**WDTN addressing ECONOMY/BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT during the Second Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:**

On Wednesday, April 2, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Winter Guard International rolls into town. It's what's working in the Miami Valley. The Color Guard World Championships begin Friday with teams arriving today. That means more than 25,000 people are expected in our community over the weekend. They are expected to spend \$10 million dollars. The percussion championships are next weekend with 15,000 visitors expected to pump an additional \$5 million dollars into our economy. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Friday, April 18, 2014, **WDTN News** reported next month American Junior Golf Association will be at the Sugar Valley Golf Club in Bellbrook. The event is for high school age golfers, and is expected to bring \$100,000 into the local economy. More than 200 golfers from 25 states applied for the 78 spots. The event at Sugar Valley is free and open to the public on May 2-4. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Tuesday, April 22, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the American Medical Association looked at doctors who spend most of their time seeing patients as opposed to research or teaching. Our partners at the Dayton Business Journal report there are more than 28,000 such physicians in Ohio. Each of those doctors helps support an average of 11 other jobs adding up to 300,000 jobs statewide. That helps generate more than \$43 Billion dollars in economic activity for the state. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Wednesday, April 30, 2014, **WDTN News** reported local leaders throw their support behind a push to raise the federal minimum wage. The National Bus Tour "Give America A Raise" stopped at the Dayton Cultural and RTA Transit Center Tuesday. Mayor Nan Whaley and Lieutenant Governor Candidate Sharen Neuhardt attended the rally. Those opposed are against the government mandating what employers do with their business and believe it will decrease jobs. But those in favor say it will actually boost the economy and that taxpayers are the ones paying the price for low wages. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Friday, May 2, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Trotwood and Middletown's Targets are two of eight that will close nationwide. In late March Trotwood Mayor Joyce Sutton Cameron and City Manager Michael Lucking met with corporate officials in Minneapolis to plead their case. But in a final decision Target went the opposite direction. Customers told us they're upset to see another major retailer hurt the local economy by leaving. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Tuesday, May 6, 2014, **WDTN News** reported happening today, the Keystone Pipeline is headed to the Senate. The Senate plans to bring two bills to the floor taking on the controversial oil pipeline project. The first is a bipartisan bill in favor of building the pipeline as part of a larger energy compromise. The second addresses whether or not to build the pipeline. A decision on whether the project continues is expected to take weeks or even months. Democrats say the project will compromise the environment while Republicans say construction will add thousands of jobs and pump millions into the economy. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Tuesday, May 6, 2014, **WDTN News** reported a new sports car event has brought a lot of money racing into Wilmington. According to our partners at the Wilmington News Journal the event last month brought in \$100,000 to the local economy. More than 800 people attended the sports car event at the Wilmington Air Park during the two weekends it was held in April. People from 18 states attended the event. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, June 4, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the economy is getting a boost in the Miami Valley with two major developments unveiled. The Tipp City Meijer Distribution Center is laying the ground work to grow. The additions will include the retailer's second dairy facility. It will serve 100 stores in Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, June 6, 2014, **WDTN News** reported some promising news about the nation's economy. The government says the economy created 217,000 jobs last month, slightly more than expected. The unemployment rate remained unchanged at 6.3%. This report lasted 15-seconds.

On Thursday, June 12, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new news show Ohio matched the growth of the national economy last year. That's according to federal data released yesterday. That makes the 4<sup>th</sup> straight year that growth in the Buckeye state either matched or surpassed the national average. The statistics show the Ohio economy grew by 1.8% in 2013, ranking 26<sup>th</sup> among the states. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Tuesday, April 1, 2014, **WDTN News** reported deputies need your help finding the man who robbed Entenmann's Bakery on Needmore Road. Authorities say it happened about nine this morning when a man armed with a knife walked in, demanded money and left in a red 2-door car. If you were in the area and spotted anything call Crime Stoppers at 222-7867. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, April 2, 2014, **WDTN News** reported we expect to learn more today about a deadly shooting in a crowded park. Police say a man in his 20s was shot on the basketball court at College Hill Park. This was around 6:30 last night, when it was still light outside. Close to 100 people were at the park when the shots were fired. Investigators say many of the witnesses ran from the park after the shooting, making their job more difficult. Right now, they have not named any suspects. If you have any information that could help police, call Crime Stoppers at 222-7867. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Wednesday, April 9, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new tonight a Crime Stoppers alert from Franklin. This is from inside the Marathon gas station on State Route 123 from early this morning. You can see two people wearing dark clothes pulling cartons of cigarettes into garbage bags. They left through a broken door. Police say the pair may have left in a small white vehicle. If you know who they, call Crime Stoppers, 222-7867. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, April 30, 2014, **WDTN News** reported right now, police are looking for the people who vandalized Dayton City Hall. We got ahold of the police report today which says the vandals broke into the parking garage over the weekend. They threw traffic cones, trash cans and even a ladder onto city hall. Those items tore holes in the building's roof. A witness reported seeing four people involved. Call Crime Stoppers if you have any information. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Thursday, May 1, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Dayton police are hoping that photos of two cable thieves in action will lead to their arrests. The photos were taken by witnesses who spotted them in action. It's one of the most clicked stories at WDTN.COM tonight. Robert Lowrey explains how you can help investigators in this Crime Stoppers alert. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, May 7, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new at 11 expect to see more cameras around downtown Dayton. Police Chief Richard Biehl told the city commission tonight the first one will be installed this week. Thanks to a partnership with the Research Institute at the University of Dayton. All of the cameras will be installed in public places, like the RTA hub, public parking garages and Courthouse Square. Chief Biehl says they picked those locations because they tend to be high crime areas. He is now charged with theft. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Saturday, May 10, 2014, **WDTN News** reported we did a check tonight of Dayton's online crime tracking. Dayton has 65 neighborhoods. When looking at violent crimes over the past 2 months 15 communities saw more crime than the downtown region. Violent crime includes assaults, robberies and rapes. The Westwood Neighborhood saw the most crime with 63 incidents. Downtown, by comparison, had 21 crimes reported. However, when we checked property crimes downtown ranked as the 7<sup>th</sup> highest region. Property crimes include vandalism, shoplifting and theft from motor vehicles. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Wednesday, June 4, 2014, **WDTN News** reported this morning Dayton police are also looking for more information about a shooting that left a man in critical condition. Officers say they started getting calls just before 11:30 last night. The victim apparently called his girlfriend for help, but couldn't tell her "where" he was. Another call led police to the 100 Gordon Avenue. Officers searched the area around a vacant house and didn't find anything at first. At last check, the victim was in surgery at Miami Valley Hospital. Anyone with information should call Crime Stoppers at 222-7867. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Monday, June 9, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new at 5:30 a report is out tonight that could mean promising news from the Miami Valley. [SAFEWISE.COM](http://SAFEWISE.COM) has released a report on the 50 safest cities in Ohio. The website paired research with the latest FBI Crime Data Report. The list is based on cities with populations over 15,000 people. Here in the Miami Valley, Beavercreek, Centerville, Kettering, Lebanon, Miami Township, Springboro, Springfield Township and Vandalia, all made the list. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Wednesday, June 11, 2014, **WDTN News** reported a new model of law enforcement is showing positive trends in Clark County. Crime statistics show a 12% decrease in criminal reports from January 1<sup>st</sup> to May 31, 2013 compared to the same dates this year. Service calls are up nearly 50% from last year. While Springfield Township remains the busiest in terms of arrests made. The Clark County Sheriff's office reports fewer arrests this year. This report lasted 30-seconds.

**WDTN addressing EMPLOYMENT ISSUES AND JOBS during the Second Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:**

On Friday, April 4, 2014, **WDTN News** reports the US Department of Labor will release its employment figures in the day ahead. After months of moderate job increases, analysts expect the data to reveal a spike in employment, dropping unemployment across the US. Economists are blaming bad weather as a factor in the modest winter job growth. Some predict the numbers could show the largest increase since November. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, April 17, 2014, **WDTN News** reported good news is on the horizon for college graduates entering the job market. According to a survey from an employment consulting firm, two out of three employers plan to hire new grads. And their salaries are on the rise, up more than a percent from a year ago. That's promising news for the nearly 2 million graduates who will step into the real world this spring. But, experts say their search won't be easy. They'll compete with older, experienced workers who've been out of a job in recent years. This report lasted 30-seconds

On Wednesday, April 30,, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Hollywood Gaming is hosting the grand opening of it's new career center near the soon-to-be Dayton Raceway. The Gaming Career Center is part of a major employment push to staff Dayton's racino for it's scheduled opening later this year. The Career Center, located on Needmore Road, will help recruit and train workers. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, May 2, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the April jobs report is due out this morning. Economists expect to see more than 200,000 jobs added and the unemployment rate down slightly. In March, the unemployment rate stayed constant at 6.7% and 192,000 jobs were added. We'll have a detailed report on those numbers coming up on 2 News Today beginning at 5. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Tuesday, May 6, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new jobs will be coming to Piqua after aircraft plant decides to consolidate. Hartzell Air Movement will shut its doors in Portland, Indiana and move 30 jobs to its Miami County facility. Consolidation will begin this month and be complete in August. House speaker, John Boehner visited the Piqua plant last month and talked about how well it was doing. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, May 8, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the Montgomery County Economic Development Board approved incentives for 8 companies Wednesday totaling \$1.1 million dollars and bringing an estimated 300 jobs to the Miami Valley. Topping the requests a half million dollars for a new operations center for PSA Airlines. That is expected to create 42 jobs. Other top projects include expanding facilities at Dayton Molded Urethanes adding 80 jobs. Gayston Corp. will bring 95 jobs through a move to Miamisburg. And Prime Time Party Rental is moving from Moraine to West Carrollton adding 33 jobs. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Thursday, May 15, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Proctor & Gamble will be announcing at least 800 jobs coming to a distribution facility near the Dayton International Airport. Work has been going on in the area of Dog Leg Road and Jackson since last fall. That's in the City of Union. "Prologis" is the developer of the \$90 million dollar facility. Of course we'll be keeping a close eye on today's announcement and will bring you the latest as we learn more. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Tuesday, June 3, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Penn National Gaming is still looking to fill jobs at the new Dayton Racino. Sixty people have been hired, but there's still lots more hiring to do. Four to five hundred workers are needed for the racino which is planning to open in October. This report lasted 15-seconds.

On Wednesday, June 4, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Ferguson, one of the largest wholesale distributors of plumbing supplies across the nation, is cutting the ribbon on a new 350,000 square foot distribution center in Celina. Company and local officials as well as Governor John Kasich will be on hand for today's event. Today's grand opening brings with it 65 new jobs. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, June 25, 2014, **WDTN News** reported today marks the grand opening of the Abbott Nutrition Manufacturing facility in Tipp City. Lieutenant Governor Mary Taylor will be here for the event. The company makes products like the nutrition drink Ensure. Crews broke ground on the facility back in 2012. It could create up to 240 new jobs. This report lasted 20-seconds.

**WDTN addressing Education during the Second Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:**

On Tuesday, April 1, 2014, **WDTN News** reported a new report suggests an educational divide between white children and those of color. We read the 32 page report from the Annie E. Casey Foundation for you. It claims many minority children, especially Latino and African American, are falling behind in schools and that schools are not engineered to help bridge that gap. The study suggests racism over the years played a large role in this gap which is costing you. The report claims the US would have made billions of dollars more in 2008 had the education gap been closed before 1998. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Monday, April 7, 2014, **WDTN News** reported President Obama announced today more money to help students pay for college and get in-demand jobs. During a speech in Maryland the president announced \$100 million dollars in funding for two dozen districts around the country. The money will help students gain work experience before graduation. This report lasted 15-seconds.

On Wednesday, April 16, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Thurgood Marshall High School is the area's newest Stem school. The new designation means students will benefit from a curriculum that includes design thinking, problem-based learning and inquiry. Thurgood Marshall is only one of 22 schools statewide approved as a Stem School. Those schools must have higher education partners and business and community partners to help prepare students for high-tech jobs. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Wednesday, April 30, 2014, **WDTN News** reported two local universities are combining forces merging into one. Urbana University and Franklin University announced plans to form a new partnership making Urbana a subsidiary of Franklin. The move will allow Franklin, an online and commuter school, to move into the new roll in higher education while providing Urbana more financial support. Combined, about 12,000 students are enrolled at the two universities. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, May 2, 2014, **WDTN News** reported looking ahead, Dayton Public Schools finds its way to the spotlight. US Department of Education officials will visit the district today on the next stop of their City of Learners Listening Tour. Several agency directors will stop by the Dayton Boys Preparatory School, Ponitz Career Technology Center and Dayton Early College Academy to visit with students and staff. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Sunday, May 11, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new tonight a Dayton school is picking up some international recognition. Chaminade Julianne has been named Dayton's first Fair Trade School. That means the school supports a number of global issues including fair wages, ending human trafficking and promoting education. To achieve the distinction, several students collaborated with a local organization called "Peace on Fifth". The school will receive the award on Wednesday. CJ is just the 12<sup>th</sup> Fair Trade School in the country. This report lasted 25-second.



On Tuesday, May 13, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new this morning, a surprising change in pre-school reenrollment. For the first time since 2001, enrollment at state funded pre-schools is "down". The report "just" released says 4,000 "fewer" children attended pre-k programs in the 2012-2013 school year than the year before. Most of the declines were concentrated in larger states including California and Florida. The report also notes that Ohio met a new benchmark for adopting comprehensive early-learning standards last year. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Tuesday, June 10, 2014, **WDTN News** reported college presidents in 33 states are banding together to express their support for Common Core education standards. More than 200 college presidents and state higher education leaders say the K-12 standards are a significant improvement over what most states have now. They say the new standards are necessary to get students in the US college and career ready to be competitive in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. The standards spell out what math and English skills students should master at each grade. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Tuesday, June 10, 2014, **WDTN News** reported a new funding option to help Wright Patterson Air Force Base employees further their education. Wright State University announced today a \$750,000 scholarship fund for military personnel and civilian workers at Wright-Patt who want to pursue graduate degrees. They can now apply for up to \$75,000 in scholarship funding per year. The program also applies to spouses and dependent children. They can get up to \$25,000 per semester. And school officials say, this is just the beginning. This report lasted 205seconds.

On Friday, June 20, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the Dayton Metro library is promoting summer reading by celebrating National Summer Learning Day. It's at the downtown branch. More than 100 kids are expected to take part in the event as the library teams with Greater Dayton RTA and other local organizations to promote education over the summer. This report lasted 20-seconds.

**WDTN addressing HOUSING ISSUES/FORECLOSURES during the Second Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:**

On Wednesday, April 2, 2014, **WDTN News** reported some good news for homeowners in Ohio. A new report by real estate analyst "Corelogic" says home values in February this year were higher than last year. Corelogic says on average prices were up by 6.1% in Ohio. That's still below the nation average where home prices rose by 12%. The group says the numbers show home prices are starting to regain some of their strength following the housing crisis. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Thursday, April 17, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new this hour two developers have their eyes on new housing subdivisions in Sugarcreek Township. Ryan Homes is planning a development on Little Sugar Creek Road. The plan is to build about 100 homes starting at \$300,000. R.A. Rhoads is also planning a new high end development on Carpenter Road. Houses there are expected to go for between \$500,000 and one million dollars. New houses could go up by the end of this year. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Wednesday, April 23, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the housing market is beginning to rebound across the Buckeye State and that includes right here in the Gem City. According to the Ohio Association of Realtors home sales fell 2.3% from February to March. The number of homes sold year-to-year also dropped by 6.6% last month. And we checked and 17 of the 20 markets reported declines in home sales in March including Dayton down 4.5% from sales that occurred during the same month in 2013. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, May 1, 2014, **WDTN News** reported help is on the way to two Dayton neighborhoods. The Dayton City commission approved \$150,000 to be spent in the McCook Field and Old North Dayton neighborhoods. The decision came late Wednesday and is made possible through part of a federal grant that will help repair and paint homes and improve their energy efficiency. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Tuesday, May 6, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new at 5:30, the number of foreclosure filings are down, all across Ohio. We crunched the numbers and foreclosure case filings dropped by 40% in 2013. According to data released by the Ohio Supreme Court, this is the lowest level in 11 years. For 2013, more than 53,000 foreclosures were filed. Last year marked the 4<sup>th</sup> consecutive annual decrease. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Monday, May 19, 2014, **WDTN News** reported crews could soon break ground on new housing developments in the Miami Valley. Our partners at the Dayton Business Journal say Charles Simms Development Company is looking at adding more downtown housing options. The possible condo construction could be near the Riverfront and the ballpark and have 30-50 units each. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, May 23, 2014, **WDTN News** reported today, we will get the pulse of the housing market across the country. New home sales figures for April will be released today. Economists say sales should climb after seeing several months of declines due to lowering mortgage rates. In March, those numbers fell to their slowest pace in 17 months. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, June 6, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the city of Trotwood lets residents know in a personal way about housing money available to them. A group went door to door to distribute information about the "Inclusive Community Fund". That program provides financial assistance to people wanting to buy a home in one of two zip codes or who already live there. There are many ways people and even organizations can get money through the inclusive community fund. Contact the Miami Valley Fair Housing Center to see if you qualify. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Friday, June 13, 2014, **WDTN News** reported mortgage buyer Freddie Mac says the average rate for a 30 year loan increased this week to 4.2% from last week's 4.14%. That's still about one-quarter percent higher than this time last year. The housing market has taken a slight hit since home prices and interest rates began to rise about this time last year. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, June 19, 2014, **WDTN News** reported encouraging numbers tonight if you want to buy a home. The average rate for a fixed mortgage eased slightly today. Freddie Mac says the average rate for a 30 year loan right now is 4.17%. The average rate for a 15 year loan dropped to 3.30%. Home prices and interest rates have been on the rise since mid-2013 pricing many Americans out of the housing market. This report lasted 20-seconds.

**WDTN addressing SOCIAL WELFARE/HEALTH during the Second Quarter of 2014.**  
**This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:**

On Tuesday, April 1, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the number of confirmed cases of mumps at the Ohio State University keeps growing. Tonight, the Franklin County Health Department says there are 111 mumps patients. That includes students and faculty at the university as well as other community members. The Ohio Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics is urging doctors and parents to be vigilant about keeping vaccines up to date. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, April 2, 2014, **WDTN News** reported its national walking day and to celebrate the organization is inviting you to walk for at least 30 minutes today. If you don't know where to walk we've got some ideas. The Dayton VA Medical Center is hosting a health and wellness fair that will include a sponsored mile walk today on their campus from 11 to 1. Research shows that an hour a day of regular exercise can add about two hours to your life expectancy. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday April 30, 2014, **WDTN News** reported first mumps, now measles. New this morning, the virus has spread in central Ohio, now affecting five counties. It started in a Knox County Amish community. Now 26 cases have been reported. Officials say it began when some unvaccinated Amish traveled to the Philippines. Public health officials are urging Ohioans to stay up to date on their vaccines. Symptoms of measles include fever, cough, rash and pink eye. This report lasted 20-seconds

On Monday, May 5, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new this morning health leaders in Indiana say no "new" cases of a mysterious virus have been reported. So far the "only" case of the "Middle East Respiratory Syndrome" reported in the US is in Munster, In northwest Indiana. The man is in the hospital in good condition. He started getting sick after flying to the US late last week from Saudi Arabia, where he was a health care worker. The CDC and the World Health Organization have both issued health warnings about "MERS" which can be deadly. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, May 9, 2014, **WDTN News** reported health officials are urging people to have their vaccinations up to date ahead of the summer season. From vacations to fairs picnics to camps viruses have proven to spread quickly during the next few months. Those not up to date should contact their family doctor or their county's department of health. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, May 14, 2014, **WDTN News** reported on the heels of measles and mumps outbreak two state lawmakers introduced legislation today that would require kids in day care and preschool to be vaccinated. Right now, in Ohio, only kids going into kindergarten have to get the shots. We are the "only" state that waits so long. State health workers are distributing thousands of vaccines in response to the measles and mumps outbreak in Ohio right now. The measles outbreak is the largest in the US since 1996. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Friday, May 16, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Lunesta may help you doze off at night, but it's the morning after that has federal health officials concerned. That's why they have cut the recommended dosage from two milligrams to one milligram for the well know sleep aid. The US Food and Drug Administration says a person may be less alert and do things such as driving less safely the day after taking it. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Monday, June 2, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Dayton and Montgomery County Public Health Clinics will no longer accept walk-in visits. The new appointment model takes effect at the clinic on South Main Street which focuses on immunizations, sexually transmitted disease treatment and prevention and tuberculosis testing. Officials say the change is designed to increase client satisfaction and staff efficiency. Clinics are open Monday through Friday. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, June 5, 2014, **WDTN News** reported paperwork drama is putting health care coverage for millions of Americans in danger. Government documents show that at least two million people enrolled in the health care exchange have date discrepancies in their applications. If not fixed, they could impact not only what they pay, but what is covered. The White House believes most issues will be cleared up by summer. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Wednesday, June 25, 2014, **WDTN News** reported a milestone in the mumps outbreak spreading across the state. Health officials say the number of confirmed cases in “central Ohio” alone this year has surpassed the number of confirmed cases “nationwide” last year. Nearly half the cases have been linked to the Ohio State University. Ohio is also battling a measles outbreak. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Tuesday, April 1, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new vehicles will soon have to come equipped with backup cameras. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration ruled today backup cameras must be in all new vehicles under 10,000 pounds. The rule takes effect May 1, 2018. The camera has to show an area of 10 feet by 20 feet directly behind the vehicle. The government agency says the technology will reduce back-over crashes. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, April 9, 2014, **WDTN News** reported there's a new option at the school lunch table but a new study shows students aren't always happy with it. That study shows that most schools are following along with a new government mandate that requires them to provide free drinking water at lunchtime. Bu researchers say it's not working perfectly. Students aren't always allowed to get up and get a drink, and some have questioned the quality of the water available. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Friday, April 18, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the Obama administration updated the privacy policy on the administration's website "whitehouse.gov". There are no significant changes but a lot of the legal terminology has been taken out to make it easier to understand. The new policy comes as the white house faces increasing scrutiny for their surveillance tactics revealed by Edward Snowden. Government officials say the changes only affect the "whitehouse.gov" website but no social media pages or sites. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Wednesday April 23, 2014, **WDTN News** reported it's marking a major victory for gun rights. At noon today, Georgia's governor will sign what critics are calling quote "the most extreme gun bill in America" into law. It will give licensed gun owners in the state the right to take their weapons into more public places including bars and government buildings. The law also authorizes school districts to appoint staffers to carry firearms and churches to opt in if they want to allow weapons as well. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Tuesday, May 6, 2014, **WDTN News** reported looking ahead, Ohio's top money manager is headed to the Miami Valley. Treasurer Josh Mandel is hosting an economic roundtable in Dayton today. He will be visiting the Montgomery County Jobs Center this morning to meet with local leaders to discuss workforce development and economic initiatives in place to help local companies. Today's roundtable will begin at 9. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Tuesday, May 13, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new at 5:30 a follow up to a recent General Motors recall. GM's recall of 2.6 million small cars has exposed gaps in the government's knowledge about air bags. Thirteen people have died in crashes involving GM cars with defective ignition switches. In each of those crashes, the air bags failed to deploy after the engine stalled. Federal safety regulators say air bags should have worked for up to 60 seconds. The National Highway Traffic Safety Agency is investigating. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, May 15, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new this morning, the Ohio Senate proposes that high school seniors have to pass a new requirement in order to get their diploma. Under a bill passed by the state senate students would have to take a world history and civilizations class before graduating. Currently, world history is not a social studies requirement. Students must take American history and government, along with two social studies electives. The proposal would require that one elective be world history. The senate passed the bill unanimously Wednesday. Now it goes to the house for consideration. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Monday, June 9, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the wireless landscape is a step closer to resting in the hands of the federal government. Reports indicate Sprint and T-Mobile are closing in on finalizing a 32-billion dollar merger. Once finalized, federal regulators must approve the deal that would unite the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> largest carriers. Together, the company would rival industry leaders Verizon and AT&T. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, June 12, 2014, **WDTN News** reported a government wide effort is now underway to address a deepening crisis along the Rio Grande Valley where thousands of undocumented children are making their way into the US from Central America. Danielle Leigh reports on the steps the Obama Administration is taking to handle what's being called a humanitarian crisis involving minors crossing the border. This report lasted 15-seconds.

On Wednesday, June 25, 2014, **WDTN News** reported new at 11 a house panel demands the postal service keep mail delivery on Saturdays. You may remember house GOP leaders are in favor of a plan that would use the money saved by ending Saturday service to boost the government's highway fund. But today, the appropriations committee went the other way voting to preserve six-day mail delivery. This report lasted 0-seconds.

On Friday, April 11, 2014, **WDTN News** reported that's because Saturday and Sunday is the county's trash bash. More than 1,000 volunteers and organizations will be participating. They are picking up litter along 635 miles of county and township roads. Participants will wear bright green shirts to increase visibility. Drivers should be on the lookout at all times because the clean up runs from dawn to dusk. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Monday, April 21, 2014, **WDTN News** reported looking ahead hazardous waste is hitting close to home and you can speak your piece. Many Clark County residents are concerned with just how close the Tremont City Barrel Fill site is to the Springfield's water supply. That site contains about three million gallons of hazardous waste. Wittenberg University's department of Geography is hosting a public forum to discuss plans for the site. It's Monday, April 21<sup>st</sup> from 7 to 8:30 PM at the Barbara Deer Kuss Science Center in Springfield. Among those on hand to answer questions Wittenberg scientists, representatives from the EPA, Clark County Combined Health District and other city officials. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Tuesday, May 6, 2014, **WDTN News** reported happening today, the Senate takes up the Keystone Pipeline. The Senate plans to bring two bills to the floor that addresses the controversial oil pipeline project. The first is a bipartisan bill in favor of building the pipeline as part of a larger energy compromise. The second addresses whether to build the pipeline at all. Democrats say the project will compromise the environment while republicans say construction will add thousands of jobs and pump millions into the economy. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Wednesday, May 7, 2014, **WDTN News** reported ever wonder what earth looks like from space in high definition? Wonder no more. NASA is now providing a live HD video stream of the blue planet as seen by astronauts on the international space station. The ISS is equipped with four high def earth facing cameras. It's all part of an experiment to assess camera quality for use in space. NASA hopes to find out how the cameras are able to survive and function in the extreme radioactive environment of low-earth orbit. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, May 28, 2014, **WDTN News** reported the city of Middletown is helping you to be kind to the environment. City leaders are taking extra steps to encourage residents to recycle with free bins 500 of them. Officials say fewer than one out of every 3-residents recycles. To drive that number up the city will drop the bins off throughout town. This report lasted 15-seconds.

On Monday, June 2, 2014, **WDTN News** reported today, the Environmental Protection Agency will outline how it plans to cut carbon dioxide emissions from power plants. It's the main part of President Obama's climate action plan agenda. The rules outlined today aim to reduce carbon dioxide emissions from existing power plants by 30k% by the year 2030. This report lasted 20-seconds.



On Tuesday, June 3, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Mayor Nan Whaley along with a health expert and environmental activists held a news conference downtown. It was part of a national day of action to support President Obama's carbon rules announcement. May Whaley says the new federal carbon limits are in line with plans already underway in Dayton. She says the efforts are part of the city's green initiative passed in January. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Monday, June 9, 2014, **WDTN News** reported one of the oldest buildings on Cedarville University's campus is coming down. Collins Hall was the second building constructed on the campus in 1943. But now, part of the buildings façade is breaking apart, making it a hazard. Crews are tearing it down to leave room for green space. Both students and faculty say they have fond memories of the building including how it helped keep them safe. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, June 19, 2014, **WDTN News** reported happening today, Waste Management is going green. The company is dedicating its newest fleet of compressed natural gas trucks today in Fairborn. 33 new CNG trucks will begin their service in the Dayton area. The new fleet is greener and cleaner than diesel options and is only the second company fleet running on the fuel in the state. Today's dedication takes place at Waste Management's Fairborn facility at noon. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Sunday, June 29, 2014, **WDTN News** reported Ohio ranks 3<sup>rd</sup> in hazardous spill according to a new federal transportation report. Since 2005 the state has had more than 250 serious incidents involving hazardous material on railways and roadways. That puts the state third in the nation behind only California and Texas. The clean up of all the spills has cost Ohio \$38 million dollars. The incidents have also lead to the evacuation of 3700 people. This report lasted 25-seconds.
