**WDTN addressing ECONOMY/BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT during the Fourth Quarter of 2013. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:**

On Monday, October 7, 2013, **WDTN News** reported if political leaders don't agree to raise the nation's debt ceiling in a few weeks mortgage interest rates are expected to skyrocket as are interest rates for your credit cards. Republicans say they are ready to talk, but they want more spending cuts included in any deal to raise the debt limit. The current shutdown is also impacting the economy with investment bank, Goldman Sachs estimating a loss of \$225 million dollars a day. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Thursday, October 17, 2013, **WDTN News** reported with just minutes to spare the US economy dodged a bullet. First, the Senate passed its bi-artisan plan with overwhelming support. Then, hours later, the House, with mostly democratic votes, did the same. Then just after midnight President Obama signed the measure into law. So what exactly does this mean? We broke it down for you. It funds the government until January 15<sup>th</sup>. It raises the debt limit until February 7<sup>th</sup>. And, sets up budget negotiations between the house and senate in the hope for reaching a long term deal. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Tuesday, October 22, 2013, **WDTN News** reported a Fairborn Halloween store is optimistic the end of the government shutdown will cast a good spell on the city's economy. Busy streets and parking lots are a welcome sight to Michael Foy, owner of Foy's Halloween store. He says he saw business slow during the shutdown. But now he says he's on track for one of the busiest Halloweens to date. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Tuesday, October 22, 2013, **WDTN News** reported nearly three-quarters of Americans are holding back on spending. That's according to bank-rate.com. The main reasons, stagnant income, a need to save more, and worries over the economy. More Americans are feeling "less" secure in their jobs and less comfortable with their savings. Those feelings of job insecurity are at their highest level in nearly two years. Spurred in part by the government shutdown. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Wednesday, November 6, 2013, **WDTN News** reported Vice President Joe Biden makes his way to the Buckeye state today. He's scheduled to visit a LCSX hub in North Baltimore. That's near Bowling Green. Biden will talk about the importance of infrastructure like our railroads to improve the nation's competitiveness in the world economy. This report lasted 15-seconds.

On Thursday, November 14, 2013, **WDTN News** reported meanwhile President Obama will be in Cleveland today. The president will visit a steel manufacturing company to talk about the economy. J Mister Obama gave a similar speech at the Port of New Orleans last week. He talked about his plan to pour tens of billions of dollars into the US infrastructure and to bolster American exports. The president then heads to Philadelphia for a campaign event. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, November 22, 2013, **WDTN News** reported this holiday season could break all records for gift card spending. According to the National Retail Federation, more than 80% of shoppers are planning to purchase at least one gift card. The average shopper is expected to spend an average of \$163.16 on gift cards. Experts say the economy and consumers' desire for practical gifts are putting gift cards at the top of the list. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Tuesday, December 3, 2013, **WDTN News** reported Caresource is looking at expanding again. Our partners at the Dayton Business Journal report the company is working with the City of Dayton to gain additional space. Caresource is a non-profit Medicaid managed care plan company. It has more than 1200 employees and plans to hire 260 more by the end of this year. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, December 6, 2013, **WDTN News** reported the Miami Valley could be in the national spotlight if it's designated as a test site for UAV's, or drones. Senator Sherrod Brown was in town yesterday talking about the possibility. He says the FAA authorization of testing would be important for jobs here and the local economy. On Tuesday, October 1, 2013, **WDTN News** reported new research claims the global war on drugs is failing. A study published by the British Medical Journal finds illegal drugs have become significantly cheaper. Even as their potency increases. The study claims the war on drugs has heightened crime, corruption and violence, but done little to slow the sale of illegal drugs. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, October 3, 2013, **WDTN News** reported five people have been charged after the Ohio Attorney General brings down an organized crime ring in southwest Ohio. The group is accused of stealing hundreds of thousands of dollars from small businesses. David Kestler, Daniel Wedig, Jason Chadwick, Coleman Watts and Gredrick Gilliam were all indicted by a Hamilton County Grand Jury. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, October 10, 2013, **WDTN News** reported right now, a teen is in custody, charged with Gangloff's murder. A crime stoppers tip led police to the 17 year old boy. He was arrested at his neighbor's house on Watson Street in Dayton, three weeks after the shooting. Investigators believe robbery was the motive and tonight, prosecutors are pushing to charge the teen as an adult. He's due back in court next week. This report lasted 1 minute 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, October 16, 2013, **WDTN News** reported a Trotwood clerk and his father use CDs and beef jerky to fight off armed robbers. In surveillance video from the Drexel Food Mart on W Third St. you can see two men enter the store around 11:30 last night. One of them is armed with a gun, but rather than give up, the clerk told u he and his father threw racks of CDs and a container of beef jerky. The men then fled the store without getting anything. Police tried to track the suspects but were unsuccessful. No one inside the mini mart was hurt. If you recognize the suspects, call Crime Stoppers at 222-7867.. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Monday, November 4, 2013, **WDTN News** reported another investigation underway tonight after a shooting victim is dropped off at Good Samaritan Hospital early this morning. Dayton Police say the victim had been shot multiple times. We're told he showed up at a woman's door near Lorenz Avenue and Oakridge Drive asking for help. She took him to the hospital. His injuries are believed to be life threatening. If you have any information, call Crime Stoppers at 222-7867. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Thursday, November 7, 2013, **WDTN News** reported police are searching for those responsible for a morning car theft. It happened in the 2300 block of Rustic Avenue in Dayton. The victim said she started the car and went back inside to get her son ready for school. When she returned her 2004 Grand Prix was missing. Police have no suspects at this time, so if you have information call Crime Stoppers at 222-7867. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, November 13, 2013, **WDTN News** reported new at 6 a Springfield man is being charged with raping a 7 year old girl. Gustave Foster is in jail tonight following an investigation in October by Clark County Child Advocacy. Officers have said the girl knew Foster when the reported rape happened last year. Officers also say they have video evidence that the crime did occur. Foster is charged with felony rape tonight. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Monday, December 2, 2013, **WDTN News** reported and finally, police are investigating after an attempted break-in at a Cricket Wireless store on North Gettysburg Avenue. Officers say an employee arrived at work to find the front doors had been forced open and pane of glass shattered. However, a security gate kept anyone from getting inside. On Tuesday, December 3, 2013, **WDTN News** reported some call it an epidemic and the numbers support the claim. From January 2010 through December 2012 the National Crime Bureau reports more than 3.000 homes and businesses reported copper stolen from them. Ohio leads the nation with 23% more copper thefts than 2<sup>nd</sup> place Texas. Its such a problem the City of Dayton even created a task force to catch those doing it. On Thursday, December 5, 2013, **WDTN News** reported, surveillance cameras captured a man inside of Midas Muffler on Salem Avenue on December 2<sup>nd</sup>. Police say he forced his way in then pried open a cash box. When he realized it was empty he left. **WDTN addressing EMPLOYMENT ISSUES AND JOBS during the Fourth Quarter of 2013. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:**

On Tuesday, October 1, 2013, **WDTN News** reports the government shutdown is also having an impact on a mega merger of private businesses. The anti trust trial fighting the merger of American and US Airways might be put on hold as the justice department attorneys can't work during the shutdown. However American is moving full steam ahead announcing it will hire 15000 pilots over the next five years and recall pilots that re furloughed. This after cutting thousands of jobs last year. The airline is also hiring hundreds of flight attendants and agents. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Wednesday, October 2, 2013, **WDTN News** reported a big jobs announcement from the world of rental cars. Enterprise holdings say it plans to hire 11,000 new workers by the middle of next year. Enterprise is one of the nation's largest private companies. We reached out to the company to find out if there would be job opportunities here and received word that the company that the company "will likely be hiring" in the Dayton area. This report lasted 20-seconds

On Thursday, October 3, 2013, **WDTN News** reported while economic concerns are looming, especially with the government shutdown, a new report says that companies will continue producing an even stream of job opportunities. According to Careerbuilder, one in four employers plan on adding full time workers in the final quarter of this year, which is relatively unchanged from last year. Industries that are expected to outpace the national average for companies hiring, include information technology, financial services and manufacturing.. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Monday, October 28, 2013, **WDTN News** reported more job seekers take their search on the go. But corporate America isn't keeping up with them. Employment website "Simply Hired" reports nearly a third of its job search traffic comes from mobile devices. But says only 20 to 30% of the fortune 500 companies offer mobile-friendly career sites and portals. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, November 1, 2013, **WDTN News** reported Clark State is planning a 13 million dollar expansion in Beavercreek. According to our partners at the Dayton Business Journal school officials want to add a second building. If funding goes through they will be able to add 1500 more students. It will also create 15 to 25 new faculty and staff jobs in the building. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, November 7, 2013, **WDTN News** reported according to a new report, the US workforce is reported to grow at a faster rate than it did in the last four years. Healthcare jobs, energy and information technology are expected to have the most growth opportunities. High wage occupations are also expected to grow faster than low and middle wage jobs. And job opportunities requiring college degrees are projected to grow significantly faster than those that do not require a college degree. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, November 21, 2013, **WDTN News** reported new numbers show women have regained all of the jobs they lost during the financial crisis but men are still trying to catch up. The Bureau of Labor statistics says men have only regained about 60% of the six million jobs they lost. Its because more men were laid off than women especially since most happened in construction and manufacturing sectors which is rebounding slowly. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Monday, December 2, 2013, **WDTN News** reported a top state official will make a big job announcement today. It's part of a new state effort to recruit military veterans for the insurance industry. Officials say about 17,000 positions will be opening by 2018. So to make sure veterans are ready Wright Patt and several colleges are offering new curriculum and incentives. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, December 5, 2013, **WDTN News** reported Pizza Hut's newest Dayton location is looking to hire. The Westown Plaza location needs shift managers, team members and delivery drivers. The restaurant is located in the 4300 block of West Third Street. But the hiring event will be held at the Job Center located at 2222 South Edwin LC. Moses Boulevard. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Friday, December 6, 2013, **WDTN News** reported the US bureau of Labor statistics will release its much anticipated jobs report covering the month of November. Many economists are for good news heading into the holiday shopping season. An improving job market could be key to the Federal Reserve's decision on whether to taper its financial stimulus program. This report lasted 20-seconds.

**WDTN addressing Education during the Fourth Quarter of 2013. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:**

On Thursday, October 10, 2013, **WDTN News** reported Central State University is one of 11 Ohio colleges that'll split a 3.5 million dollar grant. The money comes from the Louis Stokes Alliances for Minority Participation Program. It will help boost the number of students graduating in the fields of science, technology, engineering and mathematics. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, October 24, 2013, **WDTN News** reported members of the Springboro Board of Education are trying to get the community more involved. And it's changing policy to do so. Changes include developing an academic advisory council to review complaints about course material including books. The director of curriculum, the principal, a parent, a student, a librarian, the teacher of that subject and the superintendent would serve on the advisory council. They would decide whether the material is of a controversial nature and treats all sides of the dispute fairly. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Friday, October 25, 2013, **WDTN News** reported a big award for Sinclair Community College. The Dayton college was named as the 2013 Technical School of the Year. That's according to tomorrow's Tech Magazine which looked at the college's automotive education excellence. Because of the honor, Sinclair received \$2500 from Wix Filters and new tools from O'Reilly Auto Parts. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, November 7, 2013, **WDTN News** reported a new partnership to honor a Wapakoneta native and first man on the moon opens today. The University of Cincinnati and NASA are creating the Neil Armstrong Space Science institute. The school says the institute will focus on research, education in space science and engineering, and manage space-related data. Its initial work will be around unmanned aerial vehicles, or drones. Armstrong died last year at age 82. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Monday, November 11, 2013, **WDTN News** reported more international students are going to college in Ohio according to a report by the Institute of International Education. It finds international students studying in Ohio has increased 7.5% to more than 28,000 students. Forty-one percent of our international students are from China. The Ohio State University in Columbus ranks 15<sup>th</sup> nationally for attracting international students. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Thursday, November 21, 2013, **WDTN News** reported President Obama says he's committed to expanding technology in classrooms to improve education. He spoke today to educators who are using digital initiatives in their classrooms to help students learn in new ways. A White House program aims to expand high-speed web access to almost every US student over the next five years. This report lasted 20-second.

On Friday November 29, 2013, **WDTN News** reported the Springfield Museum of Art will be adding an education program. And to kick it off an exhibit will be added showcasing the work of local students from Springfield City Schools. It's free this Sunday afternoon from 3-4:30 at the museum in Cliff Park. This report lasted 15-seconds.

On Monday, December 2, 2013, **WDTN News** reported there are also some websites that offer fee-based assistance in filing the "free application for federal student aid". But the

Department of Education says the sites are not affiliated with, or endorsed by, the government and it discourages paying for help you can get free elsewhere. This report lasted 15-seconds.

On Thursday, December 5, 2013, **WDTN News** reported new at 5:30 for the first time in Dayton students participated in a public professional pledge similar to those taken by CFA charter holders, law students and medical students. Today Wright State University students in the Raj Sooin College of Business pledged their commitment to the college's student professional code. For some the moment will serve as an impactful new beginning to their college careers. Representatives from local businesses have also pledged their support for business education and students in the business college. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Friday, December 6, 2013, **WDTN News** reported local leaders, students and other community members gathered to learn the impact of education on incarceration rates. The Adam Project hosted the event at the Dayton Boys Prep Academy. Speakers addressed the importance of education to keep youth out of prison and how it impacts the entire region. This report lasted 20-seconds.

**WDTN addressing HOUSING ISSUES/FORECLOSURES during the Fourth Quarter of 2013. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:**

On Thursday, October 3, 2013, **WDTN News** reported mortgage rates are declining for a third straight week. Freddie Mac says 30-year-fixed loan rates fell to 4.22 percent down from 4.32 last week. Rates have been dropping since the Federal Reserve announced it would “not” alter its stimulus program. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Tuesday, October 8, 2013, **WDTN News** reported the partial government shutdown has caused Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac to relax some rules. Usually, the government-backed mortgage giants require lenders to verify a borrower’s income with the IRS before closing on a mortgage. L But since operations have slowed at the IRS, lenders can issue new loans without that confirmation. Borrowers who apply for mortgages will still need to sign an income verification request with the IRS but other forms of income verification can be used in the meantime. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Thursday, October 10, 2013, **WDTN News** reported a newly released report shows that foreclosure rates continue to make annual declines. According to Realty Track, foreclosure filings in September increased 2% compared to August. However, the report also shows that filings have dropped 27% from a year ago making September the 36<sup>th</sup> consecutive month with an annual decrease in foreclosure activity. Realty Track is also reporting that the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter foreclosure activity was at the lowest quarterly level since the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2007. The states with the highest percentage of foreclosure rates in 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter were Florida, Nevada and Maryland. This report lasted 35-seconds.

On Tuesday, October 15, 2013, **WDTN News** reported new at 5:30 some mortgage brokers are offering to pay your closing costs. It’s fairly common for a builder to pay closing costs on a new home mortgage, but it’s less common for brokers to foot the bill. It’s generally thousands of dollars. Some brokers are now offering to do so to attract customers. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, November 20, 2013, **WDTN News** reported new numbers show improvement for the Dayton housing market. Sales in October were up 11% from October 2012. Year-to-date, sales have topped more than 11,000, up \$120,000, which is down nearly 5% from October 2012d. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, November 21, 2013, **WDTN News** reported a program aimed at redeveloping one of Dayton’s historic neighborhoods is bringing about some positive change. Its what’s working in Dayton tonight. There are now 84 new homes in the Twin Towers neighborhood and 100 others have been demolished by the East End Community Services. Today the community also opened a newly expanded youth center on Xenia Avenue. All the work represents an \$18 million dollar investment in the Twin Towers neighborhood. The city of Dayton supported the project with 1.2 million dollars in federal neighborhood stabilization program funds. This report lasted 35-seconds.

On Monday, November 25, 2013, **WDTN News** reported a study is underway to evaluate the effectiveness of federal dollars used to prevent foreclosures among unemployed homeowners. A private foundation gave the Ohio Housing Finance Agency the money to look into it. The study will mainly focus on the US Department of Treasury’s hardest hit fund, which provided financial assistance to families in states most impacted by the downturn of the housing market. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Tuesday, November 26, 2013, **WDTN News** reported home sales nationwide this past October were up 13% from 2012 and 2% from September. Short sales made up 5.3% of all sales, down from 11.2 during October of last year. Experts believe that the surge in short sales that permeated the housing market during late 2011 and 2012 is dissipating and buyers looking for distressed property are once again using traditional avenues including bank-owned sales and foreclosure auctions.. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Wednesday, December 4, 2013, **WDTN News** reported looking ahead the figures for new home sales will be released. Later this morning the Census Bureau and Department of Commerce will release "new home sales" figures for September and October. Normally they release data for a single month, but the information was delayed by the partial government shutdown in October. Sales in August were up from July and also showed an increase from August 2012. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, December 11, 2013, **WDTN News** reported today the Miami Valley Fair Housing Center announces the roll-out of it's inclusive community fund, an effort to reinvest in Miami Valley neighborhoods of color. According to officials, money for the inclusive community fund comes from the settlement of a federal fair housing complaint against Wells Fargo Bank. The complaint alleged that foreclosed homes owned by Wells Fargo in predominantly white communities were better maintained and marketed by Wells Fargo than African-American and Latino neighborhoods. 1.4 million dollars is now available for reinvestment to stabilize these communities. This report lasted 20-seconds.

**WDTN addressing SOCIAL WELFARE/HEALTH during the Fourth Quarter of 2013. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:**

On Tuesday, October 1, 2013, **WDTN News** reported the nation's public health agencies have also been affected by the government shutdown. The CDC will not be conducting investigations into food poisoning outbreaks. It may also have limited ability to oversee the beginning of flu season. Research and clinical trials at the nation institutes of health will be temporarily stopped. However, at the LFDA, high-risk food and drug recalls will continue. As will meat inspections by the Department of Agriculture. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Wednesday, October 2, 2013, **WDTN News** reported despite the government shutdown the rollout for the Affordable Care Act went ahead as scheduled yesterday. Call centers are open in some states across the country to answer questions and help people sign up for coverage but there were some glitches. Seventeen states, including California have set up healthcare exchanges. The initial sign-up period runs through March. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Monday, October 7, 2013, **WDTN News** reported Ohio ranks 12<sup>th</sup> highest in the country in a deadly epidemic according to a new report. The Trust for America's Health says states aren't doing enough to stop deaths from prescription drug overdoses. It shows deaths in Ohio have tripled in the last 11 years. It also says most states were only using six of 53n strategies to curb prescription drug abuse. For more details we've put a link to the study on WDTN.com under weblinks. This report lasted 25-seconds

On Wednesday, October 9, 2013, **WDTN News** reported today is International Walk to School Day. This is video of last year's event during which kids learn about pedestrian safety. According to the World Health Organization, road traffic injuries are the second-leading cause of death among children ages 5 to 14 k worldwide. Several schools will holding events this year. Including Fairview. Teachers and staff will pass out free t-shirts and breakfast to walkers. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, November 1, 2013, **WDTN News** reported the Clark County Combined Health District is investigating 34 potential cases of pertussis. It's the repertory illness also known as "whooping cough" and can be spread from person to person. The 34 cases were all reported in the last two weeks. Including on today at Rocking Horse Community Health Center which is closed today and tomorrow. If confirmed, that number of pertussis cases would represent a significant increase in yearly activity for Clark County. Symptoms include, runny nose, fever, coughing and for infants, symptoms also include a pause in breathing. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Tuesday, November 5, 2013, **WDTN News** reported women who follow a Mediterranean-style diet are considered "healthy agers". Meaning they're likely the reach 70 without any chronic diseases, memory problems, or disabilities. That's according to a new Harvard University study of 10,000 women. The participants filled out a food questionnaire in their fifties and sixties, and researchers tracked their health fifteen years later. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, November 21, 2013, **WDTN News** reported Here's a story for you health nuts. Eating a handful of nuts each day can help reduce your risk of death by 20 percent. That's according to Harvard University. The benefits were seen with both peanuts and tree nuts,

like almonds and walnuts. Previous research has shown nuts are also a good source of unsaturated fats, protein and vitamins. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Monday, December 2, 2013, **WDTN News** reported dozens of passengers aboard a US Airways flight from Texas to Arizona are told they should be tested for tuberculosis. After the plane landed at Sky Harbor International Airport first responders boarded the plane and removed a passenger who had been asked to put on a medical mask during the flight. The passenger in question was moved to the “no-fly” list because of a medical condition after the flight was in mid-air. Federal health officials are investigating.. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Tuesday, December 3, 2013, **WDTN News** reported online shoppers weren't just using cyber Monday to shop for your typical big box items. They were also checking out health insurance plans. A White House spokesman says 375,000 people visited the “healthcare.gov” site yesterday. The administration expected the surge since it was the first business day after the self-imposed deadline to improve the troubled website.. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Thursday, December 5, 2013, **WDTN News** reported a new study shows doctors are getting more high-tech when treating patients with Parkinson's disease. More than 40% of people with Parkinson's disease don't see a neurologist which puts them at a higher risk of falls, fractures and other health problems. But by using video conferencing, one doctor was able to see more than 50 patients and recommend treatments like increasing exercise, changing medications and possible surgery. On Friday, October 11, 2013, **WDTN News** reported the nation's most popular park is suffering tonight falling victim to the government shutdown. The peace of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park couldn't seem farther from the hustle of Washington. But decisions made there are robbing businesses in tourist towns of up to \$14 million a day after the stalemate in DC closed the park. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Sunday, October 13, 2013, **WDTN News** reported a technical glitch knocked related services offline yesterday for those using food stamp benefits. Thousands who rely on food stamps were unable to purchase groceries for much of the day. Xerox, which operates the system, said a routine test caused the outage. Services were restored late last night. Despite widespread speculation, officials say the outage was unrelated to the ongoing government shutdown. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Monday, October 14, 2013, **WDTN News** reported Wright Patterson workers who were furloughed may have been shortchanged. Paychecks for the September 22<sup>nd</sup> to October 5<sup>th</sup> pay period went out Friday with many workers not receiving four days of wages due to the shutdown. According to base officials, furloughed workers did not receive four days of pay between October 1<sup>st</sup> and the 5<sup>th</sup>. However, those who were expected to work did receive their full 10 days. Stay with 2 News as we continue to follow this story. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Tuesday, October 22, 2013, **WDTN News** reported we are getting answers from the Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and Trade Bureau about a craft beer delay. When we talked with the Yellow Springs Brewery earlier this month brewers told us the government shutdown was stopping approval for new beer formulas and labels. But now that the shutdown has ended, there is a backlog of work that's still keeping breweries waiting. Bureau officials told us today before the shutdown recipe processing times were about 48 days.. Tonight it's now estimated at 61 days. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Tuesday, November 5, 2013, **WDTN News** reported and after an 8-month hiatus, White House tours are back. Visitors can tour the East Wing and Executive Residence starting today. But the restarted tours will operate on a limited schedule. Forced government spending cuts also known as sequestration, prompted officials to suspend the tours back in March. If you're interested in a tour, contact your member of Congress. Reservations are typically made at least three weeks ahead of time. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Friday, November 8, 2013, **WDTN News** reported tonight, we're getting a look at the price tag of the government shutdown. The Office of Management and Budget's latest report finds the government owes workers about six billion dollars in back pay. The agency says that during the 16 day shutdown workers all together missed 6.6 million days of work. Analysts also estimate that the shutdown will slightly reduce fourth quarter gross domestic product growth. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Monday, November 18, 2013, **WDTN News** reported today lawmakers will learn more about virtual currencies. The primary focus will be on bitcoin, a currency that is essentially a computer code, not backed by any government, but used to purchase goods and services on the internet worldwide. Two senate hearings are scheduled today and tomorrow to explore the use of the money and whether it needs government regulation. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Monday, December 2, 2013, **WDTN News** reported Dayton's Mayor-Elect is heading to Harvard. Democrat Nan Whaley and the newly elected mayors of Toledo and Youngstown will be heading to Cambridge, Massachusetts later this week. The university will be holding a new mayors conference starting Wednesday. The 3-day leadership seminar is co-sponsored by the US Conference of Mayors. Organizers say the seminar will educate newly elected leaders on civic engagement, government policy and other complex challenges facing local government today. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Wednesday, December 4, 2013, **WDTN News** reported new at 6 a group goes before Montgomery County Commissioners pushing to remove the word "handicapped" from government signs. The Montgomery County Board of Developmental Disabilities Services discussed their support for House Bill 265 today. The bill would remove the word "handicapped" and replace it with "accessible" or "person with a disability". This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Tuesday, December 10, 2013, **WDTN News** reported some of the tech world's biggest companies band together to fight back against the federal government. The companies, including AOL, Facebook, Yahoo, Google and Microsoft, launched a group called "Reform Government Surveillance". They posted an open letter online, calling for governments to reform current surveillance laws and practices pushing for tighter control on the collection of personal information and more protection of individual privacy. On Thursday, October 10, 2013, **WDTN News** reported paint, batteries and other household chemicals need to be disposed of properly because they can seep into the soil and water and harm the environment. For the third year in a row Montgomery County Solid Waste District is holding a hazardous waste collection event at welcome stadium. More than seven hundred cars came through to drop off items during the last two events. The event is free and open to all Montgomery County residents. Any pool chemicals, paints, solvents, batteries, pesticides are just some of the items that will be collected. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Tuesday, October 15, 2013, **WDTN News** reported new this morning, plans to go green in Yellow Springs. Our partners at the Dayton Business Journal report, Antioch College plans to construct a geothermal plant. It would be used for heating and air conditioning on campus, but no construction plans have been made public. This report lasted 15-seconds.

On Monday, October 21, 2013, **WDTN News** reported new at 11 a trash company is going green. Rumpke has earned a green business certification at its Dayton facility on East Monument Avenue. It means the company met water and energy conservation requirements as well as efforts to reduce and recycle. This report lasted 15-seconds.

On Thursday, October 31, 2013, **WDTN News** reported a big day in Dayton for those dedicated to protecting our environment. 70 people from 63 cities around the country spent the day at the Audubon Aullwood Center and Farm. All were selected as part of the Toyota Together Green Program. During the next year they'll spend time working on conservation projects around the United States. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, November 1, 2013, **WDTN News** reported the impact of farming on the environment has always been of great concern to consumers. Now, a new survey reveals that egg production is having less of an environmental impact than it did in previous years. Due to advancements in the industry, egg farms now use less water and energy on a daily basis which means they are releasing less polluting emissions, including greenhouse emissions. On Thursday, November 21, 2013, **WDTN News** reported the goal of the Blue Salt is to give residents a way to tell if their street has been treated. But will the new blue salt be harmful to the environment? That's what we asked Fred Stovall the city of Dayton Street Operations Manager. He says the blue salt has absolutely no toxic chemicals in it and it is environmentally safe. The city is paying \$11,000 for the blue dye. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, December 4, 2013, **WDTN News** reported a landmark at the Ohio State University looks a little bit different these days. Mirror Lake has been drained. Since there is no natural water supply, the school has to use about 18-million gallons of city water a year to keep it filled and that translates to \$40,000. The school has hired a group to examine the condition of the lake and the environmental impact. The goal is to reduce the operating costs. In the meantime, the lake will be empty for at least several months. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Tuesday, December 10, 2013, **WDTN News** reported environmental and health officials plan to meet with Riverside residents today about a vapor that may cause a health threat. Last month, 2 News Investigates found the EPA has been testing for vapor intrusion in the area and discovered elevated levels of chemicals. But the EA decided "not" to tell residents. The meeting will take place at Stebbins High School at 7 PM. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, December 11, 2013, **WDTN News** reported the Environmental Protection Agency is looking for comments about expanding the Stony Hollow Landfill. That's located in the 2400 block of South Gettysburg Avenue. If approved, the landfill would increase from 5.9 to 18.8 million cubic yards. Tonight's meeting starts at 6:30 at the Dayton Cultural and RTA Transit Center. That's on South Edwin C. Moses Boulevard. This report lasted 25-seconds.
