ALYSON COURTNEY REPORTED WALMART IS ADDING ABOUT 10-THOUSAND RETAIL JOBS. THE POSITIONS WILL COME FROM THE OPENING OF 59 NEW, EXPANDED AND RELOCATED WALMART AND SAM'S CLUB LOCATIONS, AND ALSO FROM E-COMMERCE SERVICES THAT WERE PREVIOUSLY ANNOUNCED. THE RETAILER IS OPENING FEWER STORES THIS YEAR, BUT IS ADDING JOBS FOR ONLINE GROCERY PICKUP AND TRAINERS AT ITS NEW ACADEMIES FOR WORKERS. THE COMPANY WILL ALSO GENERATE ABOUT 24-THOUSAND CONSTRUCTION JOBS FOR REMODELS. AND, TOMORROW THE NEW SAM'S CLUB AT THE LEWIS CROSSING SHOPPING CENTER IN CONWAY WILL HAVE ITS GRAND OPENING AT 8 A-M.

CHRIS KANE REPORTED THE CITY OF CONWAY IS EVER GROWING AND LAST NIGHT THE CONWAY AREA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE UNVEILED THE "CONWAY 125 CAMPAIGN." IT'S SEVEN GENERATION- DEFINING PUBLIC AND PRIVATE PROJECTS IDENTIFIED THROUGH THE CONWAY 2025 COMMUNITY VISIONING PROCESS. ELICIA DOVER REPORTED THE DEPARTMENT OF WORKFORCE SERVICES SAYS IMPLEMENTING DRUG TESTING INTO THIS WELFARE PROGRAM HAS SAVED THOUSANDS FOR THE STATE. CRITICS SAY IT'S NOT ABOUT THE MONEY--BUT THE CONNOTATION THAT NEEDY FAMILIES ARE ON DRUGS. OF THE 3,000 PEOPLE THAT APPLIED FOR WELFARE LAST YEAR. 17 VOLUNTARILY CHECKED ON A FORM THAT THEY WERE EITHER TAKING ILLEGAL DRUGS OR LOST THEIR JOB BECAUSE OF IT. "WE THEN ASK THEM TO TAKE A DRUG TEST THEY HAVE THE OPTION TO DECLINE." 11 DECLINED OF THE 17 ASKED FOR A DRUG TEST. "IF THEY DECLINE, THEY WILL BE REFUSED BENEFITS." 6 ACTUALLY TOOK A DRUG TEST...OF THOSE 6, 4 PASSED AND ONLY TWO FAILED. IF THOSE FAILING AGREE TO DRUG COUNSELING...PAID FOR BY THEMSELVES...THEN THEIR CHILDREN CAN STAY ON BENEFITS. IF TREATMENT IS REFUSED, BENEFITS ARE STOPPED. "BOTH OF THOSE INDIVIDUALS DECLINED TREATMENT." THOSE 17 DRUG TESTS COST THE STATE 243 DOLLARS LAST YEAR. WORKFORCE SERVICES SAYS NO ADDITIONAL STAFF WERE HIRED OR EXTRA HOURS WORKED. BUT THEY DO POINT TO SAVINGS. A FAMILY OF THREE ON WELFARE...COSTS THE STATE ABOUT \$200 A MONTH. SINCE 13 PEOPLE EITHER REFUSED A TEST OR FAILED...THEY SAY THAT SAVED THE

STATE AN AVERAGE OF \$31 THOUSAND DOLLARS. BUT ELLIE WHEELER WITH ARKANSAS ADVOCATES FOR FAMILY AND CHILDREN SAYS IT'S NOT ABOUT THE MONEY...BUT THE MESSAGE IT SENDS. "THERE'S REALLY NO REASON TO SINGLE OUT THIS GROUP OF PEOPLE IN ARKANSAS AND ASSUME THEY HAVE DIFFERENT DRUG ABUSE AND USE RATES THAN ANYONE ELSE." SHE SAYS THE SIMPLE FACT ONLY 13 PEOPLE OUT OF THE ENTIRE PROGRAM WERE IDENTIFIED SHOWS IT'S INEFFECTIVE. "IF OUR GOAL IS TO HELP ARKANSANS WHO HAVE DRUG ABUSE PROBLEMS YOU KNOW WE'RE NOT GOING TO DO IT TWO PEOPLE A YEAR." SO FAR ONLY THREE PEOPLE HAVE AGREED TO A TEST THIS YEAR. A BILL WOULD MAKE THIS PILOT PROGRAM PERMANENT.

BETH HUNT REPORTED GARY HOLMES HAS HAD MENTAL EVALUATIONS IN THE PAST FOR A CASE THAT HE'S CURRENTLY ON PROBATION FOR. AND HIS ATTORNEY SAYS HE ASKED FOR ONE IN THIS CASE AS A PRECAUTION. "HE'S NOT GUILTY." THOSE WORDS SPOKEN BY ATTORNEY RONALD L. DAVIS JUNIOR ... ON BEHALF OF GARY HOLMES. THURSDAY MORNING ... HOLMES APPEARED AT PULASKI COUNTY COURTHOUSE ... FACING A FIRST DEGREE MURDER CHARGE IN THE DEATH OF THREE-YEAR-OLD ACEN KING. POLICE SAY BACK ON DECEMBER 17TH HOLMES FIRED A SHOT INTO THE CAR OF KIM KING-MACON ... IN SOUTHWEST LITTLE ROCK ... HITTING AND KILLING HER GRANDSON. HOLMES PLED "NOT GUILTY BY REASON OF MENTAL DISEASE OR DEFECT." HIS ATTORNEY ASKED THAT A MENTAL EVALUATION BE PERFORMED ... SAYING IT WILL HELP IN DETERMINING WHETHER OR NOT HOLMES WAS LEGALLY RESPONSIBLE FROM A MENTAL HEALTH STANDPOINT AT THE TIME OF THE ALLEGED INCIDENT. "WE BY NO MEANS ARE ADMITTING THAT HE IS, IN FACT, GUILTY OF WHAT HE IS CHARGED WITH, BUT IT'S A PROCEDURAL MEASURE AT THIS POINT," HOLMES WAS ORIGINALLY CHARGED WITH CAPITAL MURDER AND TWO COUNTS OF COMMITTING A TERRORISTIC ACT. NOW ... HE'S CHARGED WITH FIRST DEGREE MURDER ... AND POSSESSION OF A FIREARM BY CERTAIN PERSONS ... ALONG WITH THE REMAINING TWO COUNTS OF COMMITTING A TERRORISTIC ACT. JOHN JOHNSON, CHIEF DEPUTY, PULASKI COUNTY PROSECUTING ATTORNEY'S OFFICE: "SOMETIMES UPON REVIEW OF THE ENTIRE INVESTIGATIVE FILE THE CHARGES DO CHANGE FROM WHAT WAS CHARGED BY POLICE AND WHAT THE PROSECUTOR'S OFFICE THINKS IS THE APPROPRIATE CHARGE." HOLMES FAMILY WAS IN COURT ... BUT DIDN'T WANT TO SPEAK TO US ON CAMERA. NO DATE HAS BEEN SCHEDULED FOR THE MENTAL EVALUATION ... BUT IT WILL HAVE TO BE DONE BY MAY 15TH ... THE DATE HOLMES WILL BE BACK IN COURT.

STACEY SPIVEY REPORTED THE VETERANS I SPOKE WITH AT THE VFW 90-95 FEEL THEY WORKED HARD AND SACRIFICED TO SERVE OUR COUNTRY AND THOSE PRETENDING TO HAVE DONE SO, DON'T DESERVE RECOGNITION. LOOKING AT FORMER ARMY PARATROOPER RICHARD PLATO...YOU CAN SEE RIGHT AWAY HE SERVED HIS COUNTRY. "I'M VERY PROUD TO WEAR THIS. I WEAR IT EVERY DAY." "YOU'RE TAKING ADVANTAGE OF OUR COUNTRY. YOU KNOW, THIS IS NOT RIGHT. I SUGGEST YOU GO BACK AND PAY WHAT YOU TOOK OFF OF THAT BILL. AND 9/10THS OF THE TIME THEY'RE SCARED OF ME BECAUSE I'M PRETTY BIG AND THEY'LL GO BACK (LAUGHS)." A PROPOSED BILL WOULD MAKE IMPERSONATING A MILITARY SERVICE MEMBER A CRIME IN THIS STATE... IF THAT PERSON INTENDS TO DEFRAUD... HARASS... OR INTIMIDATE SOMEONE WHILE PRETENDING TO BE A SERVICE MEMBER. SOMETHING VETERAN JAMES TERRY SAYS IS NEEDED TO PROTECT EVERYTHING THEY FOUGHT FOR. "THE WORLD IS FULL OF WANNABES. AND IF YOU WANNABE, ALL YOU HAVE TO DO IS STEP UP AND BE." THERE'S ALREADY A

FEDERAL LAW THAT PROHIBITS PEOPLE FROM USING MILITARY MEDALS THEY ARE NOT A RECEPIENT OF...IN ORDER TO GET SOME KIND OF BENEFIT.

SATURDAY ... THE "VETERANS FOOD PANTRY CABOT" HAD ITS GRAND OPENING. SERVING 8 FAMILIES AND GIVING AWAY OVER 200 POUNDS OF FOOD. ITS OPERATED BY HICKEY AND A SMALL GROUP OF VOLUNTEERS ... ON SOUTH ROCKWOOD ROAD. DEYONKA HICKEY, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, VETERANS FOOD PANTRY CABOT: "WE STARTED PROBABLY AROUND JULY WITH PLAYING AROUND WITH THE IDEA, AND WE CONTACTED THE NATIONAL FOUNDATION FOR FEED OUR VETERANS IN OCTOBER I WOULD SAY." VETERANS AND THEIR FAMILIES CAN COME IN ON THE THIRD SATURDAY OF EVERY MONTH ... SHOP ... AND LEAVE WITH GROCERIES. FOR FREE! THE PANTRY HAS CANNED GOODS ... NON-KPERISHABLE FOOD ITEMS ... AND EVEN HYGIENE PRODUCTS. "WE ALSO HAVE A SECTION OF PERSONAL HYGIENE ITEMS AND I LIKE TO KEEP THAT UP, BECAUSE YOU CAN'T GET THAT WITH THE FOOD STAMPS OR THE EBT CARD." SHOPPERS JUST SHOW MILITARY I-D ... V-A HEALTH CARD AND STATE ISSUED I-D TO SHOP. AS AN AIR FORCE VETERAN HERSELF ... WORKING AT THE V-A HOSPITAL ... THIS IS HICKEY'S WAY OF GIVING BACK. "I REMEMBER HOW IT WAS WHEN THE KIDS WERE LITTLE, HOW THE STRUGGLE WAS, BECAUSE YOU ONLY GOT PAID TWICE A MONTH, AND RETIREES ONLY GET PAID ONCE A MONTH. NOW SHE'S FIGHTING FOR HOUSE BILL 12-22 TO BENEFIT OTHER PARENTS LIKE HER. "IT IS VERY IMPORTANT IN A STATE LIKE ARKANSAS THAT PARENTS ARE ALLOWED TO SEEK THOSE OPTIONS ESPECIALLY WHEN PARENTS DON'T HAVE THE FINANCIAL RESOURCES TO DO SO." HOUSE BILL 12-22 WOULD CREATE AN EDUCATION SAVINGS ACCOUNT...GIVING PARENTS \$6700 AND THE CHOICE TO TAKE THE MONEY TO FUND THEIR STUDENT'S EDUCATION AT A PRIVATE SCHOOL OR HOMESCHOOL. "THIS ACTUALLY SAVES THE STATE MONEY BECAUSE MOST SCHOOLS SPEND \$9,000 - 12,000 ON EACH CHILD. THIS IS ONLY A \$6,700 PROGRAM." BUSINESSES, NON PROFITS OR INDIVIDUALS WOULD HAVE THE CHOICE TO FUND THE ACCOUNT WITH THEIR INCOME TAX DOLLARS. "IF GENERAL REVENUE GOES DOWN THEN HOW IS IT NOT PUBLIC TAX MONEY?" EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE ARKANSAS ASSOCIATION OF EDUCATIONAL ADMINISTRATORS TELLS KATV THIS DISCRIMINATES AGAINST PUBLIC SCHOOLS, THEIR PARENTS AND THEIR STUDENTS. "AT THE END OF THE DAY IF YOU'RE GOING TO USE PUBLIC MONEY, THEN THERES CERTAIN THINGS THAT THE PUBLIC SHOULD EXPECT FROM THOSE DOLLARS AND THIS IS JUST A BAD BILL." ANOTHER INTERESTING POINT ABOUT THIS BILL...ABERNATHY SAYS IF ANY OF THOSE FUNDS ARE LEFT OVER...A PRIVATE SCHOOL OR HOMESCHOOL PARENTS CAN SAVE THAT MONEY FOR THEIR CHILD'S COLLEGE TUITION. PUBLIC SCHOOL PARENTS WOULD NOT HAVE THAT OPTION.

CHARLOTTE DOUGLAS, (R) AR: "IF WE HAVE A JUNIOR OLYMPIC SWIMMER THAT'S SWIMMING TWO OR THREE HOURS EVERY AFTERNOON, SHE NEEDS--SHE/HE NEEDS TO GET THAT PE CREDIT IF WE CAN WORK THAT OUT." IF PASSED ... THE BILL WOULD BENEFIT STUDENTS WHO MAY BE ON A-A-U BASKETBALL TEAMS ... TAKING KARATE ... OR PARTICIPATING IN MARCHING BAND. IT WOULD ALSO ALLOW EXEMPTIONS FOR STUDENTS WHOSE HEALTH WON'T ALLOW THEM TO TAKE P-E. OR IF PARTICIPATING IN P-E CLASSES WOULD VIOLATE THE STUDENT'S RELIGIOUS BELIEFS. IT WOULD TAKE EFFECT IN THE 20-17 ... 20-18 SCHOOL YEAR .. AND SOME PARENTS WHO HAVE SONS GOING IN TO HIGH SCHOOL ... THINK IT WOULD BE A GOOD IDEA. CASONIA VINSON, PARENT OF 8TH GRADER: "A LOT OF TIMES WHEN THEY DO OUTSIDE ACTIVITIES, WE AS PARENTS HAVE TO PAY FOR THEM, SO WHY NOT LET THAT COUNT TOWARDS HIGH SCHOOL CREDIT." CHASITY MEREDITH, PARENT OF 8TH GRADER: "HE GETS A LOT OF GYM TIME AT THE BOYS CLUB AND HE PLAYS SUMMER BALL TOO." THEY SAY IT WILL FREE UP THEIR SONS FOCUS ON OTHER SUBJECTS. "HE LOVES MATH, BUT THAT ENGLISH, HE KIND OF STRUGGLE A LITTLE BIT WITH IT, SO IF HE COULD FOCUS MORE ON THAT AND PICK UP SOMETHING EXTRA WITH THAT." "I'D LIKE FOR HIM TO FOCUS ON READING. THAT'S NOT ONE OF HIS STRONG POINTS, AND IT'S SOMETHING HE REALLY DOESN'T LIKE TO DO. I PERSONALLY LOVE TO READ, SO I'D LIKE TO SEE HIM SPEND A LITTLE MORE TIME READING." WHILE MANY KNOW SHANE CARTER AS SPOKESPERSON FOR CLINTON NATIONAL AIRPORT - WHAT FEW KNOW IS THAT CARTER'S BEEN CRAFTING LEGISLATION TO OPEN THOUSANDS OF SEALED BIRTH CERTIFICATES OF ADULTS LIKE HIMSELF WHO WERE ADOPTED. "MY PARENTS WERE VERY OPEN ABOUT IT - BUT ABOUT FIVE YEARS AGO I STARTED NEEDING MORE INFORMATION. I STARTED HAVING SOME HEALTH ISSUES AND I JUST HAD NO WHERE TO GO. WHEN HE BEGAN TO SEARCH FOR MORE INFO - A STATE AGENCY WAS ABLE TO PROVIDE HIM WITH SOME DETAILS. BUT THE IDENTITY OF HIS BIRTH PARENTS - AND HENCE FAMILY MEDICAL HISTORY - *REMAINED SEALED. AROUND THAT TIME - CARTER CONNECTED WITH STATE REPRESENTATIVE DEBORAH FERGUSON- AS WELL AS STATE REP. CHRIS RICHEY - A PROUD PARENT OF TWO ADOPTED CHILDREN. BOTH LEGISLATORS FILING HOUSE BILL 1636 - WHICH WOULD ALLOW ADOPTEES OVER THE AGE OF 21 TO GAIN ACCESS TO THEIR ORIGINAL BIRTH CERTIFICATE. "UNDERSTANDING THE IMPORTANCE OF HAVING THEIR BIOLOGICAL MEDICAL HISTORY WAS IMPORTANT FOR OUR FAMILY AND I WANTED TO GIVE THAT SAME OPPORTUNITY TO OTHER ADOPTEES." BOTH CARTER AND HIS ADOPTIVE MOTHER ON HAND FOR THE SIGNING. ACCORDING TO 2010 CENSUS DATA - THERE WERE MORE THAN 20-THOUSAND ADOPTED CHILDREN LIVING WITH THEIR ADOPTIVE FAMILIES. BUT THERE ARE THOUSANDS MORE LIKE CARTER - ADOPTED ADULTS - LIVING ON THEIR OWN.

FCC Schedule for Closed-Captioning Requirements

The following phase-in schedule applies to the captioning and broadcast of all new programming. It is measured on a calendar-quarter basis and a 20-hour broadcast day, as programming between 2am and 6am does not have to be captioned.

- Between January 1, 2000, and December 31, 2001, program distributors must provide at least 450 hours of captioned programming per calendar quarter, which is approximately five hours per day. If the program distributor provides less than 450 hours of new programming, then 95 percent of its new programming must be captioned.
- Between January 1, 2002, and December 31, 2003, program distributors must provide at least 900 hours of captioned video programming per calendar quarter, or 10 hours per day. If the programming distributor provides less than 900 hours of new programming, then 95 percent of its new programming must be captioned.
- Between January 1, 2004, and December 31, 2005, program distributors must provide at least an average of 1,350 hours of captioned video programming per calendar quarter, or 15 hours per day. If the program distributor provides less than 1,350 hours of new programming, then 95 percent of its new programming must be captioned.
- **As of January 1, 2006, and thereafter, 100 percent of the program distributors' new programming must be captioned.**
