling charges. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Monday, March 13, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, a Cincinnati officer and suspect were sent to the hospital after a shoot out. The officer and suspect are both expected to survive. The suspect in that shooting is 37 year old Damion McRae. The identity of the officer has not been released. This report lasted 15 seconds.

On Thursday, March 23, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, police found "Marijuana Kool-Aid" and high-grade marijuana during a traffic stop in Summit County. Troopers say they stopped a Chevrolet Impala for speeding and lane violations on March 16th on the Ohio Turnpike. Officials say the drugs are valued at 10-thousand dollars. 23-year-old

Kyle Simms of Michigan was charged with trafficking. This report lasted 20 seconds.

WDTN addressing EMPLOYMENT ISSUES/JOBs during the First Quarter of 2017. The issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming and other programming listed below:

On Friday, January 6, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, 20-16 ended on a high note when it comes to jobs. The U-S added 156-thousand new jobs last month according to the Labor Department. That's the 75th straight month U-S Employers added jobs. The unemployment rate rose to 4-point-7 percent up from November's 4-point-6 percent. And worker pay rose at the fastest rate since the recession in 2007. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Thursday, January 19, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, the Labor Department's weekly jobless report shows fewer people applied for unemployment benefits last week. According to the report, 234-thousand people applied for jobless aid, the lowest since November 1973. Some economists say the low totals suggest that businesses are confident about the future and holding on to employees. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Tuesday, January 24, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, the grocery chain is set to hire ten-thousand workers in jobs ranging from part-time clerks and cashiers to department heads and assistant store managers. The hiring spree follows a year that saw Kroger add 12-thousand new employees last year. The grocery chain is the fifth-largest employer in the Dayton region. This report lasted 15 seconds.

On Friday, January 27, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, Ohio Governor John Kasich says efforts to create jobs in the state have been successful. To build on that effort, the Governor announced a 45-million-dollar grant to improve driverless car and smart road technology. Kasich says private sector jobs have been growing since he took office. Governor Kasich says the grant will help Ohio become a leader in the future of the automotive industry. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Tuesday, February 7, 2017, at 4:30pm, **WDTN News** reported, a ribbon cutting and grand opening ceremony is happening at 9 this morning for the new Love's Travel Stop in Springfield. It's in the 1700 hundred block of Ridge Road. The 7 point 5 mil project is bringing 60 jobs to Clark County. It includes parking for 100 trucks, shower areas for drivers and two 24 hour restaurants. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Thursday, February 9, 2017 at 6pm, **WDTN News** reported, a local medical manufacturing facility will hire hundreds more people this year. Our partners at the Dayton Business Journal report Nuvasive needs 200 new employees. It's moving some operations from a Fairborn site to West Carrollton. The plant will make spinal implants and other medical devices. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Wednesday, February 15, 2017 at 11pm, **WDTN News** reported, the Dayton City Commission approved 750-thousand dollar grant tonight to help re-purpose the McCall Street building. It's been vacant for 6 years. Recently it was sold to the Phoenix Investment Group for 300-thousand

dollars. They hope to attract manufacturing companies to the facility, and ultimately bring jobs to the area. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Thursday, February 23, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, top story number 5, Kettering plans to hire more than 350 people this summer for seasonal and part-time positions to help maintain Kettering Summer Programs and Parks. Kettering city officials say they will update their website soon with the new job postings. You can find a link to their job page on our website, WDTN dot com. And that's a look at our top five stories today. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Wednesday, March 8, 2017, at 5pm, WDTN News reported, the Wright Patterson Air Force Base event begins at 7p-m, with a networking reception. They will also hold a hiring fair tomorrow from 10a-m til one p-m. It is being held at the Hope Hotel Richard C Holbrooke Conference Center . It is open to all military spouses, employers, and service organizations. Veterans are also welcome to attend. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Friday, March 17, 2017, at 11pm, **WDTN News** reported, Hopkins resigned as President effective today, he said to ensure a smooth transition for the next President. He was scheduled to retire June 30th. The announcement comes amid the University's ongoing budget crisis. Wright State laid off 23 employees last year and more budget cuts and layoffs are expected to be announced in April. The Board of Trustees appointed Curtis McCreary as interim President. On Tuesday, January 17, 2017, at 11pm, **WDTN News** reported, President-Elect Trump's nominee for Secretary of Education had a senate confirmation today. Betsy DeVos testified that a one-size-fits all model of learning doesn't work. The Michigan Businesswoman also said she would promote alternatives to public schools, including charter, magnet and religious schools, if she is confirmed. Teachers Unions claim DeVos would try to destroy public education. The committee chairman says he believes she's on the side of children. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Thursday, January 19, 2017, at 11pm, **WDTN News** reported, more teachers will be able to get school supplies for their classrooms, thanks to an initiative from Walmart. Local representatives presented Dayton Crayons to Classrooms with a 25-thousand dollar grant. The organization is a free resource center for teachers serving students who can't afford school supplies. The funding comes from the Walmart Foundation's Ohio State Giving Council. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Tuesday, January 24, 2017, at 6pm, **WDTN News** reported, students returned to class today for the first time since the shooting Friday morning. The school day started on a one-hour delay. Staff members joined them on school buses. Law enforcement greeted them this morning. Teachers and Counselors talked with the kids about the

shooting. The Superintendent says attendance was high. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Thursday, January 26, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, for the first time in more than two decades, Graham Local Schools will ask residents for additional funding. The district plans to put an income tax levy on the November ballot. The Superintendent says if they don't get more money, the quality of education and financial stability of the district will suffer. The board will finalize the ballot issue over the next few weeks. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Friday, February 10, 2017 at 6pm, at 6pm, **WDTN News** reported, a state panel recommends drug education for students in Kindergarten through 12th grade. The Ohio Joint Study Committee on Drug Use Prevention announced a list of 15 recommendations. They include social and emotional courses, partnering with law enforcement on prevention efforts, and before-and-after school programs on drug-free lifestyles. This report lasted 15 seconds.

On Sunday, February 12, 2017, at 6pm, **WDTN News** reported, the Department of Education gets schooled after a series of twitter errors. It all started when the department's official Twitter account sent a tweet misspelling W-E-B Du Bois' name. A tweet apologizing for the misspelling had an error as well. A short time later yet another tweet with an apology was sent. This time they got it right, the tweet reading, "our deepest apologies." This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Wednesday, February 22, 2017, at 4:30pm, **WDTN News** reported, The University of Dayton is joining a national education effort about violence. It's called "Green Dot Week" at U-D. The University is hosting a series of events for faculty, staff and students to attend that raise awareness about violence on and off campus. The Green Dot symbolizes any choice, behavior, or action they can take to promote safety. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Monday, March 6, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, the West Carrollton City School District Board of Education will start their interview process today. Applications for Superintendent were accepted through last week. Dr. Rusty Clifford announced his resignation from the position early last month after 18 years on the job. Interviews will be conducted through mid-April, the board hopes to announce the new Superintendent in May. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Friday, March 10, 2017, at 6pm, **WDTN News** reported, a Board of Education died unexpectedly today, when he was at the U-D Basketball game in Pittsburgh. Bruce Sucher was the President for Vandalia-Butler schools, and the President says they learned of his passing just after 12-30 today. The school says it has a plan to help staff and students cope with the loss but has no further information on how it will affect the future of the board. In a statement, the school said Mr. Sucher's passing is a unimaginable tragedy for this family, our district and the entire Vandalia-Butler community. Our thoughts and prayers go out to the Sucher family at this time of grief and healing.

On Sunday March 12, 2017, at 11pm, **WDTN News** reported, a human trafficking education session will be held at The University of Dayton this week. The event is called "My Freedom Day" and is a part of the C-N-N's Freedom Project to raise awareness about human trafficking. There will be eight stations and an interactive life sized board game showcasing the life of a victim. The University of Dayton's Anti-Human Trafficking Director Tony Talbott says it's an important event because human trafficking is happening here in the Miami Valley. He hopes area teachers and students will attend. This report lasted 30 seconds.

WDTN addressing HOUSING ISSUES/FORECLOSURE during the First Quarter of 2017. The issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming and other programming listed below:

On Monday, January 26, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, heavy rainstorms battering California this week destroyed a Santa Barbara County Beach. The storm caused trees to fall on homes and left a mess on local roads. Truckloads of sand came in Wednesday to help replenish the coastline, but one resident says that's not enough. This report lasted 15 seconds.

On Sunday, January 29, 2017, at 11pm, **WDTN News** reported, Homestay service, Air B-N-B, is offering free housing to the U-S. The C-E-O wrote on Twitter Saturday opening his offer to anyone denied U-S entry under President Trump's executive order. No timeline yet as to when or how these accommodations will be provided, but the CEO urged travelers who need emergency housing to contact him. According to the company's website, Air B-N-B operates in more than 191 countries. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Monday, February 6, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, Air B-N-B is promising to provide short-term housing for the next five years for 100-thousand people in need. The company says it plans to offer the service to refugees and immigrants and then others who are displaced. AirBNB's C-E-O says they purchased a Super Bowl spot Thursday to make the political statement. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Wednesday, February 8, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, and a California home was destroyed yesterday morning by a landslide. A police officer captured this video the moment the home collapsed. The two-story house was inundated by a wall of mud that tore through its walls, snapped support beams and compromised the foundation. The homeowner says everyone got out okay. Two neighboring homes have been deemed unsafe. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Monday, February 13, 2017, at 6pm, **WDTN News** reported, 200-thousand people in Northern California are ordered to evacuate after authorities found a hole in the emergency spillway at the nation's largest dam. Failure could send a 30-foot wall of water into the communities. The water levels here have been cropped for now, but more rain is expected later this week. Officials are working to repair the damage before then. They're developing a plan to allow residents to return to their homes. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Tuesday, February 28, 2017, at 11pm, **WDTN News** reported, crews in Middletown are working to close a sinkhole that opened in the middle of a street. It happened this morning at an intersection after a water main collapsed, causing the 20 foot hole, the size of a dump truck. Dozens of home are without water, and a sewer line broke, making the situation even worse. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Monday, March 10, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, a severe storm swept through the Tennessee Valley this morning, destroying homes, trees and power lines. One home was also hit by a tree that

was hit by lightning, causing it to burn down. No injuries were reported. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Thursday, March 16, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, a new, 10 million dollar senior housing development is coming to Dayton. This comes to us from our partners at The Dayton Business Journal. Here's a rendering of what it's expected to look like. It'll be built on the vacant lot off Edgewood Avenue, near Salem. D-B-J reports the three story, 50 unit building will have 22 units being used for public housing. The city says it's designed to keep the neighborhood-feel intact. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Monday, March 21, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, crews in Kansas are still on the scene of a massive fire that destroyed an apartment building and damaged more than a dozen homes. The huge fire started Monday afternoon at an apartment building under construction near Kansas City. Strong winds sent embers from the fire to a nearby neighborhood, catching 17 homes and buildings on fire. Many were destroyed, while others were badly damaged. This report lasted 25 minutes.

On Thursday, March 30, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, according to a new report U-S home affordability has hit an eight-year low. It shows during the first quarter of the year one in four housing markets were "less" affordable than historic norms. Analysts point to continued strong growth in home prices, combined with the recent rise in mortgage rates. This report lasted 25 seconds.

WDTN addressing SOCIAL WELFARE/HEALTH during the First Quarter of 2017. The issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming and other programming listed below:

On Wednesday, January 25, 2017 at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, Brightwood College held a free community health fare. The event featured program demonstrations, blood pressure checks, and even brushing and flossing demonstrations. Organizers say it's part of their commitment to the health of Dayton residents, as well as prepare their students for the health care field. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Thursday, January 26, 2017 at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, a new study suggests anxiety and depression may be linked to an increased risk of death from certain cancers. Researchers followed over 160-thousand cancer-free men and women in over 9 years. Patients with the highest levels of psychological distress were more likely to die from leukemia, plus cancers of the bowel, prostate, pancreas and esophagus, than those with no mental health issues. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Monday, January 30, 2017 at 6pm, **WDTN News** reported, supporters of the Affordable Care Act gathered in Dayton this morning. They urged Senator Rob Portman to protect Obamacare, during the current push by some republicans in Washington to repeal it. They say 964-thousand people in Ohio would lose their health insurance if Obamacare is repealed. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Thursday, February 9, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, flu deaths are spiking among children, according to the C-D-C. Here in Ohio, health officials have reported more than 16-hundred flu-associated hospitalizations. Of those, 118-cases were in Montgomery County, and about 20 cases were in both Greene and Clark counties. In addition to good hand washing, doctors with Premiere Health say parents play a key role in preventing the spread of the virus. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Thursday, February 16, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, Vitamin-D is good for bone and muscle health, but it could also keep you from getting sick! A new study focused on adults with low Vitamin-D, because they are more susceptible to respiratory infections. Researchers found regular Vitamin-D supplements helped cut their risk of respiratory illness in half. Even those without a deficiency showed some benefit from the supplements, but taking too much Vitamin-D can cause other health problems. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Friday, February 17, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, cases of the flu continue to rise across the country. Today the C-D-C reports flu activity is widespread in 46 states including Ohio. Only Colorado, Hawaii, Oregon and Utah are doing better. 29 children have died so far this season from complications of the flu, including four in Ohio. Health officials say if you'd like to still get vaccinated, it's not too late. They say the vaccine this year appears to be a good match. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Monday, February 20, 2017 at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, legalizing same-sex marriage appears to have an unexpected benefit, reducing teen suicide attempts. A new study compared teenage suicide attempt rates among states that passed same-sex marriage laws, with states that had not “before” the passage of the Federal Law in 2015. State same-sex marriage legalization was associated with a 7-percent decline in suicide attempts among high school students. Researchers say the laws reduced the stigma associated with sexual orientation. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Saturday, March 11, 2017 at 6pm, **WDTN News** reported, Ohio becomes the second state to offer free baby boxes to curb infant deaths. Parents are beginning to take the so-called baby boxes home from hospitals along with their newborns. The cardboard boxes are linked to a European idea to help babies sleep safely. This report lasted 15 seconds.

On Tuesday, March 14, 2017 at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, an estimated 13-thousand transgender adults are serving in the U-S armed Forces, but the majority of the military doctors are not trained to treat them. A survey found 95-percent had received three hours or less of training on transgender care, and 87 percent said they did not have enough knowledge for provide cross hormone therapy for transitioning patients. On Tuesday, March 21, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, infant deaths in the U-S have reached new lows. That’s according to a new

report from the National Center for Health Statistics. The infant mortality rate dropped 15 percent over the past decade and Sudden Infant Death Syndrome declined by nearly a third. Experts say one reason for the drop, doctors are less likely to induce labor when it's not necessary. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Thursday, January 19, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, the Obama administration is releasing the last of three installments of documents belonging to Osama Bin Laden that were found in the terrorists secret compound in Pakistan in 2011. Intelligence officials have worked for more than two years to de-classify the documents captured in the raid. Bin Laden of course was the mastermind of the 9-1-1 attacks. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Monday, January 23, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, President Trump signed three executive orders today. One formally withdraws the U-S from the 12-Nation Trans-Pacific Partnership. He enacted a federal government worker hiring freeze, excluding military, public safety, and public health staff. And he also reinstated the so-called "Mexico City Policy" that bans federal money from being provided to international groups that perform abortions, or provide information on the option. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Tuesday, January 24, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, Britain's Supreme Court ruled the government can't trigger Brexit without parliamentary approval. The ruling could delay Prime Minister Theresa May's plan to start two years of exit talks by the end of March. It forces Parliament to vote on a bill that could soften terms of the UK's exit from the Union. People voted last year in a referendum to leave the 28-Nation E-U. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Wednesday, February 22, 2017, at 11pm, **WDTN News** reported, police arrest 10 Dakota Pipeline protestors who defied the government deadline to get off federal land. A few hundred protestors set some of their tents and teepees on fire today. Sioux Tribes along with environmental activists, have been protesting the controversial pipeline that would transport oil across their territory. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Friday, February 24, 2017 at 4:30pm, **WDTN News** reported, new research shows more Americans are dying from drug overdose. A new government study shows the rate of drug overdose deaths was two and a halftimes higher in 2015 than in 1999. The largest increases in overdose deaths were among white people and adults between 55 and 64 years old. The percentage of deaths involving heroin "tripled" between 2010 and 2015. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Monday, February 27, 2017, at 4:30pm, **WDTN News** reported, sources say Sean Spicer called his staff into his office last week. He then checked their cellphones, both government issued and personal ones to see if they talked to reporters. According to those same sources, Spicer also reminded them that if they use encrypted texting apps they would break the Federal Law. The staffers were reportedly told to keep quiet about the meeting and the crackdown on leaks. Spicer has declined to comment. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Friday, March 10, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, Volkswagen admits to cheating the U-S Government by using software to evade emission rules in nearly 600-thousand diesel vehicles. The German

Automaker pled “guilty” to an import crime. V-W has agreed to pay a 4 point 3 billion dollar penalty. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Tuesday, March 14, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, the Federal Government is disputing claims made by the State of Hawaii in its lawsuit against the President Donald Trump’s revised travel ban. Hawaii says the ban, which goes into effect Thursday, will harm its Muslim population, tourism, and foreign students. The U-S Government says Hawaii’s allegations of negative impact for tourism and universities are pure speculation. In a separate suit, six other states are seeking a hearing before a federal judge in Seattle tomorrow. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Tuesday, March 21, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, the confirmation hearing for Supreme Court nominee Neil Gorsuch got underway today. Gorsuch says President Trump did not ask him to overturn the landmark abortion ruling Roe v. Wade when he interviewed him before his nomination. Gorsuch added that he “would have walked out the door” if Trump had asked him that. Gorsuch has strong support from conservative groups who support overturning the abortion ruling. But the Appeals Court Judge has not ruled directly on abortion. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Wednesday, March 22, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, the Associated Press has learned that President Donald Trump’s former campaign chairman, Paul Manafort, secretly worked for a Russian billionaire to advance the interests of Russian President Vladimir Putin. Manafort wrote a 2005 strategy plan that he said “can greatly benefit

the Putin Government.” Manafort signed a 10 million annual contract beginning in 2006 and maintained a business relationship until at least 2009. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Saturday, January 21, 2017, at 6pm, **WDTN News** reported, a tornado tears through Hattiesburg, Mississippi overnight killing four people. Cars were flipped over, some homes were ripped apart, trees were ripped from their roots and power lines were knocked down. Thousands of homes and businesses have no power. Hattiesburg's Mayor has declared a state of emergency. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Wednesday, January 25, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, we learned last night that the Dayton Chapter of the American Red Cross has volunteers in Georgia and Mississippi to help with storm relief. One volunteer from Beavercreek and one from West Carrollton deployed Monday. They're helping the hundreds of people affected by the storms that produced more than two dozen tornados. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Thursday, January 26, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, heavy rainstorms battering California this week destroyed a Santa Barbara County Beach. The storm caused trees to fall on homes and left a mess on locale roads. Truckloads of sand came in Wednesday to help replenish the coastline, but one resident says that's not enough. This report lasted 15 seconds.

On Monday, January 30, 2017 at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, the White House is standing by President Trump's executive order. Chief of Staff Reince Priebus went on Meet the Press to clarify the President's decision. Priebus said people with Green Cards would not be barred from returning to the U-S, but added some of those people could face more questioning at customs. He also denied that countries where the President has business ties were left off the list of banned nations on purpose. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Wednesday, February 8, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, National Weather Service teams are collecting information about at least four tornados that hit Louisiana and one the hit Mississippi Tuesday. One Meteorologist says there may have been more than four in Louisiana, but it'll take a couple days to check everything out. They have confirmed an E-F-2 tornado hit Eastern New Orleans, with estimated wind speeds of up to 157-miles per hours. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Saturday, February 18, 2017 at 11pm, **WDTN News** reported, clean-up is underway after a powerful storm slammed Southern California on Friday. Forecasters say it dumped a record amount of rain in some areas, with most receiving about five inches. Utility crews reported tens of thousands of Los Angeles County residents still remain without power. Road crews scrambled to clean up after trees and powerlines were knocked down by the 80-mile-per-hour winds. Forecasters say another storm system is expected to move into the region on Monday. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Monday, February 20, 2017, at 4:30pm, **WDTN News** reported, clean-up efforts were underway across the state of California after a powerful storm battered the state Friday. Heavy rains caused severe flooding and mud to flow on the streets. Several roads were washed away in what forecasters called “the strongest storm of the season.” Residents who had been evacuated slowly returned home. Forecasters say a second round of storms is expected to hit today, bringing even more downpours, high winds and concerns for landslides. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Wednesday, March 1, 2017, at 4:30am, **WDTN News** reported, tornados swept through parts of Illinois yesterday, leaving damage behind. This tornado in La-Salle was caught on camera. In Ottawa, one person was killed by an uprooted tree after a reported tornado there. The governor activated the State Emergency Operations Center to respond to the severe weather. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Tuesday, March 7, 2017, at 5pm, **WDTN News** reported, emergency officials in Missouri, say nearly 500 homes and businesses sustained some damage after tornados and severe storms raked the area. 12 people were treated for injuries by emergency crews and three people were taken to hospitals. None of the injuries appear to be life threatening. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Monday, March 13, 2017, at 11pm, **WDTN News** reported, the East Coast is getting ready for a blast of winter weather. Forecasters say parts of the Mid-Atlantic and Northeast could face blizzard conditions and a blanket of heavy snow through tomorrow evening. Wind gust
