4/1/14 – 6/30/14 (all times Eastern)

ISSUES IN EDUCATION - *President Eric Barron has stepped down from his position at Florida State University to go to Penn State. During the search for the next President of the University, there will be no "Issues in Education" program. It is expected that when a new President is chosen, the program will resume.*

CAPITOL UPDATE – Sundays at 10:30AM

Capitol Update is a half-hour program that explains the most significant developments in Florida's Legislative, Judicial and Executive branches - in everyday terms. Through in-depth reporting, regularly occurring segments – such as "Budget Watch" and "Bill Track" – and live interviews, Capitol Update provides viewers across the state with a clear, concise and balanced view of state government in action. *Note: the 2014 Legislative Session began on Monday, March 3rd. Capitol Update aired nightly at 6pm & 11pm during the week with a weekly round-up on Friday's show, which aired Sundays at 10:30am. Session ended on May 2nd.*

4/6/14 - #201425 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: Both the Senate and House defend and pass their respective spending plans this fifth week of session; A series of bills helping veterans, protecting Florida's children, and rolling back taxes, receive final approval from the Governor; The Florida Parole Commission walks for justice, ahead of National Crime Victim's Rights Week.

4/13/14 - #201430 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: House passes a bill that would make more Florida students eligible for Opportunity Scholarships; House passes a bill that would allow gun owners to carry their firearms without a permit during emergency evacuations declared by state or local authorities; Senate budget committee approves its own version of a tax cut bill, including a tax break on cellphone bills and a 3-day sales tax holiday for school supplies.

4/20/14 - #201435 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. In this special legislative update edition: The Florida House and Senate are poised to work out their differences in their 2014-15 state budgets; A look at some of the legislative priorities of the 2014 session that have already been signed into law; A review of other issues lawmakers are still working on with just two weeks to go in this year's session.

4/27/14 - #201440 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: House and Senate budget chairs meet to start the process of working out differences in the state budget plan; House approves a bill that sets up a process for professional sports teams to apply for state tax incentives; After final passage by the Senate, a bill is on the way to the Governor that says abortions can't be performed in Florida once the fetus has reached "viability," meaning it could survive outside the womb using standard medical procedures.

CAPITOL UPDATE continued

5/4/14 - #201445 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. On the last day of the legislative session, a review and live report on the ongoing process of passing a state budget, including: House sends the immigrant tuition bill to the Governor, defeating amendments that would have sent it back to the Senate; Senate passes the "Charlottes Web" medical marijuana bill, sending it to the Governor for approval.

5/11/14 - #1710 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: A review of bills passed by the legislature and others that failed; State leaders and agencies respond to the flooding disaster in the Panhandle; Memorials in the capital city for fallen law enforcement officers from around the state.

5/18/14 - #1711 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: The Governor signs dozens of bills, including one that includes sales tax holidays for hurricane preparedness, school supplies and more; Education Commissioner Pam Stewart visits schools around the state to explain changes in education bills the Governor has signed; Three people are inducted into the Florida Civil Rights Hall of Fame.

5/25/14 - #1712 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: Report on the first week of the trial over the Congressional redistricting process; Department of Education releases initial FCAT results; State agencies prepare for hurricane season.

6/1/14 - #1713 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: Interview and hurricane supplies shopping trip with the state's official meteorologist in preparation for hurricane season and the hurricane supplies sales tax holiday; Review of insurance advice and limitations for hurricane season; Second week of testimony in the trial over challenges to the Congressional districts map.

6/8/14 - #1714 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: The Governor signs the biggest budget in state history; we review what made it and the items he vetoed; The legislature delivers more than 100 other bills to the Governor; The Department of Education releases the latest round of FCAT scores.

6/15/14 - #1715 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: The Governor signs 97 bills into law this week, including a measure that allows children of undocumented immigrants to pay in-state tuition at Florida's state colleges and universities; The state asks that seven more counties get federal help to respond to spring flooding; The latest version of a respected guide to Florida's past is now available online.

6/22/14 - #1716 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: A review of actions taken by the Board of Governors, including decisions on performance funding for state universities; Updates on more than 60 bills signed by the Governor this week; A look at how the state budget is providing funds to replace a county courthouse in such dangerous condition the public isn't allowed inside.

6/29/14 - #1717 Capitol Update is a weekly review of state government. Topics include: Thousands of Florida homeowners may get a break on property insurance premiums as a result of action by Citizens Property Insurance; The Governor signs the last batch of bills approved this year by the legislature; On Apalachicola Bay, research is underway on the use of fossilized oyster shells in oyster seeding projects.
