Jack Hammond is a retired U.S. Army Brigadier General with multiple combat commands, and currently serves as the Chief Executive for the Home Base National Center of Excellence for Mental Health and Brain Injuries. He is a decorated combat leader and private sector innovator who has served on advisory groups for presidents, governors and businesses.

Home Base is a national nonprofit dedicated to healing the invisible wounds of war for Veterans of all eras, Service Members, Military Families and Families of the Fallen through world-class, direct clinical care, wellness, education and research – all at no cost to them – regardless of era of service, discharge status or geographical location. The program was founded by Massachusetts General Hospital and the Boston Red Sox.

Since 2009, Home Base has served more than 30,000 Veterans and their Family Members and trained over 85,000 clinicians across the nation, and we remain at the forefront of discovering new treatments to ensure a brighter future for Warriors and their Families.

WOUNDED WARRIOR PROJECT:

Dr. Erin Fletcher has a decade of experience in veteran mental health care at Wounded Warrior Project. She currently serves as director of Warrior Care Network, a partnership between Wounded Warrior Project and four world-famous treatment facilities helping advance treatment and research for invisible wounds of war.

Tonya Oxendine served 30 years in the U.S. Army, reaching the high rank of Command Sergeant Major. After service, she struggled with depression, isolation, and PTSD. It led her to nearly drive off a bridge in an attempted suicide. Tonya used her last ounce of strength to seek help and is now thriving. She credits the care and support she received from Wounded Warrior Project programs for her recovery; she’s taken part in Warrior Care Network, Project Odyssey, and WWP Talk.

Wounded Warrior Project began in 2003 as a grassroots effort by a group of veterans and friends who wanted to give back to the first wounded warriors returning from the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. The group provided backpacks filled with comfort items to those recovering

in the hospital. That simple act of kindness evolved into a national non-profit whose mission for the past 20 years has been to honor and empower post-9/11 wounded warriors.

A recent study found that 82% of associate employees do not feel that racial inequities are being addressed in the workplace. Prioritizing workplace DE&I is key for organizations since an inclusive workplace ensures all employees, regardless of their background or gender, feel respected, valued, and supported. In fact, 47% of African American employees and 49% of Hispanic employees tend to quit a company due to discrimination; 67% of women face discrimination due to gender bias, and only 25% of women occupy C-suite or leadership roles.

But Bryan DiGiorgio, Founder and CEO of 1840 & Company says that by outsourcing key roles to global, remote candidates, businesses can access a diverse global workforce from different locations which leads to a culturally rich workplace experience. Companies can also tackle business challenges, and minimize onboarding costs, training costs, and fixed operational costs. For example: A diverse workplace leads to a 19% increase in revenue and having a global team means accessing wider talent and promoting diversity; delegating operations frees capital for innovation, growth, and better products and outsourcing cuts up to 70% of fixed costs by reducing physical space and overhead.

Currently there are 355,000 licensed nurse practitioners in the United States. A nurse practitioner is an advanced practice registered nurse whose training and degree allows them to provide diagnostic and advanced care for a variety of conditions without the direct supervision of an M.D. - but a projected shortfall of 450,000 nurses by 2025, means an alarming 20% fewer nurses than workforce requires. Steven Ferrara, President of the American Association of Nurse Practitioners, discusses how the nurse practitioner profession is expanding access to primary care, especially for those Americans living in primary health care deserts.

The holiday season is here, and social isolation and loneliness can be a real health risk for anyone, but isolation may especially impact older adults who live alone, or those who feel hurt from the loss of family or friends, a chronic illness, and hearing loss. Social isolation significantly increases a person’s risk of premature death. It’s a risk that may rival those of smoking, obesity and physical inactivity.

We know that social connection is important for physical and mental well-being. It helps prevent feelings of isolation, which may cause anxiety, depression, cognitive decline and unhealthy lifestyle habits.

Nearly 25% of adults, aged 65 and older, are considered to be socially isolated. That’s one in every four seniors. It’s important to spot the signs of loneliness and social isolation early. They can include changes in eating, sleeping habits, unexplained aches and pains, feeling helpless or hopeless, or an inability to perform daily tasks. We need to spend time with those who are alone so we can help prevent social isolation and loneliness among older adults.

Dr. Daman Jamarai, Chief Medical Officer, Medicare and Retirement, for UnitedHealthcare of California, offers tips to identify when someone is facing more than just a slight case of the holiday blues and how to address social isolation and loneliness.
