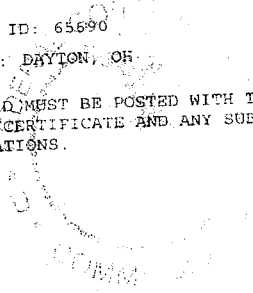

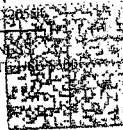

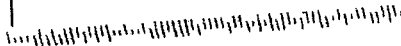

On Wednesday, July 20, 2015 WDTN 5p.m. News reported A Dayton based retailer is expanding its reach. Shops by Todd operates Occasionally Yours and Pandora. According to our partners at the Dayton Business Journal...both stores will be opening new locations in Liberty Center. That's the 350- million development in Butler County. The Grand Opening is planned for October. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Sunday, July 24, 2015 4:30a.m. News reported happening today...The Dayton Celtic Festival kicks off at Riverscape! Organizers say the festival brings in 10 million dollars to the Miami Valley. From tents and events sites, to food and beverages...Local business owners appreciate that the event planners buy for the Miami Valley. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Wednesday, July 27, 2015 at 6p.m. News reported Good news for beer lovers in the Buckeye State...Ohio ranks ninth in the nation for the most craft breweries. Our partners at the Dayton Business Journal report Ohio's 110 breweries produced more than a million barrels of craft beer last year. They say the man walked into the Dollar General in the 23-hundred block of Valley Street Thursday night. He asked for cigarettes, then demanded money, and implied that he had a gun. The suspect is believed to be in his early to mid 30's. If you recognize him, call Crimestoppers at 222-7867. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Tuesday, July 28, 2015 at 11p.m. News reported, a central California city coping with a disturbing crime tonight. Police have arrested a 15-year old boy for the murder of an 8-year old girl whose body was found in a dumpster. Investigators in Santa Cruz says the teen lured Maddy Middleton into his apartment – they both lived at the same complex. Police say he then tried to hide her body in a recycling bin. Maddy had been reported missing Sunday, last seen riding her scooter. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Wednesday, July 29, 2015 at 6p.m. News reported Darke County Sheriff's Deputies find more than 200-thousand dollars worth of marijuana yesterday. Every year, the law enforcement officers use a helicopter to spot marijuana grow operations. This happens between April and October – when grower's typically plant and harvest the drugs. Experts say a fully mature marijuana plant is worth between one and two thousand dollars. They found more than 200 plants. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Friday, July 31, 2015 at 4:30a.m. News reported, Suspected South Carolina church shooter Dylan Roof is scheduled to be arraigned in a Charleston Court this morning. The 21-year old suspect now faces new federal charges including 12 counts of committing a hate crime and obstructing the practice of religion. Roof allegedly shot and killed 9 black church goers during a Bible Study at "Emanuel A-M-E Church" in Charleston on June 17<sup>th</sup>, including a former State Senator. If convicted...he could face the death penalty. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Wednesday, August 19, 2015 at 11p.m. News reported, Sidney Police are on the lookout for a knife-wielding robbery suspect. Officers say a man wearing a hoodie and white garment around his face...walked into the Fuel Stop on West Court Street early Monday morning. They say he showed a knife and demanded money...before running from the store. If you have any information call Sidney Police. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Friday, August 21, 2015 at 5p.m. News reported, Dayton Police looking for the shooter who killed one man and critically wounded a woman overnight. The victims were found inside a car at Vina Villa and Gettysburg Avenue just after midnight. The Corner says 27-year-old Jesse Ray Pierce died of multiple gunshot wounds. On Friday, August 28, 2015 at 6p.m. News reported The Montgomery County Coroner's Office is working to identify the person whose body was found inside a burned car in Dayton. Police confirmed to 2 News the victim is a man. They say he appeared to have been shot. Officials responded to a burning car near Triangle Park this morning. The body was found inside. The coroner has yet to rule on the official cause of death. If you have any information call – call Crime Stoppers. This report lasted 30 seconds.

On Sunday, September 13, 2015 at 6p.m. News reported, Also, Police investigating after another shooting victim drives himself to the hospital. This victim tells Police he was robbed at gunpoint behind the All In One Gas Station on James H McGee last night. After leaving the gas station he says another armed robber came up to him, demanded money and shot him. If you have any information about either of these cases, call Crime Stoppers. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Monday, September 14, 2015 at 4:30a.m. News reports, Police say a Dayton teen is expected to be okay after he's shot in the chest. The 17-year-old victim told hospital staff he had been shot while riding his bike on Arlington Avenue Sunday morning. The victim's friends drove him to Good Samaritan and he was transferred to Miami Valley. According to the victim's friends, a man carrying a B-B gun shot him. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Sunday, September 27, 2015 at 6p.m. News reports, a fight at a Dayton Restaurant leads to a woman getting stabbed last night. The victim told Police she and her cousin were at Roosters on North Main Street when she got in a fight with a woman and her friends. She says at some point, one of the women stabbed her in the back. The victim was taken to the hospital but is expected to be okay. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Tuesday, July 7, 2015 at 4:30a.m. News reports, A new development in Trotwood is moving forward. The City Council has agreed to re-zone the former Elder Beerman property on Salem Avenue...to make way for Specialty Manufacturing Solutions. We told you earlier this year the company plans to transfer 52 jobs to the new site...and possibly add another 10. Once plans are finalized, renovations should start by the end of this year. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Thursday, July 9, 2015 at 6p.m. News reports, New tonight – 150 people will lose their jobs after a Springfield company shuts down. 2 News Investigates obtained documents showing that National Oilwell Varco Incorporated will pull its facility out of Clark County this fall. It makes pumps for Industrial use. According to the documents, the layoffs will begin in September and finish by the end of the year. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Thursday, July 9, 2015 at 11p.m. News reports, A new retailer is preparing to open in Moraine. City officials say Dave's Bike Shop is moving into the old Hipple Cancer Research building. Other empty spaces in the city are also seeing new life. The owner of the former McDonalds is planning to renovate and sell and Fidelity Insurance is moving into the former Berry building – which will bring in about 300 jobs. City leaders credit Fuyao Glass America for helping to attract new businesses. This report lasted 30 seconds.

Goodwill Easter Seals Miami Valley hosted the event. 25 companies had representatives there to help veterans with the job search. Organizers say they're hoping to make a difference, one Veteran at a time, because unemployment for Veterans in Ohio is too high. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Friday, August 7, 2015 at 5p.m. News reports, the latest economic snapshot shows the U-S Unemployment rate held steady at 5.3 percent last month. The report for the Labor Department also shows that the U-S employers added 215-thousand jobs in July. The Federal Reserve will use the report to help determine whether the economy can withstand higher interest rates. We'll get a look at how Ohio's job market fared when the state numbers are released later this month. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Friday, August 21, 2015 at 11p.m. News reports, Ohio's unemployment rate drops to an even 5-percent for July...the lowest level since 2001. We dug deeper into the numbers out today from the Department of Job and Family Services and found most of the job gains are in the government sector while there's been job loss in the private sector. Sinclair Community College is set to debut its new "National U-A-S Training and Certification Center". The center will give students the chance to work with U-A-S Technology in a cutting edge, hands on environment. A ribbon cutting will take place at 4:30 this afternoon in Sinclair's Building 13. The U-A-S industry is expected to create more than 100,000 jobs with and bring in more than 80 billion dollars over the next 10 years. This report lasted 30 seconds.

On Tuesday, September 15, 2015 at 6p.m. News reports, and Kroger stores are hiring...the chain is looking to fill 11-hundred positions in its Cincinnati and Dayton-area stores. They're putting a special emphasis on hiring Veterans. Kroger has hired more than 29-thousand Veterans since it began its "Honoring Our Heroes" program in 2009. This report lasted 20 seconds.

Its Aerospace and Aviation Industries make it a leading economy nationwide. Its Health Care and Education sectors also contribute to the high ranking. This report lasted 30 seconds.

On Friday, July 15, 2015 at 6p.m. News reports, Senator Sherrod Brown looks to provide more help to community schools. The U-S Senate unanimously adopted his amendment to the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. Under the amendment, the Federal Government would help community schools give students the access to support they need to succeed. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Saturday, July 16, 2015 at 5p.m. News reports, some education changes in the works tonight. The Senate has passed an overhaul of No Child Left Behind. It turns much more responsibility over to the states when it comes to accountability. The bill aims at reducing the education gaps for poor and minority students. The White House does not think either measure from the House or Senate has a strong enough accountability measure. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Wednesday, July 20, 2015 at 6p.m. News reports, a blind student suing Miami University is preparing for settlement talks. Aleeha Dudley accuses the University of using technology that's a barrier to her education. The New Paris student says she couldn't use provided course materials and she didn't get any in Braille or any form she could use without help. Her lawsuit says Miami violated Federal Law by failing to provide equal access. The University denies it has done anything wrong. This report lasted 25 seconds.



On Friday, July 29, 2015 at 4:30a.m. News reports, six inmates at the Dayton Correctional Institution are moving forward after a special graduation ceremony. They received their G-E-D's yesterday. The Superintendent of Ohio Central School Systems says education helps inmates become employable. And graduates say their accomplishment will help them take a positive step forward. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Thursday, August 20, 2015 at 4:30a.m. News reports, new this morning – Dayton Public schools have been ordered to overhaul Special Needs Education. D-P-S and 13 Cuyahoga schools were the target of an investigation by the Ohio Department of Education. Investigators wanted to see whether jailed students were getting taught behind bars as required by the state. O-D-E found one Dayton student who was not getting individualized instruction. Now the district must overhaul how it teaches students held in Juvenile Detention. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Thursday, August 29, 2015 at 5p.m. News reports, Ohio's Superintendent of Public Instruction has named an independent panel to advise the department on evaluating Charter School sponsors. They'll be evaluate by academic performance of students enrolled in other community schools that they sponsor, how closely they adhere to quality practices and compliance with laws and administrative rules. The state education department's oversight of Charter Schools has recently come under fire. This report lasted 30 seconds.

On Monday, August 24, 2015 at 5p.m. News reports, Classes are back in session at Sinclair Community College! About 21-thousand students are enrolled for the fall session. The College says its affordability makes it a great option for those who want to continue their education. This report lasted 10 seconds.

On Tuesday, August 25, 2015 at 6p.m. News reports, a local college starts using drones in education this fall. Clark State Community College is flying unmanned aircraft systems as part of their new precision agriculture program. The College says that's expected to be among the largest uses of drones...so the hope their program will prepare students for jobs in the industry. This report lasted 15 seconds.

On Tuesday, September 1, 2015 at 4:30a.m. News reports, good news for our Dayton-Area Education. Five colleges are among the best in Ohio for STEM Degrees. Our partners at The Dayton Business Journal report...the University of Dayton...Whittenberg University...Cedarville...Wright State and Miami University are ranked in the top 20 for highest percentage of STEM degrees awarded. STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering and Math. The information comes from Payscale Inc.'s college salary report. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Wednesday, September 16, 2015 at 4:30a.m. News reports, discouraging news from the Ohio Board of Education. Less than half of students met standards on new common core tests taken last school year. Passage rates have dropped from previous standardized testing. 26 percent to 40 percent of the elementary and middle school students met expectations on Math and English exams. State officials say the scores were to be expected due to increased difficulty in the tests. The board is no preparing to set a lower benchmark for students. They say it will allow closer to 65 percent of students to meet expectations. This report lasted 45 seconds.

**WDTN addressing HOUSING ISSUES/FORECLOSURES during the Third Quarter of 2015. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news, programming and other programming listed below:**

On Wednesday, July 1, 2015 at 4:30a.m. News reports, a historic Dayton building will also be getting a facelift. The Delco Building that once housed the offices of Charles Kettering is being renovated into an apartment complex. Crawford Hoying Real Estate Management purchased the building earlier this year. They were also granted tax credits of three million dollars because of the historical significance of the top floor offices. The building will undergo 24-million dollars in renovations. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Monday, July 13, 2015 at 6p.m. News reports, Ohio receives Federal Funding to help veterans with job training. The U-S Department of Labor awarded six non-profit organizations in the state, about one point five million dollars. The goal is to help transition veterans from homelessness to sustainable housing and jobs. Volunteers of America – Greater Ohio's Dayton Branch is among the organizations receiving money. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Monday, July 20, 2015 at 6p.m. News reports, Dayton's foreclosure rate is improving. Our partners at The Dayton Business Journal report Ohio seeing a steady decrease in foreclosures. The Miami Valley had about 21-hundred foreclosed properties in the first six months of this year. That's a 21 percent improvement from last year. Dayton's foreclosure rate is better than Cincinnati and Columbus. Realtors say demand is high for housing in Ohio. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Tuesday, August 4, 2015 at 4:30a.m. News reports, good news if you're in the housing market. A new study from bank rate dot com finds Ohio has the cheapest closing costs in the Nation. We average just over 16-hundred dollars on a 200-thousand dollar loan. Hawaii has the highest at over 12-hundred dollar. Analysts suggest home buyers compare at least three options before deciding on a lender. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Tuesday, August 11, 2015 at 4:30a.m. News reports, a report shows the Miami Valley is one of the best places in the country for home flipping—buying a home, fixing it up and selling it for a lot more money. Our partners at The Dayton Business Journal report the region has the second best returns for people flipping houses. Close to a 60 percent return on their investments. Experts say low available inventory and increasing sales prices are making flipping real estate a good investment in the Buckeye State. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Tuesday, August 18, 2015 at 4:30a.m. News reports, housing and urban development secretary Julian Castro, is scheduled to talk today about recovery efforts in the ten years since Hurricane Katrina. More than 18-hundred people died in five state, but most deaths were in Louisiana, after levees failed and the city flooded. According FEMA, damage has been estimated at 108-billion dollars, making it the costliest hurricane in U-S history. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Thursday, August 20, 2015 at 6p.m. News reports, Miami Valley Fair Housing Center recently expanded its work. It created the Central Ohio Fair Housing Association to keep tabs on Columbus housing. The organization just filed a lawsuit against a developer for several violations. And officials tell us what's happening in Columbus, happens here in the Miami Valley as well. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Sunday, August 23, 2015 at 11p.m. News reports, Miami University is facing a housing shortage as it welcomes its largest class ever. The University's campus in Oxford is welcoming more than 3,800 new students. A university spokeswoman says the school has contracted three apartment complexes to house more than 300 upperclassmen due to a shortage of on-campus housing. They expected the class size to shrink though as students decide to leave in the first few days. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Monday, September 21, 2015 at 4:30a.m. News reports, we're looking ahead to two big meetings tonight. First in Centerville, a housing developer is back again for a second proposal. Ryan Homes wants to build off Zengel Drive in the Pleasant Hill neighborhood. You'll recall the developer withdrew the plans back in May after a vocal opposition from neighbors who were concerned about increased traffic. Now Ryan Homes is back with a new proposal for the same area. A public hearing will be held at tonight's City Council meeting starting at 7:30. This report lasted 30 seconds.

On Monday, September 21, 2015 at 6p.m. News reports, another good sign: Dayton area home sales are up. That's according to The Dayton Area Board of Realtors. In August, our area saw a 14 percent increase in sales, with an average sales price of more than 145-thousand dollars. That exceeds last year's figures by two percent. Experts attribute the uptick to more affordable interest rates. This report lasted 20 seconds.

**WDTN addressing SOCIAL WELFARE/HEALTH during the Third Quarter of 2015. This issue was addressed in through our local produced talk shows, news programming and other programming listed below:**

On Wednesday, July 29, 2015 at 6p.m. News reports, West Nile Virus has now made the jump to people in Ohio. The first human cases of the summer are in Cuyahoga and Hamilton counties. Infected mosquitos have been reported around the state. Ohio had 11 human cases of West Nile Virus in 2014. This report lasted 15 seconds.

On Thursday, July 30, 2015 at 5p.m. News reports, a walk in Dayton is recognizing the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Medicaid. About 500 employees at Caresource walked around the Great Miami River in Downtown Dayton today. Caresource officials say Medicaid has helped American families with lower incomes get access to health services. This report lasted 15 seconds.

On Thursday, July 30, 2015 at 6p.m. News reports, tonight, we're getting a sneak peak of Preble County's first 24-hour Emergency Center. Kettering Health Network took us on a tour today of the Preble County Medical Center located on Washington-Jackson Road in Eaton. The new center includes 12 patient rooms, a pharmacy, imaging and laboratory services. The cost? 13-million dollars. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Friday, July 31, 2015 at 4:30a.m. News reports, happening now, officials are asking you to stay out of Grand Lake St. Mary's after learning algae is making people sick. Algae has been an on-going problem at the Lake but "now" it appears to have caused at least one illness. The Ohio Department of Health is putting up new signs at the Lake warning people to stay out of the water. People who live nearby say the algae problem is an old one, and it's time to make a change. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Friday, August 7, 2015 at 11p.m. News reports, A Cleveland woman has died from complications from Legionnaire's Disease. A spokeswoman for a Cleveland Hospital says a 53-year-old woman died Thursday morning. Her death comes as New York City grapples with the largest outbreak of Legionnaires disease. The illness is a form of pneumonia caused by breathing in mist contaminated with the Legionella Bacteria. In New York, 10 people have died and 100 have been diagnosed. This report lasted 30 seconds.

On Tuesday, August 25, 2015 at 4:30a.m. News reports, a shot in the arm for preventing illness, a new law means more children will be vaccinated before going to school. State lawmakers passed a measure requiring all toddlers in Daycare or Pre-school to be vaccinated. Ohio was one of only 3 states that did "not" have this requirement. Local public health officials say this decision was long overdue, after a spine in preventable illnesses. Parents can choose to opt out, but immunization specialists say that's not in the best interest of the community. This report lasted 30 seconds.

On Tuesday, August 25, 2015 at 6p.m. News reports, doctors in Columbus are monitoring a patient who traveled abroad recently. They called the situation a contagious emergency. A patient with flu-like symptoms was transported to Grant Medical Center at about 12:45p.m. The Columbus Fire Battalion Chief said the emergency was a precautionary measure. They decontaminated the ambulance and anything associated with the patient. No one at the person's home complained of any symptoms. Columbus Public Health says this is one of 36 people who traveled abroad recently to an area under caution. This report lasted 35 seconds.

The 2002 law was implemented to reduce education gaps for poor and minority students. Another provision would provide federal money to some low income children so they can attend the school of their choice. The Senate is working on its own version of the bill. On Tuesday, July 28, 2015 at 6p.m. News reports, The words on these documents paint a view of a troubled time for Amy Scarpelli. In the sentencing memorandum, she writes about her parents' health issues and the years she spent caring for them. She speaks about their deaths just months apart as a big contributor to causing a downward spiral that lead he to stealing millions of dollars from her former employer, US Band over a 4 year period. Scarpelli says an addiction to gambling took over and she began playing with money that didn't belong to her. Several other letters submitted by family members say the crime was out of character for Scarpelli. She and her attorney are asking the Judge for leanency in sentencing. According to court documents, the Government, who initially filed the lawsuit has agreed to a sentence between 48 and 70 months in prison with restitution paid. Scarpelli is asking for 48 months. She is currently on house arrest awaiting sentencing. This report lasted 50 seconds.

On Thursday, July 30, 2015 at 4:30a.m. News reports, Planned Parenthood is asking government scientists for more detailed look at fetal tissue research after videos posted online show its medical director in very explicit conversations about how that tissue is used. On Wednesday, August 19, 2015 at 4:30a.m. News reports, Officials at Wright State University are working with the Federal Government during its investigation into work programs. No injuries have been reported, but several Emergency Responders were treated and released. Authorities say they expect residents to be displaced at least through Friday.
