• Issue: News

Summary: Keeping listeners informed of news affecting their lives is an important issue that affects our programming for our community. News programs address a variety of issues and help our listeners to be informed and better perform their civic duties

o SRN News

Summary: News and public affairs programming covering a whole spectrum of national and regional issues, with a special "Christian interest" section

Aired: Top of most hours, 3 to 5 minutes total length, with 2 to 4 minutes of news content.

• Issue: Educating our Citizens

Summary: Keeping our listeners informed of political and civic issues is a need of our community, and we have dedicated programming time to address this need.

Programs:

o Crosstalk, "Gender Dysphoria? Biological Integrity Initiative"

Summary: The numbers of children dealing with gender dysphoria is off the charts. The result? A recent report out of the UK indicated over one-third of children on puberty blockers were experiencing worsened mental health. In response, the American College of Pediatricians has launched a new biological integrity initiative with the goal of exposing the dangers of transgender procedures on children. Jim welcomed Dr. Jill Simons. Dr. Simons is executive director of the American College of Pediatricians. What is gender dysphoria? Dr. Simons noted this is a "catch all" phrase that refers to a person that is uncomfortable being the sex that they are. She believes social media is contributing to this problem, but the underlying problem for those suffering from gender dysphoria is mental health. Included in such a discussion are the various medical interventions that are often utilized. One of them is puberty blockers. These are drugs used to treat medical conditions where puberty begins early (precocious puberty). Today, however, these blockers are being used to block the normal onset of puberty in order to keep the child in an immature state. Speaking of cross sex hormones, these can result in osteoporosis, diabetes, cancer, there's a risk for heart disease and other side effects. Dr. Simons sees even earlier interventions such as dressing as the opposite sex and/or adopting a different name or using certain pronouns as harmful. She believes they set the child on a "conveyor belt" that is hard to leave. She concluded the first quarter hour by telling listeners that there are good studies showing that if children are supported properly through normal puberty and provided counseling if they need it for underlying health problems, gender dysphoria will resolve itself in up to 88% of girls and 98% of boys.

Crosstalk, "The Terror of Islam"

Summary: On Saturday, October 7th, as Jews were observing their Sabbath and had just finished celebrating the Feast of Tabernacles, the terrorist group, Hamas, attacked Israel by air, land and sea. This is the largest murder of Jews since the holocaust. Anti-semitism events and rallies are taking place around the world, including right here in the U.S., while Israel's enemies have vowed to wipe the nation off the face of the earth. Why is there such world-wide hatred for the Jewish people? If Islam is such a religion of peace, then why are they committing such atrocities...or is that the true face of Islam? Usama Dakdok is founder of the Straight Way of Grace Ministry. Islam is not a religion of peace but of terror, terror that is taught by its book, the Our'an. This is important to remember as you stay on top of the details as this battle unfolds. As part of this broadcast, you'll hear the following: Why do Muslims yell "Allahu Akbar" when they destroy and kill. Does Akbar mean "greater" or "bigger"? Jim provided audio clips from anti-Israel protests in London, New York City and Sydney, Australia. Usama explained the history of the Palestinians and how current protesters are quite ignorant because had they studied the Our'an, they'd see that Allah had given the land to Moses and the Children of Israel 3,800 years ago (Our'an chapter 5:20-26). There's no occupation here. As Usama expressed, "How can you free people from their own land?" Historically speaking, who are the Palestinians? Does the Qur'an actually command the beheading of people along with the rape that we're hearing about in the news?

Crosstalk, "In Defense of Religious & Parental Rights"

Summary: Religious rights are under attack and it's often happening in the public square. It's not just religious rights, but parental rights as well where the state has become the surrogate parents and, in some instances, they're actually pitting children against their parents. To discuss where America currently stands on such issues, Jim welcomed Brad Dacus. Brad is president and founder of the Pacific Justice Institute. The recent elections, particularly in Ohio, and the defeat on abortion there. On the national level he noted how it's one thing for the Supreme Court to say that it's OK to kill the pre-born, but when the people have the opportunity to decide, then the culpability goes way up. Brad has a phrase he uses. It's "spiritual death camp." He uses it to describe public schools and how they're very different from years ago as they're brainwashing youngsters, right down to the Kindergarten level. The legal recourse parents have when girls have to deal with boys in locker rooms or compete against them in sports. Private Christian schools are not immune from attack. He gave the example of a private Christian school in California that was raided by police because a few of the children were not wearing their COVID masks. They were also told that the singing of Christian songs and teaching Bible stories is not allowed in pre-schools in California. What is the role of the church in all of this?

The Phyllis Schlafly Report, "Equally Bad Outcomes In Math And Science"

Kids are back in school now, but schools are not back to excellence. Our students lag far behind the rest of the world in basic learning, including a dismal ranking in the bottom third in math skills among industrialized nations with whom we compete. Math is a casualty of the Leftist takeover of education, which makes diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) more important than teaching basic skills. When schools postpone algebra to the ninth grade, students never complete the basic math they need for a STEM-related job. In their mindless push for greater diversity, New York Democrats recently dropped the words "math and science" from the name of their once-elite Math & Science Exploratory School in Brooklyn. Test scores at that middle school have plummeted from more than 95% of 7th-graders passing the math exams a half-decade ago to merely 69% passing last year. The school used to select students based on academic performance, thereby giving families an incentive to compete for admission. But under the DEI approach imposed by New York's Democrat politicians, the renamed Exploratory School now uses a lottery to select its students, and 52% of accepted students must come from unstable, impoverished, or non-English speaking families. Math is one of the biggest casualties. The Left disliked how some groups do better at math, particularly advanced math, and this conflicts with the DEI political agenda. Math competitions are usually won by boys, for example, so prizes and awards are not inclusive. The Leftist solution is to eliminate honors and awards, lumping all the kids together in one dumbed-down math program, and the end result is less achievement. Taking away opportunities for students to excel may create equal outcomes for all, but the problem is that these outcomes are equally dismal. We must allow our nation's students to have goals worth striving toward, which will make them not only better students, but better citizens as well. In an increasingly STEM-dominated world, creating opportunities in math and science is especially critical.

o The Phyllis Schlafly Report, "Visionary Columbus's Memorial in Washington"

Today we are observing Columbus Day, a national holiday honoring Christopher Columbus, the discoverer of our country. Columbus, indeed, was one of the world's most remarkable men. One hundred years ago, in 1912, a giant Christopher Columbus Memorial Fountain was unveiled at the front entrance of Union Station in Washington, DC, on a road appropriately called Columbus Circle. This marble and granite memorial was designed to inspire patriotism in the 90,000 people who pass through Washington's major transportation hub every day. At the center is a statue of Columbus. Many falsehoods grew up around Columbus in the 20th century. Everybody knows that Columbus was looking for gold, but do you know why he was looking for gold? Columbus planned it to finance a crusade to take Jerusalem back from the Muslims. He was also very interested in evangelizing the natives in the Christian faith. Columbus was really the first modern man. As an explorer and discoverer, he based his work on science and reason. He surely was one of the world's greatest sailors. He crossed the Atlantic Ocean four times in small wooden ships, without the use of modern instruments. Maybe any sailor could have let the winds carry his ships west. But what was so remarkable was that Columbus returned back to where he came from, and then returned to the same locations in the Western Hemisphere where he had landed before. It took an extraordinary navigator to do that. He discovered the New World. I have been aboard replicas of Columbus's three ships, the Santa Maria, the Nina and the Pinta, and I am still awestruck at recalling the bravery of the men who made that journey and the leader who kept them together until they landed in the New World.

The Phyllis Schlafly Report, "Honoring the Sacrifice of Pearl Harbor"

America's great intellectual diversity often manifests as one of her greatest weaknesses, and that is that the nation is rarely unified around one idea or goal. Even the patriots who brought our nation out from under the tyranny of the British did so in spite of an estimated two-thirds of Americans who were either supportive of the British or simply indifferent to the cause of freedom. Yet, December 7, 1941 marked one of the few times in American history where nearly all Americans were united around a single cause. On that horrific day exactly eighty-three years ago, the Japanese Imperial Navy Air Service launched a cowardly surprise attack on the unsuspecting American naval outpost in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. This attack was carried out while the U.S. and Japan were in peace negotiations, before any declaration of war had been issued. As a result, 2,403 Americans, including 68 civilians, were killed. The next day, President Roosevelt delivered his renowned "Infamy" speech, and Congress voted to declare war on Japan with only one dissenting vote. Americans rallied, overcame enormous obstacles, and moved forward with a singularity of purpose. Sacrifices were made not only by those who fought and died in the field of battle, but also by ordinary citizens who bought war bonds and planted victory gardens. Entire industries shifted to produce the materials necessary to win a total war. Everyone pitched in, and America realized victory in both the European and Pacific theaters. On this anniversary of the Pearl Harbor bombing, let us commemorate those who fought and died to preserve our freedom. Let us remember those who sacrificed so the war effort could be possible. Although we should never cease to pray for peace for America in our time and our children's, we must also train them to be willing to sacrifice for the continuity of liberty.
