The following report outlines some of the major issues facing the Princeton area and WPRB's programming responses to those issues during the specified quarter.

As has been our modus operandi since the start of the pandemic, WPRB continues to broadcast both from a main studio and from various DJs' homes around the area, and we are continuing to work on bringing everyone together under one roof. Our programming, live or rebroadcast up to 23 hours a day, is entirely human-informed, eclectic, and freeform, combining music, interviews and news-related programming on one frequency. DJs continued to read public service announcements, such as informing listeners when and where to schedule vaccine appointments, or about resources for immigrants and the working class.

In our program *News and Culture*, a bi-weekly news/arts show, we aired a story that spoke to farmers and researchers working to democratize agriculture by producing large quantities of heritage seeds for communities who have historically been denied food sovereignty on March 3 at 5 p.m. We also aired a story about the Trenton Circus Squad, a nonprofit working with school-aged children in Trenton that provides after-school programming in the circus arts and trapeze on March 24 at 5 p.m.

In our program *Symposium*, a longform interview show, we interviewed Heather Howard, a public health policymaker, Obama appointee, and professor of public policy at Princeton on Feb. 24 at 5 p.m., and Pallavi Gogoi, managing editor at NPR, and economic journalist, on March 31 at 5 p.m.
