1. Politics: "One Square Mile Johnston: Why did this Democratic town back Trump? (feature) Jan 31 5:45 AM/7:45 AM or 6:45 AM/8:45 AM

Democrat Hillary Clinton won the state of Rhode Island in November, but then-candidate Donald Trump beat her by 14 points in Johnston. That marks the biggest swing in a Rhode Island community going from Democrat to Republican in the presidential election. Meanwhile the town of Burrillville and the Conservation Law Foundation are suing to stop the project. The power plant remains controversial a year and a half after it was first proposed.
