The list below represents the current issues of community importance to which ideastream's news, public affairs and general programming staffs addressed their attention during the designated reporting period noted above. The list has been compiled by the ideastreamSM Content Department, under my direction and supervision.

The subjects are a consequence of current news as it developed in Northeast Ohio during the reporting period and the staff's newsgathering and outreach which included contact with officials in the region, community leaders, business leaders, healthcare representatives, other news media and a diverse mix of private citizens among others.

The Content staff regularly follow news of local issues or impact as presented by other news organizations, consult informally with colleagues in the media, and routinely read a wide variety of daily and weekly news publications from area communities, including *The Plain Dealer*, *The Beacon Journal*, and occasional additional neighborhood publications; minority news and special interest publications such as the *City News* and *The Call and Post*; area weekly and monthly news publications, including *Crain's Cleveland Business*, *Cleveland Magazine*, *The Scene*, *Northern Ohio Live*; and online news sources such as www.CoolCleveland.com and blogs such as www.brewedfreshdaily.com, as well as national news and special interest publications such as *The New York Times*, and *The Wall Street Journal* in order to stay aware of issues and events inside and outside of our region and to gain various perspectives on what is newsworthy.

The staff also exchanges reports daily with INFOHIO station in Columbus, and accesses the daily *Ohio Public Radio Statehouse News Bureau* (Columbus) audio feeds. Local, state, regional, national and international news from *Associated Press* is also part of the daily diet of the Content staff, as are other regularly-produced independent productions.



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The ideastreamsm Content staff also regularly reaches out to community civic groups and agencies for research and/or scholarly data to provide supplementary background material to assist in understanding local issues. The College of Urban Affairs at Cleveland State University, the Center for Regional Economic Issues at Case Western Reserve University, the Citizens League of Greater Cleveland, the League of Women Voters are examples of academic agencies or organizations whose written and programmatic materials have been particularly instrumental in helping us address community issues.

In addition, ideastream's ongoing utilization and broadcasting of cross-cultural and international-content materials is a valuable means to stay abreast of concerns and issues of immediate interest to the people of the many cultural heritages represented in the Greater Cleveland area.


The attached list represents the current issues of community importance to which ideastream's news and public affairs and general programming staffs have addressed their attention for the above-designated reporting period.

The programming listed was broadcast, in response to these issues, and after consultation with the ideastream Community Advisory Board, which provided specific recommendations about stories and issues to be considered.



Points Swine flu has spread to eleven U.S. states and caused at least one death. The Centers for Disease Control have confirmed more than 100 cases, the majority in New York. Locally, swine flu, officially dubbed H1N1, has been limited to one confirmed case, although technicians are evaluating a handful of suspected cases. Despite the limited outbreak, two schools have shut their doors temporarily and a statewide flu information line has fielded hundreds of calls. Concern about the possible threat of flu forced cancellation of a health care event at the county fairgrounds this weekend that would have offered free care to thousands of people. Free care is already available from a number of sources, as Mr. Wertheim explained.

1. President Orders GM and Chrysler to Restructure to Earn Taxpayer Money

President Obama told two of the Big Three American auto makers - General Motors and Chrysler - that if they want more taxpayer money to keep them operating, they have to intensify their efforts to restructure. On Monday, the President laid out his expectations for the car makers, which include tough restrictions and some good news for auto buyers. GM gets 60 days to prove it can stay afloat. Chrysler gets 30 days to come up with a final plan, and is moving forward on a major element of that plan, agreeing on Tuesday on the framework for a global merger with the Italian car company, Fiat. The administration is not ruling out structured bankruptcy for GM and/or Chrysler as a last resort. Another stipulation coming directly from the White House - GM CEO Rick Wagoner was asked to resign, which he officially did Monday morning.

2. Tesla Motors Unveils New Electric Car: The Model S Sedan

Tesla Motors unveiled its highly-anticipated new electric car this week. The Model S sedan received rave reviews for its cool look. It's scheduled for delivery in late 2011. Tesla says the seven-seater sedan will be able to go from zero to 60 miles per hour in less than six seconds, before topping out at more than 130 mph. It comes standard with a battery pack that will take the car 160 miles on one charge. The company says each battery pack should last at least seven years. The base model will run \$57,400, but Tesla says that a federal tax credit can shave \$7,500 from the bottom line.

3. North Dakota Endures New Snow, While Red River Crests

Folks in North Dakota are not out of the woods yet when it comes to flooding concerns. High winds blew heavy wet snow across Fargo on Tuesday, causing some residents to worry that the levees and sandbag dikes along the Red River could be breached. The Red River crested over the weekend. Residents of Fargo and surrounding towns are now hoping that all the hard work they put in to protect their community won't be washed away. As of Tuesday, there were no reports of problems. Officials said the snow is better than rain, because at least it will take days to melt. Hopefully by then, the river levels will have dropped a bit.

4. Volunteers Organize Shelter to Keep Pets out of Harm's Way in North Dakota

Pet owners in Fargo, North Dakota say they are relieved that there's somewhere their furry family members can go as they braced for an early spring snow storm that could threaten a new round of flooding in the area. A shelter organized by groups like the Humane Society and Adopt-A-Pet kept pets, including cats, dogs and horses, far away from the threat of water.

5. Alaska's Mount Redoubt Sends Ash 27,000 Feet into Sky

Geologists say Alaska's Mount Redoubt has entered a new phase. It's now emitting ash plumes instead of the violent eruptions that occurred over the past week. Monday, the

volcano made a cloud, with a small amount of ash that reached 27-thousand feet high. Mt. Redoubt is located 100 miles southwest of Anchorage, but the ash was so thick that Alaska Airlines suspended its flights in and out of Alaska's largest city. Redoubt has erupted 18 times since it became active eight days ago.

6. Cleveland Hosts Rock & Roll Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony for 2009

The city of Cleveland, home of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and Museum, will host this year's Hall of Fame induction ceremony - in Cleveland - for the first time in twelve years. In past years, the induction ceremony has usually taken place in New York City. Music performances are scheduled all week, and admission to the Rock Hall museum is free to all on Saturday April fourth. The big night is Saturday night when the musicians who have contributed to the history of rock and roll are honored.

7. It's a Boy for Columbus Zoo Asian Elephants Phoebe and Cocol

The Columbus Zoo is very happy to announce the birth of an Asian elephant calf. The baby was born on March 27th. The little guy - as yet un-named - stood within fifteen minutes, with some help from his mom. This is the third baby for Phoebe. An endangered species, there are an estimated thirty eight to fifty one thousand Asian elephants living in the wild. Farming, deforestation and conflict with humans pose a constant threat to these beautiful creatures. You can see video updates on Phoebe and her calf on the Columbus Zoo website.

8. Historic Columbus Road Lift Bridge to get New Span

The Columbus Road Lift Bridge in Cleveland will get a new span, it was announced this week. The bridge is on the site of Cleveland's first permanent bridge. The Columbus Street Bridge was completed in 1835, a draw bridge that lifted to let boats pass. The first vertical lift bridge was built on the same site in 1940. This kind of bridge doesn't tip or turn - instead the span goes straight up in the air, parallel to the road. The \$49 million dollar project will involve repairing the towers of the bridge, and completely replacing the span that goes over the Cuyahoga River in what is called the "Flats" section of Cleveland. The attached PDF was prepared by the Cuyahoga County Engineer's Office for a public meeting on the bridge repairs and includes a history of the bridge and different options for repairing the bridge.

9. Tradition of Making and Wearing Kimonos in Japan is Threatened by Recession

As Japan fights recession, the tradition of making and wearing kimonos is struggling to survive. It's simply become too expensive for many women. Shop owners Fumiko and Tatsuo Sekine show us how traditional kimonos are as intricately tied to Japanese culture as they are to the women who wear them. Each made-to-order kimono costs upwards of 10,000 U.S. dollars. The Sekines hope to pass the business on to their son - if they can manage to survive this recession. A Tokyo department store says the way to grab new customers is to change the kimono and discard the old craftsmanship to lower the price.

10. As the Recession Deepens, Candy Sales Are Doing Fine

As the recession deepens and unemployment widens -- more and more Americans are actually adding on a household expense - Tootsie Rolls, Mary Janes, Gummi Bears and chocolate Kisses! Just ask Dylan Lauren of Dylan's Candy Bar. She has seen sales pick up. It's happened before. Dylan says that "back in the 1930s, candy companies grew pretty well

and you saw the introduction of brands like Three Musketeers, Snickers and Tootsie Roll Pops that we enjoy today." Those brands are still thriving in this current climate while premium candy is suffering. Hershey, Nestle and Cadbury stocks have outperformed the rest of the market. Hershey is even forecasting growth in 2009.

11. Texas Fifth Grader Lobbies Lawmakers for State Dinosaur

He's 10 years old and may be Texas' youngest lobbyist. He's fighting Austin lawmakers to change the name of the state dinosaur. Ten year old Shaswath Murthy began his quest to change the name of the state dinosaur years ago. He told lawmakers that his research shows the current state dinosaur isn't unique to Texas. He kept asking to be heard, contending that Technosaurus would be a better choice than Paluxysaurus. A Fort Worth scientist argued that recent research says the Technosaurus probably isn't a dinosaur. The bill is pending while lawmakers try to reach a compromise between the two experts.

12. Kids at South Carolina School Pay It Forward, Thanks to Generous Donor

Kids at a school in Bluffton, South Carolina are paying it forward, thanks to an anonymous donor who gave them 4 thousand dollars. But there's a catch: the students must send out the 20 dollar bills to deserving charities. The anonymous angel -as the school is calling the donor - got the idea after reading a story in the local newspaper about the school's 'penny war' to raise money for its food bank. Teachers say the students are learning an important lesson about giving. The school stamped each bill with a web site address that will teach anyone who receives the money about the project. The students and teachers hope they will inspire others to pay it forward.

13. Baby Monkey Rejected by Parents, Raised by Zookeepers at Taronga Zoo

Elke was rejected by her parents just minutes after she was born last Thursday at Australia's Taronga Zoo. Now it's up to zookeepers to raise the adorable little baby and try to re-introduce her to her mother in a few months. Elke and her parents are rare Francois' langur monkeys which are native to southeast Asia. They're critically endangered as only a few thousand are left in the world.

1. Massive Earthquake Rocks Central Italy

A powerful earthquake rocked central Italy on Monday, and rescue workers continue to search for the missing. The magnitude 6.3 earthquake struck the central Italian city of L'Aquila, which is about 75 miles east of Rome. Entire blocks were reduced to piles of

rubble and dust. Italian Premier Silvio Berlusconi says that 260 people have died and more than a thousand people injured in the powerful quake.

2. North Korea Launches Long-Range Rocket

President Obama is facing a major international test, after North Korea went ahead with its stated intention to launch a long-range rocket. North Korea says the rocket had a communications satellite aboard, and that the satellite made it to orbit. The Obama administration is trying to solve the disagreements with North Korea through diplomacy and negotiation.

3. President Obama Reaches Out to Muslims in Turkey

After September 11th, 2001, many Muslims felt the War on Terror was really the United States waging war on their religion. 5. Dayton's Air Force Museum Hopes to Land Space Shuttle

The National Museum of the United States Air Force is hoping to land one of NASA's space shuttles when they are retired next year. They're not ready with any announcements yet, but NASA spokesman Mike Curie says the shuttles should be housed in locations where they can be seen by the greatest number of people. The museum at Wright Patterson Air Force Base near Dayton brings in 1.3 million visitors a year, and should draw even more visitors with a space shuttle there. The museum is the world's oldest and largest military air force museum with hundreds of historic planes and thousands of artifacts.

6. Ohio Teen Saves a Life on Spring Break in Florida

Sixteen-year-old Maria Devito's spring vacation turned serious last week. Maria - a student at Newark Catholic High School - was enjoying the sun by her aunt's pool when an older gentleman staggered and then fell into the water. Maria jumped in and held the man's head up while her aunt called 9-1-1. Seventy six year old Sigfried Schaire, visiting from Germany, had a stroke and is recovering in the hospital. Maria was honored on April fourth by the Margate, Florida Fire Department for her outstanding assistance as a life saver.

7. Tiny Saw-whet Owl Released Back to Wild in Bay Village!

A tiny owl is on the wing again, thanks to the care he received at the Lake Erie Nature and Science Center. The little Saw-whet Owl had suffered a broken scapula - or shoulder bone -

in February. Saw-whet owls are brown with white spots, and intense yellow eyes, the smallest of Ohio's owls. Before he was released, the little owl was given a leg band by Master Bird Bander Gary Fowler. If the Saw-whet is ever rescued again, the number on his leg band will tell his rescuers that he was banded in Bay Village.

8. Georgia Homeowner Donates his Home Back to Habitat for Humanity with Gratitude
Five years ago, the Hilton Head regional Habitat for Humanity gave a family in Georgia an opportunity. Instead of continuing the cycle of renting, they could become homeowners. Chad Ery is now ready to buy his family a new home, and instead of selling the home he received for free from Habitat to Humanity, he is giving it back to them as a donation. To him, it's the least he can do to help the organization that gave him the gift of opportunity.

9. Fifty First Anniversary of Dr. King Observed in Atlanta, Georgia
Last weekend - on April 4 - the fifty-first anniversary of the death of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was remembered. The King family lit an eternal flame, in commemoration of the work their father did for this country. Kids from Washington's Bancroft Elementary School helped the first lady plant the seeds that will keep the White House kitchens humming. The garden will provide food for the Obama family and White House staff, but more importantly, it will teach children about eating healthy food.

5. Seattle Man Grows His Garden and Grass on his Roof

Troy Wagner's garden is on his roof. He's worked on his roof top garden in Seattle, Washington for five years. On one side, troy has planted spring flowers. Opposite them, he has prepared the soil for vegetables - including lima beans, radishes and green beans. And Troy takes his garden to new heights, with grass all the way to the roof top. Troy doesn't even try to mow it. Nature takes care of that. Troy says that green roofs help to reduce carbon emissions since they naturally make homes cooler in the summer and warmer in the winter, and green roofs help absorb rain water, reducing flooding.

6. Ohio Leads the Nation with 249 Tree Cities

For the 28th year in a row, Ohio is the top "Tree City USA" state. 249 cities and towns in Ohio are designated as tree cities. That means they have tree programs and laws, fund their

local forestry program with an annual budget of at least two dollars per resident, and celebrate Arbor Day. As part of this program last year, Ohioans planted more than 49,000 trees, and volunteered more than 54,000 hours caring for trees.

7. Baby Gibbon Brightens Toledo Zoo Primate Exhibit

The Toledo Zoo has introduced a new family member to visitors. A young male gibbon was born on December fifteenth. When the weather is warm enough, he can be seen - along with his family - in the primate exhibit. The baby, named Quan is the second youngster for mother Hue and father Batu. The gibbon is native to southeast Asia, where it is threatened due to the loss of its forest habitat. The Toledo Zoo is working with other U.S. zoos to help preserve this species.

8. First Peregrine Falcon Chicks Hatch in Cleveland

A few weeks ago we told you about the first peregrine falcon eggs in Ohio. Now, the first chicks have hatched in a nest on a ledge of the Terminal Tower in downtown Cleveland. Parents Buckeye and SW are feeding three chicks so far with another egg still waiting to hatch. Buckeye and SW have lived on this ledge overlooking Public Square for eight years. You can get a great view of the nest at the Cleveland Museum of Natural History's falcon cam - just follow the link on our website.

9. Bald Eagle with Vision Problem Has Eye Exam at Raptor Recovery Nebraska

The term "eagle eye" was put to the test last week in Omaha, Nebraska, as a bald eagle had to undergo an eye exam. The full grown female eagle was found near the Missouri River on April first and was taken to "Raptor Recovery Nebraska" with no visible injuries, but the people taking care of her noticed that she couldn't see her food. The exam found that she has lesions on her eyes. For now, she has to be hand fed. Hopefully the eagle will heal and be returned to the wild.

10. Town in Northern Japan Uses Excess Snow for Refrigeration in Summer

Even though we're enjoying green grass and flowers in Ohio, parts of northern Japan are still buried in snow. But people there have found that the snow can also be saved for later. Kyung Lah explains how they're using snow to provide air conditioning in the summer. Several buildings have developed the first snow-fed systems and are now cooling everything from flowers to grains.

11. Meteorite That Fell to Earth in Texas Now in Kansas Museum

1. Swine Flu Starts in Mexico, Affects People in Many Countries, Including the U.S.

Today marks President Obama's 100th day in office and instead of focusing solely on the economy, he was thrown a curve ball. The country and the world is on edge about swine flu. The most serious cases were reported in Mexico, but swine flu has spread to several countries including Israel, New Zealand and here in the United States. One person in the U.S. has now died from swine flu - that was a baby, in Texas. Over the weekend, Ohio Governor Ted Strickland held a press conference about the one confirmed case of swine flu here, in Elyria. The Ohio Department of Health has established a toll-free information line for people with questions about the flu.

2. Tornadoes Cause Damage in Kansas, Oklahoma and Missouri

While anxiety over the flu has continued to swirl across the country and around the world, parts of the Midwest dealt with some powerful swirling winds. We have footage of a tornado on the ground in Leavenworth County, Kansas. According to the National Weather Service, it stayed on the ground for 15 minutes. Emergency management officials say the twister damaged six buildings and several homes were destroyed. Other twisters were reported in Oklahoma and Missouri.

3. Birth of Bison Adds to Prairie Recovery at in Iowa's Broken Kettle Grassland Preserve

Two hundred years ago, America's prairies looked much different because they were home to millions of bison. The American bison was nearly driven to extinction because of hunting. The Nature Conservancy's Broken Kettle Grassland Preserve in Iowa is trying to bring the species and the prairie ecosystem back to life. This preserve, home to the extremely rare prairie rattlesnake, is the largest remaining prairie in Iowa. The birth of a new baby bison gives reason for hope.

4. Naming Contest Brings in Thousands of Names for Baby Elephant

The new baby elephant at the Columbus Zoo needs a name. More than 11,000 suggestions were submitted to the zoo's "Name the Baby Elephant Contest." Now the zoo has narrowed the choices to just four – Siddhartha; Beco; Sattva; and Damai. You can learn more about the names and vote for your favorite on the zoo's website through May sixth. The winner will be announced at the zoo on Mother's Day, May Tenth.

5. Oberlin College Wins National Wildlife Federation's "Green" Award

Oberlin College has been honored by the National Wildlife Federation as a winner in their contest called "Chill Out: Campus Solutions to Global Warming." For Oberlin's entry, called "the Light Bulb Brigade," volunteers exchanged nearly ten thousand compact fluorescent light bulbs - or CFLs - for older bulbs. Besides trading bulbs with students, businesses, and churches, they also gave the more expensive bulbs to many lower income community members. The CFLs will save local citizens thousands of dollars on their utility bills.

6. Akron Students Learn House Construction on the Job

Akron Public School students learn the ins and outs of home construction on the job. It's a "hands-on" program called "Education in Action" - a partnership with the city of Akron, the Homebuilders Association and the Urban Neighborhood Development Corporation. Thirty kids in the district's construction technology program are learning from skilled home builders on site. The students work on the outside, from framing to shingles, and the inside, from cabinets to wiring to painting. Students are wrapping up the program's sixteenth home since 1997.

7. GM Plans to Discontinue the Pontiac Brand in Cost-Saving Measure

One of America's most storied car brands is being discontinued, due to lagging sales and the poor economy. General Motors is saying goodbye to Pontiac. The brand made many appearances in American pop culture. They'll still be with us in spirit: that lightin'-fast Trans-Am that Burt Reynolds tore through the south in "Smokey and the Bandit," and the futuristic talking Trans-Am from "Knight Rider." But the Pontiac brand that produced those legendary muscle-cars of the 60's, 70's and 80's, is going the way of the Oldsmobile, killed off as part of GM's so-called "viability plan."

1. Swine Flu Spreads but Health Officials are Optimistic

Officials with the CDC say nearly 300 people in 36 states have contracted the H-1-N-1 virus, commonly known as swine flu. But they also say there's reason to be optimistic. The World Health Organization and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention plan to monitor developments in the southern hemisphere, where flu season is set to begin. They say that will tell us a lot about whether the virus is changing or becoming more severe, and what measures they will want to take in the fall. Meanwhile, fears over the H1N1 flu virus have sparked tension between China and Mexico. Mexican officials criticized the Chinese after they quarantined Mexican citizens and suspended flights into and out of Mexico. China has denied any discrimination.

2. Supreme Court Justice David Souter Will Retire; President Will Appoint New Justice

Last week, Supreme Court Justice David Souter announced that he will retire. Now President Obama must appoint a replacement. The federal government is divided into three branches. President Obama runs the executive branch. The United States Senate and House of Representatives make up the legislative branch. The nine justices of the Supreme Court sit atop the judicial branch.

Picking a new justice is one of the president's most important jobs. But first the U.S. Senate has to approve the nominee.

4. Junior Achievement Students Showcase Business Savvy

Promising business men and women of tomorrow recently showcased their talents at the Junior Achievement "Student Company Program Challenge." Northeast Ohio high school students who created businesses during the school year networked with other young entrepreneurs, gave formal presentations to a panel of judges, and were evaluated on their business knowledge, salesmanship, and more. Winners in the challenge were students from Avon Lake High School, with a great presentation and a business called "Shorty Shirts."

5. Twinsburg Chrysler Plant Closing Affects Many Ohio Workers

Last Thursday, Chrysler announced that it had filed for bankruptcy. Later that day, they disclosed that they would close five plants, including the Twinsburg Stamping Plant with more than twelve hundred workers. Jessa Goddard from the Ohio News Network shows us how deep that plant's closing will reach into Ohio's manufacturing industry.

6. Students at Rocky River School Learn Financial Literacy in Classroom

This week we announce two more winners in our NewsDepth That's My Bizne\$\$ Contest. First, we visit Amy Wilhelmy's third grade class at Kensington Intermediate School in Rocky River. The class operates an economy in their classroom called "Business Time," where they learn the value of money. In this classroom, the bills come in 1's, 5's, and 10's – just like real money – but here, they're called BC's – for Bonus Coupons. The pretend money buys students items in class that they choose from a menu. It could be a special pen, longer recess, or even renting the teacher's chair for a day. The BC's are pretend, but the *idea* behind it is VERY real – and it's part of the economics lesson for these third graders this year.... as it's been for all of Amy Wilhelmy's students since 1991. Every class member gets a weekly BC paycheck, and some even take extra jobs in class, to earn more BC's. There are also bankers, and even public relations agents. Rocky River's Education Foundation and a local businessman pitched in to help create actual 'buildings,' where bankers and agents do their work – running accounts, and keeping records. Mrs. Wilhelmy says it doesn't take too much time to learn about economics – and that "any class could do this." And the Kensington kids tell us, the lessons are the type you can use your whole life.

7. Painesville Students Create Lake Paranormal Society, a Ghost-Hunting Business

Two of Mr. Michael Brewer's fifth graders at Hale Road Elementary School are in the business of hunting ghosts. 

Led by Metacom, Massasoit's son (actor Annowon Weeden, Mashpee Wampanoag), the Wampanoag and their Native allies fought back against the English, nearly pushing them into the sea.

In the spring of 1805, Tenskwatawa (actor Billy Merasty, Cree First Nation), a Shawnee, fell into a trance so deep that those around him believed he had died. When he finally stirred, the young prophet claimed to have met the Master of Life. He told those who crowded around that the Indians were in dire straits because they had adopted white culture and rejected traditional spiritual ways. For several years, Tenskwatawa's spiritual revival movement drew thousands of adherents from tribes across the Midwest. His elder brother, Tecumseh (actor Michael Greyeyes, Plains Cree), would harness the energies of that renewal to create an unprecedented military and political confederacy of often antagonistic tribes, all committed to stopping

white westward expansion. The brothers came closer than anyone since to creating an Indian nation that would exist alongside and separate from the United States. The Supreme Court ruling proved no deterrent to President Andrew Jackson's demands that the Cherokee leave their ancestral lands. A complex debate divided the Cherokee Nation, with Chief Ross urging the Cherokee to stay and Major Ridge (actor Wes Studi, Cherokee), a respected tribal leader, urging the tribe to move west and rebuild, going so far as to sign a removal treaty himself without the authority to do so. Though in the end the Cherokees' embrace of "civilization" and their landmark legal victory proved no match for white land hunger and military power, the Cherokee people were able, with characteristic ingenuity, to build a new life in Oklahoma, far from the land that had sustained them for generations.

I should have fought until I was the last man alive." It was an admission of regret from a man whose insistent pursuit of military resistance in the face of overwhelming odds confounded not only his Mexican and American enemies, but many of his fellow Apaches as well. Born around 1820, Geronimo grew into a leading warrior and healer. But after his tribe was relocated to an Arizona reservation in 1872, he became a focus of the fury of terrified white settlers and of the growing tensions that divided Apaches struggling to survive under almost unendurable pressures. To angry whites, Geronimo became the archfiend, perpetrator of unspeakable savage cruelties. To his supporters, he remained the embodiment of proud resistance, the upholder of the old Chiricahua ways. To other Apaches, especially those who had come to see the white man's path as the only viable road, Geronimo was a stubborn troublemaker, unbalanced by his unquenchable thirst for vengeance, whose actions needlessly brought the enemy's wrath down on his own people. At a time when surrender to the reservation and acceptance of the white man's civilization seemed to be the Indians' only realistic options, Geronimo and his tiny band of Chiricahuas fought on. The final holdouts, they became the last Native-American fighting force to capitulate formally to the government of the United States.
