1. NATURE PARK

Host Judy Johnson welcomes Dr. Jeff Beacham, Executive Director of the Conestee Foundation. This non-profit group is developing a unique nature park in Greenville County. The old Conestee Mill property which consists of approximately 250 acres of wetlands and 2 miles of the Reedy River will be protected for future generations. It will provide access to a wide diversity of ecosystems from wild wetlands to upland and bottomland forests. It will serve as a sanctuary for wildlife such as waterfowl, songbirds, beaver, deer, foxes, otters, herons egrets, raptors and kingfishers. The park will include trails, boardwalks, wildlife

viewing stations, paddling accommodations, group activity areas, an educational center and a rustic conference facility. The trails should be open as early as Fall 2006.
