WDTN addressing ECONOMY/BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT during the First Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:

On Monday, January 20, 2014, **WDTN News** reported it's a big weekend for basketball enthusiasts and the Miami Valley economy. Today kicks off the 12th Annual Flying to the Hoop Invitational at Trent Arena. Thirty-seven of some of the nation's top high school basketball teams and players will play 22 games over the four day span. Flying to the Hoop is ranked as the number 520 showcase event in the nation n by Max Preps. It runs through Monday. Watch for updates on 2 sports throughout the weekend. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Thursday, January 23, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the weekly jobs report is out and it's showing a stagnant economy. The number of jobless applicants climbed, adding to the seasonally adjusted total. However, economists say the underlying trend suggested the labor market continued to steadily improve. The report shows a total of 3.71-million people are receiving benefits under all programs. The US unemployment rate is 6.7%. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Tuesday, January 28, 2014, **WDTN News** reported just ahead of President Obama's state of the union address tonight, the president and congress get low marks. According to the latest NBC/Wall Street Journal poll released today 68k% of Americans say the country is either stagnant or worse off since President Obama took office six years ago. Members of congress don't fare much better with 81% of those polled disapproving of the job they're doing. As for the country as a whole, 60% of Americans believe the nation is headed in the wrong direction, and 7% are dissatisfied with the economy. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Monday, February 3, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Wright Patt's impact on the local economy continues to grow. This comes from our partners at the Dayton Business Journal. The base released its analysis today. Wright Patt is responsible for nearly 4.4 billion dollars in economic impact. With the government shutdown and sequestration that figure is down from a high of about 5-billion dollars four years ago. And in recent years, Wright-Patt has reported having as many as 29,000 employees. The new report pegs that number closer to more than 27,000. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Monday, February 3, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Washington was also watching Wall Street after today's sharp drop in stock prices and bad news on US manufacturing. January's slowdown was due in part because of a drop in new orders and construction spending being down. January's deep freeze is also partly to blame. Obama Treasury Secretary, Jack Lew, said the best move by congress is to hike the debt ceiling this week.. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Tuesday, February 18, 2014, **WDTN News** reported this week also marks the five year anniversary of the controversial American Recovery and Reinvestment Act. Roughly \$800 billion was intended to put millions of Americans back to work. But five years later, one in four American's say the economy remains a big concern. This report lasted 15-seconds.

On Thursday, February 27, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the fight is on for minimum wage and is the center of debate on Capitol Hill. Right now house democrats are inline with President Obama on raising the federal minimum wage and trying to force a vote on the bill to make it happen. The legislation was a point of emphasis for the president during his state of the union address and would raise the federal minimum wage from \$7.25 to \$10.10.

Supporters say a majority of Americans are in favor of the move while opponents say it'll hurt the economy and the job creation. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Tuesday, March 4, 2014, **WDTN News** reported a highlight is an expansion of the earned income tax credit. 13.5 million more workers would be eligible to share \$60 billion in credits. That would then be replaced by eliminating tax loopholes for the rich especially the ones that tax income at lower rates. His proposal also has billions for roads, railways, veterans' hospitals and national parks. Spending, the president says, will bolster the economy. But critics complain it will continue to run up the debt. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Thursday, March 6, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new numbers suggest the rising temperatures of spring will also bring a rise in spring flings, and that is encouraging news for the airline industry. Airlines for America, an industry trade organization, forecasts spring travel to be at its highest in six years. About 2.1 million passengers a day are expected to fly domestically during March and April. That's the busiest since 2008. And a record number of 280,000 passengers a day are projected to travel on international flights. Airlines for America credits the increase to an improving economy and affordable travel costs.. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Sunday, March 16, 2014, **WDTN News** reported teams selected to compete in the First Four will arrive here in Dayton as early as tomorrow for practice at UD Arena. Games will be played Tuesday and Wednesday. The tournament brings thousands of people to the area and this year is expected to pump up to \$5 million into the local economy. The Montgomery County Visitor's Bureau is rolling out the red carpet. Teams will be greeted at area hotels all of which are booked solid. Businesses and restaurants are adding staff. Places like Milano's expect to be even busier if Dayton is in the tournament. We spoke with students and fan who all have their fingers crossed. This report lasted 35-seconds.

WDTN addressing Crime & Justice/Substance Abuse during the First Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:

On Friday, January 3, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new this morning, Ohio's top attorney says the state's crime lab has processed more than 5,000 rape kits. As of January 1st, more than 2,400 of those kits were tested. More than ,1000 of those kits matched to DNA from a criminal database. This is part of Mike Dewine's sexual assault kit testing initiative, which offers free DNA testing to any law enforcement agency with untested rape kits. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Sunday, January 5, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new information tonight after a shooting left one man wounded in Dayton. Police rushed to the scene in the 900 block of Edison Street just after 6"30 Saturday. Investigators say 25-year old Deontay Johnson was wounded during a fight there. He was taken to Miami Valley Hospital with non-life threatening injuries. Officials recovered a gun at the scene. The search fro the shooter continues tonight, if you have any information that could help police, Crime Stoppers at 222-7867. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, January 15, 2014, **WDTN News** reported a Dayton fire station is at the center of a theft investigation right now. Officers say someone stole a large emergency exhaust fan from the station in the 1700 block of West Third Street. Fire crews say the csrime could've also happened in the 1600 block of Oakridge when the truck was parked there during an emergency. The fan is valued at \$1500. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, January 16, 2014, **WDTN News** reported it's a crime we first told you about last month. And tonight, Dayton police say they still need your help identifying a spray painting tagger. The person keeps leaving the mark STD across the city. The most noteworthy tag is at Keowee and East Third Street. If you know the location of any of these taggings or the identity of this elusive person call Crime Stoppers at 222-7867. Officers are also asking you call if you have had your property tagged. On Monday, February 3, 2014, **WDTN News** reported a man and woman are in prison tonight for a statewide crime ring. They broke into corporations and stole employee's credit cards including those at Cintas in Warren County. Larry Cobb was sentenced to seven years in prison. Kristina Petty was ordered to serve 4 years behind bars. Two others have already been convicted and sentenced in the case. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, February 12, 2014, **WDTN News** reported thanks to a witness Dayton police catch up with a suspected metal thief. This is Robert Kennedy's mug shot from a a previous arrest. According to reports someone called police saying Kennedy was pulling a furnace and other metals from a vacant home. Officers caught up with him at Franklin Iron and Metal where they say he was trying to sell the stolen materials. Investigators say footprints in the snow link Kennedy to the crime. He is now charged with theft. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Wednesday, February 19, 2014, **WDTN News** reported police are searching for the person who robbed a US postal carrier at gunpoint. It happened in the 1200 block of Seneca Drive at about 11 Tuesday morning. Officials tell s the carrier was on his route, when the suspect walked up, pulled a gun and demanded his mailbag. No word on what was taken or a description of the suspect tonight. If you have any information call Crime Stoppers at 222-7867. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Saturday, March 1, 2014, **WDTN News** reported a man goes to pick up dinner, but loses his car in the process. Investigators are now on the look-out for the victim's 2009 Dodge Calibur. They say it was stolen from the parking lot of the Whale Shark Restaurant on James H. McGee Boulevard Thursday night. On Wednesday, March 5, 2014, **WDTN News** reported topping our headlines this morning Dayton City commissioners will vote today on using a new tool to cut down on drug activity and we're asking questions about how it will be used. The Advanced Technical Information Center in Beavercreek will provide crime analysis data and crime mapping tools. Police say that information will help the narcotics division find patterns and links between drug complaints. If approved, the contract would cost \$60,000 and run through the end of the year. On Thursday, March 20, 2014, **WDTN News** reported US Marshals finally arrest a man we've featured numerous times on our Monday's wanted reports. Tonight Shawn Hagler is behind bars arrested nearly a year after authorities say he and a friend broke into a home on Pleasant Avenue and robbed the residents at gunpoint. Hagler was arrested this week in Dayton on Riverview Terrace less than four miles from the crime scene. This report lasted 20-seconds.

WDTN addressing EMPLOYMENT ISSUES AND JOBS during the First Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:

On Friday, January 3, 2014, **WDTN News** reports Dayton is among the tops in the nation for the growing construction industry. The region added 700 jobs last year, ranking it 89th out of nearly 400 cities across the country in industry growth. According to our partners at the Dayton Business Journal, 211 cities saw increases in construction jobs. Atlanta saw the most new construction jobs over the past 12 months, adding more than 10,000 positions. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Tuesday, January 7, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Dayton Children's Hospital will soon offer sports medicine services for young athletes. A move it says comes as pediatric sports medicine is in demand in Dayton. In all, the new line will create five jobs in addition to the two physicians who are moving to head the department from other areas in the hospital. The hospital will begin offering sports medicine services for children and teens at both its main campus downtown and at its Springboro outpatient facility. The main campus will have a rehabilitation area, four exam rooms and a reception area as well as several support labs. Among the services will be same- or next-day appointments, sports physical therapy, concussion management, sports nutrition consulting and others. This report lasted 20-seconds

On Friday, January 10, 2014, **WDTN News** reported it's a big day for the Miami Valley. Hundreds of new manufacturing jobs are coming to Moraine. In just a few hours Ohio Governor John Kasich is expected to make the official announcement about the former GM plant. Understandably this is one of our most clicked stories at WDTN.COM. It's been five years since the last truck rolled off the line. Land since then, the facility has sat vacant. But that will soon change after a grant was given to "Project Southbound" to renovate the facility for an unnamed company. That's welcome news to former workers who hope change will breathe new life into the lot. This report lasted 35-seconds.

On Wednesday, January 15, 2014, **WDTN News** reported we're working for you with two hiring events in the Miami Valley. Meijer is working to fill available jobs at its warehouse in Tipp City. Positions are part time with the potential for future full-time opportunities. The career fair is January 22nd and 23rd from noon until 5 at the Meijer Distribution Facility on South County Road 25-A. Candidates are encouraged to bring a resume, driver's license, or state identification and social security cards. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Tuesday, February 4, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the Congressional Budget Office estimates the Affordable Care Act could reduce the number of full-time workers by 2.3 million by 2021. The agency says the loss of jobs will not necessarily be due to layoffs. Instead, many of those workers will choose to leave their jobs because they will be able to get health insurance outside of work through a subsidized government health exchange. On Wednesday, February 5, 2014, **WDTN News** reported spruce up your resume there will soon be jobs available in Darke County. Poly One is looking to fill 100 positions at it's production facility. The company is hosting two career fairs at it's Landsdowne Avenue location. The first is today until 6 PM. The second will be held this Saturday from 9 to 1. Bring a resume and apply in person. On Wednesday, February 12, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Amazon is hiring 2500 workers for full time jobs with benefits. The jobs will be in fulfillment centers around the country. The duties include packing and shipping customer orders. Amazon says the new employees will be eligible for health care, 401-K and bonuses. This report lasted 15-seconds.

On Tuesday, March 4, 2014, **WDTN News** reported if you're looking for a job, Clayton is the place for you today. "On Time Staffing" is holding a job fair at the Miami Valley Career Technology Center from 10 until 2. The agency is looking to hire dozens of new employees for its new Montgomery County location. If you're interested, you need to pre register online. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, March 14, 2014, **WDTN News** reported we're asking questions tonight about hundreds of jobs coming to Darke County. We were there today when Whirlpool Corporation announced a 40 million dollar investment in its Greenville Plant. We learned that it took years of planning for Greenville to secure the extra 400 jobs. Governor John Kasich, who was at today's announcement, says the state had to offer a few incentives and on the local level the Mayor says half a million dollars in grant money helped as well. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Monday, March 24, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the fast casual Mexican restaurant is hosting a job fair in Beavercreek Thursday. The event runs from 8 50 5 at the restaurant on New Germany Trebein Road. Chipotle is filling more than 300 full and part time jobs at several locations across the Miami Valley. If you're interested, all you need to do is bring a resume. This report lasted 20-seconds.

WDTN addressing Education during the First Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:

On Tuesday, January 7, 2014, **WDTN News** reported a Montgomery County organization is picking up some education grant money. The Ohio EPA is giving the Boonshoft Museum of Discovery more than \$49,000. It'll be used to create "global connections" which is a multi-media environmental education experience. The museum will also use the money to update the existing NOAA Global Weather Display. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, January 10, 2014, **WDTN News** reported there are some new members at the helm in Springboro schools. Three new board of education members were officials sworn in last night. 2 News was there as Dr. Ron Malone, Dave Stuckey and Charles Anderson formally took their oaths of office. The trio was elected in November and say they're ready to get started by putting students and parents first. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Monday, January 13, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Northridge schools are facing possible professional sanctions after state education officials say the district manipulated attendance numbers. The Ohio Department of Education ruled today saying seven school districts participated in attendance scrubbing back in 2010-2011 school year. Northridge is the only district from our area. Scrubbing means removing poor-performing students from the rolls to improve performance rankings. Northridge's superintendent says the district has been working closely with state investigators for the past year and a half. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Tuesday, January 28, 2014, **WDTN News** reported this comes from our partners at the Dayton Business Journal. Sinclair is requesting \$4 million in state funds to build the center at its downtown Dayton campus. It would be called the "National Unmanned Aerial Systems Training and Certification Center". It would be located at building 13. Educators say the new Drone Center would be used for development and education and bring together manufacturing and aviation programs. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Tuesday, February 4, 2014, **WDTN News** reported looking ahead, Sinclair Community College is helping you finance your college education. The financial aid workshop is planned for Sunday, February 9th from 2-4. It's free to participate. Sinclair staff will be at three locations. Building 13 at the downtown Dayton campus, the Eaton Learning Center and the Mason Campus. Ohio Educators will be on hand to guide students and their families through the process of applying for federal financial aid and tuition assistance. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Wednesday, February 12, 2014, **WDTN News** reported in Piqua three days of missed school because of the weather will NOT have to be made up in the classroom. That's because the Ohio Department of Education approved three "e-days". That means students will complete online lessons found on the district's website. If weather forces another cancellation the district will put the e-day into effect. But schools and students may be in the clear for a while. This report lasted 25-second.

On Thursday, February 13, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the issue of calamity days will take center stage at Springfield City Schools. The superintendent will update the Board of Education on the situation this afternoon. The district has used six days so far this school year, one over the state limit. Springfield is actually in better shape than many other local districts, which have used anywhere between 7 and 15 days. Ohio lawmakers will vote next

week on a measure to give schools four additional calamity days this year.. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Wednesday, March 12, 2014, **WDTN News** Ohio brains are healthier than Illinois and 18 other states, but still trail much of the nation. That's according to America's Brain Health Index, which measures factors like diet, physical health, mental health and social well-being. Ohio ranks number 33 on the list. The Buckeye State got high marks for education and lack of psychological distress, but got dinged for low breastfeeding rates and low fish consumption. Maryland took the top spot on the list. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, March 13, 2014, **WDTN News** reported topping our headlines this morning, Ohio is ramping up testing as the districts work to meet statewide reading guarantees. Third graders will now have three new opportunities to prove they can move onto the fourth grade. The Ohio Department of Education has added Iowa assessments, the Northwest Evaluation Association's map test and Terra Nova 3 to the approved assessments testing reading levels. Before, only the Ohio Achievement Assessment was allowed. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, March 21, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Governor John Kasich is on his way to the Miami Valley. He's coming to Wright State University to talk about his recent initiatives to strengthen education for veterans across the Buckeye State. The event starts at 2. I'll be there, and I'll be asking him about "several" issues affecting the Miami Valley. I'll have details tonight on 2 News starting at 5. This report lasted 15-seconds.

WDTN addressing HOUSING ISSUES/FORECLOSURES during the First Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:

On Tuesday, January 14, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new local housing number tonight as we look into a law meant to protect consumers from risky mortgages. However, some housing experts say it could keep you from getting a loan at all. The new rules require lenders to verify a buyer can repay their mortgage or possibly face legal liability if they don't. We did some digging and have new numbers tonight from Montgomery County. In the past year more than 64,000 mortgages were filed in the county. And more than 24,000 deeds changed hands. That's about on par with 2012 when we found some 66,000 mortgages were granted and more than 23,000 deeds exchanged.. This report lasted 35-seconds.

On Thursday, January 16, 2014, **WDTN News** reported good news tonight for recovering housing markets as new number show declining foreclosure rates. Last year, foreclosures dropped 26% from their 2012 numbers. According to online real estate information site, Realty Trac, foreclosures reached their lowest numbers since 2007. Florida and California topped the list for the highest number of foreclosed properties. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, January 22, 2014, **WDTN News** reported this morning we're awaiting a big announcement from the Montgomery County Auditor about the Homestead Exemption Program. That provides big property tax discounts to senior citizens and disabled homeowners. It helps about 48,000 homeowners in Montgomery County alone. Auditor Karl Keith says some changes are coming to the program and will explain those changes later this morning. We'll have full report tonight starting at 5. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Tuesday, January 28, 2014, **WDTN News** reported good news for the Dayton housing market as some sales in the area continue to improve. According to the Dayton Area Board of Realtors sales rose 13% in December compared to the year before with 915 single-family and condominium homes sold. The average sale price in December also topped last year at a price of \$128,000. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, February 19, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new this morning US housing construction reportedly dropped 16% in January. The number is 880,000. The expected number was 997,000! A big difference! Experts are blaming much of weakness on extreme weather conditions.. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, February 26, 2014, **WDTN News** reported a positive sign on the housing front. According to the Commerce Department sales of new homes rose 9.6k% last month. That's the fastest pace since before the housing crisis began in 2008. The bump came as a surprise to many analysts. They had been predicting a drop in January because of the wintry weather. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, February 27, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Ohio is planning to end its foreclosure assistance program. Since 2010, the Save a Dream Ohio Program has distributed nearly \$500 million to more than 15,000 homeowners. The Ohio Housing Finance Agency said today it plans to end the program by next year crediting the state's steadying economy. About \$100 million remains available to homeowners in need. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Monday, March 3, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new at 6 a large, high-end housing development is in the works tonight in Beavercreek. Our partners at the Dayton Business Journal say the plan is to build on the 47-acres of land at Shakertown and Grange Hall Roads. The area could hold more than 200 homes. Documents show the buildings would be single-story, multi-family rental homes with private garages, swimming pools and club houses. The land still needs rezoned before development can begin. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Wednesday, March 12, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Dayton area residents are getting more bang for their buck. According to Forbes the Dayton region ranks as the f4th most affordable city in America. Buffalo claimed the top spot on the list, followed by Memphis and Cincinnati. Forbes ranked cities based on median family income, housing affordability and cost-of-living. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Tuesday, March 18, 2014, **WDTN News** reported a new senior housing community opened today in Kettering in a new development called Acorn Walk. It's a 32-acre development just south of the Kettering Business Park and the site of the old DESC facility which closed nearly 20 years ago. Kettering city officials also plan to build and sell 8 single-story land-ominiums for \$150,000 per unit. There will also be a new park added, called Gentile Park. The park will also connect to the new Dayton-Kettering bikeway. This report lasted 25-seconds.

WDTN addressing SOCIAL WELFARE/HEALTH during the First Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:

On Thursday, January 2, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new at 11 more than 17,000 people are seeking Medicaid Health Coverage here in Ohio. The new, online enrollment option started on December 9th for eligible low-income families and those who fell under a new expansion plan this past fall. Of those 17,000 applicants, it's not clear how many were due to the expansion program. County caseworkers will have to finalize most of the initial online applications but state officials say they expect the enrollment process to be more automated in the coming months. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Friday, January 2, 2014, **WDTN News** reported and today marks two deadlines before the US Supreme Court. First the US Government must respond by 10AM to an order regarding birth control coverage and the Affordable Care Act. Justice Sonia Sotomayor blocked the implementation of a requirement that some religion-affiliated organizations must provide health insurance that includes birth control. Then by noon supporters of same-sex marriage in Utah must file legal briefs in response to the state's emergency request to suspend those weddings. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Monday, January 6, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new at 11 flu activity is on the rise in Clark County. So far this season, eleven influenza-associated hospitalizations have been reported to the Clark County combined health district. Five of those happened during the first week of January. Symptoms include fever, cough, sore throat, body aches and fatigue. Health officials advise getting the flu vaccine if you haven't already. This report lasted 20-seconds

On Wednesday, January 8, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the popular Dash Diet Eating Plan was ranked number one for the 4th year in a row. That's according to US News & World Reports. The Therapeutic Lifestyle Changes Diet came in second. Tying for the 3rd place spot were, the Mayo Clinic Diet, The Mediterranean Diet and Weight Watchers. Lat on the list, the controversial Paleo Diet, despite being the most searched on Google last year. The rankings are based on safety, effective weight loss, heart health and diabetes prevention. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Monday, February 3, 2014, **WDTN News** reported public health experts have been pushing back against the problem of antibiotic resistance by encouraging doctors to prescribe the drugs only when necessary. New research shows it's working to a point. Doctors at Boston Children's Hospital found the number of children taking antibiotics decreased over the past decade. However, the rate of decline seems to be plateaued. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Tuesday, February 4, 2014, **WDTN News** reported some bad news about smoking in Ohio. According to the National Health Interview Survey despite of a half century of government warnings, nearly one in four Ohioans still smokes. That rate is just 5.4% lower than it was in 1984. Smoking is the leading cause of preventable death in the US, with about 443,000 people dying every year. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, February 5, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new tonight, we checked for you and found out the doctors at Miami Valley Hospital have treated 2-3 heart attacks today due to snow shoveling. We also called Kettering Health Network and they tell us they've treated one heart attack patient who was shoveling snow and a lot of injuries related to slips and

falls. The experts suggests shoveling snow little by little as it comes down and not tackling it all at once. Wear shoes with good traction, do some stretches before and after to keep your muscles happy. And remember to push not lift the snow when shoveling. This report lasted 35-seconds.

On Wednesday, March 5, 2014, **WDTN News** reported in 2 Your Health a reason to turn off the temper, as it turns out, angry outbursts can lead to more than workplace relationship issues. A new Harvard University Study shows people who lose their temper are more likely to have heart attack or stroke within two hours of an outburst. Researchers say anger increases heart rates and stress hormones that could trigger dangerous reactions. So as you head to work, make sure to keep calm and carry on. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Thursday, March 6, 2014, **WDTN News** reported nine students at Ohio State University have been diagnosed with mumps. Tonight, Columbus Public Health is investigating the outbreak. Officials say all of the students have been diagnosed by local physicians in the last 48 hours. We're told four of the patients live together in a fraternity house. A 10th diagnosis has been made but the person has no connection with the university. Mumps is caused by a virus. Symptoms include fever, headache, muscle aches, fatigue and loss of appetite. There is no specific treatment. The CDC says anyone who is not immune because of a previous mumps infection or from a vaccination can get mumps. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Sunday, March 9, 2014, **WDTN News** reported this morning activists lined the side walk outside the Kroger on Stroop Road in Kettering. They're calling on the Cincinnati-based grocer to label it's store-brand products containing ingredients derived from genetically modified organisms, or GMOs. This comes on the one-year anniversary of Whole Foods announcing it would adopt such labeling for all it's products. Advocates say there are serious health concerns connected to GMOs. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, January 3, 2014, **WDTN News** reported today marks two deadlines before the US Supreme Court. First the US government must respond by 10AM to an order regarding birth control coverage and the Affordable Care Act. Justice Sonia Sotomayor blocked the implementation of a requirement that some religion-affiliated organizations must provide health insurance that includes birth control. Then by noon supporters of same-sex marriage in Utah must file legal briefs in response to the state's emergency request to suspend those weddings. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Tuesday, January 7, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new for you this morning a victory for gun rights advocates. A federal judge rules Chicago's gun ban is unconstitutional. The city wanted to ban virtually all sales and transfers of firearms. A judge says that while he understands officials are trying to stop gun violence, quote "certain fundamental rights are protected by the constitution". The FBI's latest annual crime report showed Chicago had 500 homicides in 2012. That's up from 431 in 2011. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Wednesday, January 8, 2014, **WDTN News** reported President Obama is slated to meet with the intelligence community as he re-evaluates government surveillance programs. Tomorrow he will meet with members of congress on the same topic before unveiling a package of reforms later this month. This report lasted 1s5-seconds.

On Saturday, January 11, 2014, **WDTN News** reported as the busses begin rolling into Beavercreek tomorrow, for many the RTA expansion has been a long time coming. As Jackie mentioned, the bussing battle began in March 2011 when the Beavercreek City Council turned down a request for the RTA stops. That led to the federal government intervening, threatening to pull funding if the public transit plans weren't approved. Skip ahead to last month, that's when the city approved the three RTA tops, near the mall at Fairfield Commons. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Wednesday, January 22, 2014, **WDTN News** reported happening today are your kids at risk in the car? The government says so which is why more testing could be on the way to see just how safe your child's car seat is. Later today, the Nation Highway Traffic Safety Administration will outline new tests that would analyze side impact crashes which according to the government are the cause for most child deaths and injuries especially when cars are stopped at an intersection. But any new regulations won't be made final until the agency reviews public comments, which could take months if not years. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Monday, February 3, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the Treasury Secretary urges congress to increase the government's ability to borrow money. Jack Lew spoke at a bipartisan policy center event in DC today. He warned the government will start hitting the debt ceiling this month unless Washington acts to raise the limit of public borrowing. Delaying action, he said, could hurt the economic recovery. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Sunday, February 9, 2014, **WDTN News** reported a historic announcement regarding same-sex marriage is expected later tonight. Attorney General Eric Holder says he will extend the federal government's recognition of same-sex marriages to all states. That includes the 34 states that don't consider it legal including Ohio. The Attorney General plans to announce the news during a speech at the "Human Rights Campaign's New York Gala" this evening. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, February 14, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the federal government has issued new rules to help banks doing business with the fledgling marijuana industry. The Treasury and Just Departments say that banks must verify dealers are licensed before financing them. The move will also set up a system for financial institutions to report suspicious activity. Although 20 states and Washington DC have authorized the sale of medical or recreation marijuana, it's still illegal under federal law. And since banking is federally regulated, marijuana dealers have been unable to openly do business with banks. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Tuesday, March 4, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new government standards will soon be making school lunches healthier. The program will significantly increase fruit and vegetable consumption across the nation. In 2012, the USDA required schools to use more whole grains and to reduce calories in its options. On Thursday, March 13, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new tonight the US has agreed to let BP back into Gulf waters. The EPA has lifted a 2012 ban imposed after the agency concluded that the oil company hadn't fixed problems that led to the deadly deepwater horizon rig explosion. That explosion spilled millions of gallons of oil into the water and contaminated hundreds of miles of beaches. BP can now seek new oil leases in the Gulf of Mexico, but the company will remain under strict ethics and safety requirements for for the next five years. This reported last 30-seconds.

On Friday, January 31, 2014, **WDTN News** reported looking ahead word will come today that would dictate the future of a controversial oil pipeline project. The results of an environmental impact study into the "Keystone X-L" pipeline are due out this afternoon. A final decision may not come for several months but this study will help determine whether the project will go ahead. If approved, the pipeline would carry oil from Canada to the Gulf Coast. Opponents warn against potential damage to the environment and doubt if any long term jobs would be created.. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Friday, January 17, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Montgomery County communities are coming together as part of an effort to make the area more environmentally friendly. It's called the Dayton Regional Green initiative. The initiative includes some lofty goals like a 25% recycling rate among residents and 1500 green certified businesses by 2016. How realistic do you think it is to meet those? It is going to be a hard goal because in a year and a half we've certified 200 businesses but the program we have is quite unique in the way it's approached because it's based on value and incentives. We talked with Heapy Engineering, one of the green initiative business. He tells us even small things like recycling paper and being more energy efficient have saved the company \$15,000 a year. This report lasted 40-seconds.

On Monday, January 20, 2014, **WDTN News** reported an local government leaders will be talking green this morning. Montgomery County Commissioner Judy Dodge and Dayton Mayor Nan Whaley will joining with other regional leaders to talk about ways to make the Miami Valley more environmentally friendly. That includes a green business certification program and better access to bikeways. The announcement is set for 11:30 at the County Administration Building. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Tuesday, January 28, 2014, **WDTN News** reported with milk being one of its signature industries it's no surprise that Vermont is home to a lot of dairy cows. But one of those cows in particular stands out. Meet "Electra" a mechanical cow on display at Green Mountain Power. She's the spokes-cow for the cow power initiative. Here's how it works: Methane gas captured from manure on 16 Vermont farms generates enough electricity to power 3,000 homes. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Monday, February 27, 2014, **WDTN News** reported after a month long research project, Carroll High School students proudly display what they have learned. Students asked questions about everything from chemistry to math to behavioral sciences. The Montgomery County Solid Waste District is offering \$200,000 to encourage local businesses to improve and promote recycling. Businesses have until April 25th to apply for the grant. On Monday, February 24, 2014, **WDTN News** reported today in Washington, the Supreme Court will hear arguments about curbing greenhouse gases. Industry groups and republican-led states re arguing against the Obama administration's effort to limit power-plant and factory emissions of gases blamed for global warming. At issue is whether the environmental Protection Agency can enforce new regulations without an act of congress. President Obama has said he will act if congress won't. Opponents call it a "power grab". This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Tuesday, March 4, 2014, **WDTN News** reported DP&L is giving almost half a million dollars in energy efficiency rebates to Beavercreek schools the largest rebate its ever given. The company says Beavercreek's use of innovative construction methods heating and cooling systems and lighting at two of its newest schools will save about \$150,000 a year. Miami Valley Hospital will get about \$130,000 or the use of green technologies in its new 12-story patient tower. The hospital expects to save about \$100,000 a year on electric costs. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Wednesday, March 19, 2014, **WDTN News** reported a new business is going green tonight in Fairborn. Buckeye Discount Dry Cleaners celebrated a grand opening this afternoon on South Central. The green business certification program means it's reducing energy and resource consumption as well as promoting recycling. This report lasted 15-seconds.
