HEALTH/GRIEF Learned that the Highmark Caring Place was started by a former Executive Director who experienced a family loss – and realized there was nowhere for his teenaged son to get help with his grieving. You don't have to have Highmark Insurance to participate in this FREE program. It is geared toward children up to 18 – and their families, who have experienced a loss and are grieving. They have had to do their programs virtually during COVID, and they have been successful. In fact, they have added a program for those 18 – 30 with no children – just to be able to reach out to more people, since so many are hurting now. Learned that some people don't reach out, because they either think their children are OK, or they are afraid it will be too sad of an experience, not realizing that kids find out that they are not alone in their experiences and feelings. They & their families get support & encouragement, facilitated by trained adult volunteers. The Caring Place also provides educational programs, consultation services, presentations and resources for schools and other professionals in the community who work with children. 30m

HEALTH/DISABILITY ASSISTANCE/ Recognized Shona during Women in History Month – she has been a trailblazer since she was a child and has to overcome challenges with how people/institutions/businesses think about and treat individuals with disabilities. Heard how all of those experiences made her want to be an advocate and be involved in programs that would assure no one else had to go through what she did, leading her to VFI. Talked about how their services have had to change during this pandemic – they have a much larger online presence and will probably have a hybrid in person/virtual model moving forward. Talked about some of their programs & reminded folks that if they have had an injury that caused a disability to please reach out30m.

CULTURE – Learned that Ms. Jenkins-Husbands has been involved with helping/serving the community ever since she was a child in Mississippi. Her family moved here in the 70's, to be closer to her sister, and Ms Jenkins-Husband worked on setting up the JFK Center. She worked on funding, as well as worked with the children and youth, to show them that they had many opportunities to look forward to. She was the 1st African American woman to serve on Erie City Council. Learned about the projects she was involved with, including her passion to help those touched by Sickle Cell Anemia, which she still does today, through the JFK center. Talked about the challenges they face through the pandemic – and how to reach out for help. 10m

		supplies that they need. Heard that they get some support
		from Walmart (as well as donations) to help with their main
		program – but, also with a program called Good 360 with
		Walmart – where non-profits can buy items from the VMS at
		a large discount, which helps the non-profit by paying less
		than they would usually have to payproceeds go to help
		rent for VMC. Talked about how to give back, by attending
