The list below represents the current issues of community importance to which ideastream's news, public affairs and general programming staffs addressed their attention during the designated reporting period noted above. The list has been compiled by the ideastream<sup>SM</sup> Content Department, under my direction and supervision.

The subjects are a consequence of current news as it developed in Northeast Ohio during the reporting period and the staff's newsgathering and outreach which included contact with officials in the region, community leaders, business leaders, healthcare representatives, other news media and a diverse mix of private citizens among others.

The Content staff regularly follow news of local issues or impact as presented by other news organizations, consult informally with colleagues in the media, and routinely read a wide variety of daily and weekly news publications from area communities, including *The Plain Dealer*, *The Beacon Journal*, and occasional additional neighborhood publications; minority news and special interest publications such as the *City News* and *The Call and Post*; area weekly and monthly news publications, including *Crain's Cleveland Business*, *Cleveland Magazine*, *The Scene*, *Northern Ohio Live*; and online news sources such as [www.CoolCleveland.com](http://www.CoolCleveland.com) and blogs such as [www.brewedfreshdaily.com](http://www.brewedfreshdaily.com), as well as national news and special interest publications such as *The New York Times*, and *The Wall Street Journal* in order to stay aware of issues and events inside and outside of our region and to gain various perspectives on what is newsworthy.

The staff also exchanges reports daily with INFOHIO station in Columbus, and accesses the daily *Ohio Public Radio Statehouse News Bureau* (Columbus) audio feeds. Local, state, regional, national and international news from *Associated Press* is also part of the daily diet of the Content staff, as are other regularly-produced independent productions.

The ideastream<sup>sm</sup> Content staff also regularly reaches out to community civic groups and agencies for research and/or scholarly data to provide supplementary background material to assist in understanding local issues. The College of Urban Affairs at Cleveland State University, the Center for Regional Economic Issues at Case Western Reserve University, the Citizens League of Greater Cleveland, the League of Women Voters are examples of academic agencies or organizations whose written and programmatic materials have been particularly instrumental in helping us address community issues.

In addition, ideastream's ongoing utilization and broadcasting of cross-cultural and international-content materials is a valuable means to stay abreast of concerns and issues of immediate interest to the people of the many cultural heritages represented in the Greater Cleveland area.


The attached list represents the current issues of community importance to which ideastream's news and public affairs and general programming staffs have addressed their attention for the above-designated reporting period.

The programming listed was broadcast, in response to these issues, and after consultation with the ideastream Community Advisory Board, which provided specific recommendations about stories and issues to be considered.

In addition, the list and programming were developed with the advice and assistance of the staff of the ideastream news and public affairs staff, drawing on their extensive and on-going contacts with area officials, community leaders and private citizens representing the broad spectrum of endeavors and interest in Northeast Ohio.



1. House Votes Down Bailout Package, Senate Works on Revised Bill

For the last two weeks, Congress and President Bush have been trying to find a way to rescue big banks who are finding themselves in trouble due to some bad investments. President Bush wants Congress to approve a plan to spend \$700 billion buying their debt. But some members of Congress say not so fast. Earlier this week, members of the House of Representatives voted down a \$700 million bail out plan. The Senate is set to act Wednesday night on a new plan. The three-man crew took off from the Jiuquan Satellite Launch Center in northern China's Inner Mongolia last Thursday for a three day mission, returning safely to Earth on Sunday.

#### 5. Congress Approves Bill to Clean Up Great Lakes

Great news for the state of Ohio this week as Congress voted 411 to 9 to continue the clean up of our Great Lakes. The lawmakers authorized the Environmental Protection Agency to spend fifty four million dollars over the next two years. The clean up will include the removal of tons of toxic sediment in rivers that feed into the lakes, like the Cuyahoga River. The five lakes hold about 20% of the world's fresh water.

#### 6. Sarah Palin's Face Appears as Ohio Corn Maze

Vice Presidential candidate Sarah Palin's face has been all over the news. Now it's turned up in a really unusual place - a corn maze! Duke Wheeler, who owns the farm in Whitehouse, hopes the unusual maze will bring visitors this fall. An artist from Idaho drew the picture. Wheeler entered it into his GPS system, then followed the outline with his tractor.

#### 7. Cleveland Area Teen Heads North to Polar Bear Country

Maribeth Flowers, a senior at Brecksville Broadview Heights High School, is one of seventeen teenagers from around the world taking part in Polar Bear International's Leadership Camp in Canada. A volunteer at the Cleveland Metroparks Zoo for the past three years, Maribeth will ride helicopters and tundra buggies to get an up-close view of the polar bears' annual fall migrations. When she returns, Maribeth will use what she learned in Canada to teach people in Ohio about the plight of polar bears.

#### 8. Voters Camp Out Overnight For Chance to Vote

They're casting absentee ballots starting this week in Ohio. State and federal courts upheld a ruling that now lets residents register and vote at the same time in the crucial swing state until October sixth. Republicans had argued that Ohio law requires voters to be registered for 30 days before casting an absentee ballot. Local NAACP President Christopher Smitherman watched as people slept on the sidewalk Monday night near the Hamilton County Board of Elections, waiting for their chance to vote.

got a face lift. Crews scaled the monument in the Black Hills of South Dakota last month to fix cracks on the faces as part of an annual preservation effort. Though the granite is very strong, when water seeps into the cracks and freezes, it can exert many tons of force on the rock. So every year a crew scales and fills any of the monument's known one hundred and forty four cracks with a silicone caulk. It keeps the water from getting in.

#### **11. Man Uses Jet-Propelled Wing to Fly Across the English Channel**

Yves Rossy from Switzerland pulled a superhero move when he jumped out of a plane over France last week. With a homemade jet-pack strapped to his back - he fired up his mini-engines and flew 22 miles over the English Channel to the White Cliffs of Dover, England.

The vehicles ride in special lanes in the middle of the road, and GPS technology will control traffic lights, getting travelers to their destination in minutes. Planners hope the \$200 million project will be the engine that drives Cleveland's future.

### 6. Ohio Department of Natural Resources Awards Dollars for Watersheds

The Ohio Department of Natural Resources will give out more than a million dollars to help protect eleven Ohio watersheds. Watersheds are the land area that water flows over or under on its way to a stream, river, lake or ocean, like water draining from a bathtub. Everyone lives in a watershed and the way we live our lives can affect the water that ends up

in our rivers and lakes. These grants will help people in areas like the Blanchard River, Euclid Creek, Huff Run and Yellow Creek watersheds to restore and protect their water resources.

#### 7. Family Ties: John McCain a Descendant of Slave Holder; Slave Descendants Feel Kinship

More than 140 years ago, slavery was legal in this country, but that ended with the Civil War. Many people alive today are either descendants of slave-owners or their slaves. That includes the presidential candidate John McCain and many people in the southern state of Mississippi. The great-great-grandfather of brother and sister Charles and Mary McCain was a slave owned by the great-grandfather of John McCain. Like many slaves during the time, Mary and Charles' ancestors adopted their owner's name. Jason Carroll reports on the story of the two McCain families and their shared history. McCain only learned during this presidential campaign that one of his southern ancestors was a slave-holder, and he did not offer any comment for Jason's story.

#### 8. Six-year-old Poland Boy Plays the Drums like a Pro

Poland is one of Europe's fastest developing nations-- a business center with a unique political landscape and a thriving pop culture. #### 9. Old German Car Named Trabant Turned into a Boat

Almost 20 years ago, Germany was actually divided into two different countries. West Germany was a democracy like the United States. East Germany was a communist country and aligned with the former Soviet Union. The idea behind communism is interesting: we all share everything. But in order for that to work you need a really strong government that controls every aspect of life. That can be bad for innovation - so people in communist countries like East Germany didn't have the same technology that we in the west did. For decades, the Trabant was one of the few cars you could get in East Germany. Recently, three guys thought it might be cool to turn one of these now historic cars into a boat - the tra-boat, as they call it. Turning the car into a boat was pretty easy. All the guys did was take out the axles and attach seven oil barrels to the bottom so it would float.

1. Senator Barack Obama Wins the Presidency

Texas Tech is the ninth ranked team in college football.

Carving pumpkins is a time honored Halloween tradition, but three Malayan tiger cubs didn't care about the time someone took to make jack-o-lanterns – they wanted the meat zoo-keepers stuffed inside! The cubs each weigh about sixty pounds but are expected to reach two hundred pounds, just like their mom. Endeavour's seven-person crew travelled 5.5 million miles to expand the space station and make some repairs. The landing went smoothly, even though stormy weather forced the shuttle to land at Edwards Air Force Base in California rather than Kennedy Space center in Florida. Flight controllers prefer landings at Kennedy because of the cost. NASA says it will cost about \$1.7 million to transport the shuttle from California to back home to Florida.

The shuttle isn't scheduled to fly again until May.

## 4. New Space Vehicle Will Take Astronauts to Moon; Safety Mechanism Tested

The space shuttle retires in 2010. A new rocket, Ares I, is part of the new generation of space travel. It has new technology allowing the astronauts' capsule to eject from the rocket in an emergency. Engineers hope that they will never have to use it, but plan to have a proper safety mechanism in place just in case. The mechanism is a motor connected to the capsule known as Orion. In case of emergency, the motor will pull Orion away from the rocket it's riding on if there is a malfunction during liftoff or on the launch pad. The rocket motor had its first ground test at the ATK Launch Facility in Promontory, Utah recently.

## 5. Browns and Bengals Suffer Painful Losses

The Cleveland Browns lost another game and another quarterback this week. The Browns lost a close one to the colts on Sunday, and Derek Anderson suffered a knee injury with barely a minute to go in the game. Anderson was playing for Brady Quinn, who is out for the season with a broken finger. Meanwhile, the Baltimore Ravens caused big trouble for the Bengals on Sunday, beating them 34 to 3. The Bengals have just one win on their record so far this season.

## 6. Cincinnati Zoo Welcomes Three Baby Cheetahs

Visitors to the Cincinnati Zoo get a chance to see its newest residents - four-week-old cheetah cubs. All boys, the cubs were born to the Columbus zoo's "Purdy" and the Cincinnati zoo's "Wild Boy." ##### **1. President-Elect Barack Obama Hopes to Create Jobs with Public Projects**

Almost 80 years ago, the United States - and ultimately the entire world - suffered an economic downturn so severe it was called the Great Depression. When Franklin Delano Roosevelt became president in 1933, he decided to create new jobs by building up the nation's infrastructure - that's a fancy word for things like roads, bridges and sewer systems. Now President-elect Obama wants to take a page from that book. Jessica Yellin reports on Obama's proposed program to save or create 2.5 million jobs, putting people to work making public buildings green, improving the nation's highways and modernizing public schools.

##### **2. Democrats and White House Agree to Loan Big Three \$15 Billion**

The eyes of the nation are on the Big Three car companies - Ford, GM and Chrysler. Congressional Democrats and the White House have agreed to loan the struggling companies a whole lot of money. Under the Democrats' draft proposal, auto companies would get 15 billion dollars in bridge loans as soon as next week. It's just a fraction of the 34 billion dollars auto companies asked Congress for, but enough, lawmakers hope, to keep the big three afloat as they answer Washington's calls for a major overhaul. To ensure restructuring in Detroit, the President would appoint a so-called "car czar" who, by January

first, would set up guidelines for struggling auto companies to reorganize -- prove they can be profitable.

### 3. New Jersey Students Write Letters to President-Elect Obama

As part of a writing project, students at Deerfield Terrace Elementary School in Linden wrote letters to the next President asking him to take on issues that are important to them. Their concerns included global warming, the first family's new dog and getting out of school early.

### 4. Food Pantries Across the Country Feel the Pinch from the Economy

Food pantries and soup kitchens across the country are experiencing a serious drop in donations. It appears the economic downturn is making it tougher for people to give. And as Amana Miyamae reports, the lack of donations may leave many who are in need, hungry. The Salvation Army in Metro Denver says this is the first time in at least a year that they have had to purchase food to make up for a shortfall in donations.

### 5. Springfield Troops Return from Kuwait to Cheers of Family and Friends

More than 100 soldiers returned home to cheers in Springfield, Ohio Sunday afternoon. Members of the 37th Infantry Brigade Combat Team stepped off the bus and into the arms of their biggest supporters. The 37th was mobilized last January, and spent three months training in Fort Hood, Texas before going to Kuwait.

### 6. Outdoor Ice Skating Brought Back to University Circle

Outdoor ice skating returned to university circle in Cleveland on Sunday - on an old-fashioned rink with a modern twist. Nearly one hundred years ago, people skated on the lagoon in front of the Cleveland Museum of Art - but the lagoon hasn't frozen solid in years. University Circle Incorporated came up with a new plan - the Rink at Wade Oval. It looks like it's made of ice but it's really an environmentally-friendly polymer that doesn't need to be kept frozen. Families got their first skate at UCI's Holiday Circle Fest this past weekend.

### 7. Grateful Dog Rescued After Days in Drainpipe

A dog named Zeke got himself into a big jam the day after Thanksgiving. He got himself trapped in a drainage pipe after chasing an animal. A sewer company crew found Zeke using a camera designed to see into pipes. Workers dug a new hole about twenty feet behind the dog, and managed to get him to back his way out to freedom. Zeke was trapped down there for five days and came out coated in mud and smelling awful, his owner said. Zeke is a therapy dog who likes to visit schools and nursing homes. He's doing much better now after some food and a good bath. The men of the sewer company, Dreier & Maller Inc., were kind enough to donate the time they spent rescuing Zeke.

So, this past Monday, under the guidance of Secretary of State Jennifer Brunner, Ohio's twenty electors cast their votes for Barack Obama and Joe Biden for President and Vice President. The election was held in the Ohio Senate. The electoral votes are sealed and sent to the president of the U.S. Senate, who will open them and read them before both houses of Congress on January sixth.

### 6. Skills of Student Lego Engineers Tested in Robot Tournament

Students in the Cincinnati region spent three months figuring out how to build a robot that can perform tasks like save a model house from a flood, close shutters, and open windows. On Sunday, members of 35 teams found out if their robots were up to the task at a Lego robotics tournament.
