Section I. Issues

The station has identified the following topics as significant issues facing our community in this quarter:

- A. **Drug Abuse and Safety:** Raising awareness on the increasing problem in the Billings community involving the use of drugs both prescription and over the counter. Programs cover this quarter included segments concerning generic drug safety, CBD oils and drug misuse. The programs covered what can be done to protect people from drug makers cutting corners and putting people at risk. One segment covered how the high prescription drug prices are causing people to misuse the prescriptions in order to afford them such as skipping doses. This segment discussed what people can do to help with the problem. Programs also covered the new craze on CBD oils and what the risks are using these oils. It's a growing concern in the community and CBD oils are now sold almost everywhere. This program covered topics on the FDA status and what the benefits really are.
- B. **Youths at Risk:** Issues in the Billings community for youth at risk is becoming a big concern. Raising awareness for this problem this quarter focused on bullying, weight loss, breastfeeding and vaccinations. Segments included how weight loss surgery for children can help children being bullied due to obesity but may not be the best answer. Other segments covered vaccinations and the rise in new cases of measles. Why parents are not vaccinating children and how to promote public health due to this concern. Segments also talked about hurdles and challenges in breastfeeding in this day and age.
- C. **Women's Health Care Issues:** Raising awareness in the community on healthcare issues involving women's health. Topics included birth control related to autoimmune disorders, preeclampsia and pregnancy. Segments airing this quarter included discussions on can IUDs, and other contraceptives trigger autoimmune diseases such as lupus and rheumatoid arthritis. Another segment covered preeclampsia and new tests for it. We also held an event in April for women to attend free of charge with vendors relating to women and their needs.
- D. **Technology-** Issues involving the use of technology and how technology has played a part to both help and hinder our society. Issues involving symptom searching on the internet pros and cons, research and how our lives have improved due to the internet. Segments covered research the workings of the immune system, the miracles of transplants, and google searches for symptoms and how it can create panic or comfort.
- E. **Family Issues-** Issues involving family's including powerful influenced in our lives, Segment included how friends are the most powerful people in our lives. Expert's discuss the way friends determine our behavior and attitudes and even our health.
