"I got sober in 2006 and my beautiful wife left me in 2008. I needed something to do besides kill myself or go back to drinking, and I thought about how our military has always been out there protecting freedom of those like me, who took it for granted. I have seven uncles that served--one lost on Okinawa June 17 1945. I decided to support our military ."At first, Ed started to put together care packages for servicemen and women, carefully including a scripture verse with each box of goodies. He soon realized that God had additional plans for Ed. "It was crazy at first. I was obsessed with the care packs and to this day will do anything to get them shipped. While I was going through some serious life issues, God was building a powerful ministry. I am the outreach guy and the chaplain. I'm on call 24/7. We could easily be the top dog in care packs, but our mission is so much more because of God's faithfulness to use even a drunk like me to do His will and His work!" 				<p>In September I sat on a bench in memory of Joshua Thompson in Rock Springs Wyoming with his mom April, and with my prayer box in between us. I said "April, put your prayers in here for God to read." As she did, she also told me about her recent diagnosis of Rheumatoid Arthritis. These people are my family." Ed McClelland is always eager and ready to help veteran meet their basic needs. Whether is Army veteran Michael, who is homeless after losing everything in the Northern California Camp Fire (Ed is helping him to get his truck fixed), or Brandon, an Air Force veteran whose served three combat deployments and can't afford to register his vehicle. It's the little things that can become overwhelming and Ed is the first one to rally to helps solve those problems. The holidays can be especially difficult for military families and Ed makes sure to remember as many people as he can. "We also usually shop for about ten military families for Christmas too." In addition to all that he does, Ed McClelland partners with other ministries and happens to be the chaplain for 22TooMany, an organization to helps families who've lost loved ones to suicide. For young people, in the 'school of hard knocks,' these things might be learned over the years, but with significant stress. Now there's a more practical way. It's called a <i>Financial Reality Fair</i>, offered by many credit unions nationwide. Tena Lozano, executive director of the RMJ Foundation, says the events, "put the students in the role of an adult and we make them make adult decisions just to give them a real-life simulation of what it will be like to be an adult. So, we really focus on the importance of budgeting, wants vs. needs, the perils of credit card debt, and just generally speaking what it's like to live the month of an adult, having to make purchasing decisions." Each student is assigned a persona - including a job, a salary, a spouse, and a child - all available on the special <i>Bite of Reality</i> app. At the Reality Fair, they go from table-to-table to sign-up for housing, kid care, groceries and dining - along with everything else that normally appears in a family's monthly budget. But there are also 'temptations' at the various tables where participants get a taste of 'upselling.' They're encouraged to buy the most expensive thing available, much like all the 'you need this' advertising and sales pitches that really do take place in our instant gratification culture. "And what the kids don't know is we're actually</p>

					setting them up to fail. You learn when you fail, and we want their first experience failing with money to be in our little world instead of out in the real world," shares Lozano. "And then when they do run out of money, the students are sent to the credit union table" where their buying decisions vs. income are analyzed, much like a financial counselor would do. "And they (the counselors) actually do allow our students to make returns...so they can return their car, they can return their house, their food, wherever they feel like they made a bad decision, they can correct that and then, ultimately, they succeed!"

TS Barry	Local News Break	July 10	1:15 pm	68 seconds	<p>Governor John Bel Edwards has declared a state of emergency ahead of potential tropical storm Barry. It'll likely bring storm surge, hurricane force winds and up to 15 inches of rain across Louisiana.</p> <p>Governor Edwards is asking you to check your supplies at home and continue to listen to your radio and TV for weather updates. Right now, he's saying we expect multiple parishes to declare states of emergency, and we stand ready to assist our local partners with all available resources.</p> <p>Starting Friday, between 10 and 15 inches of rain will fall in SE Louisiana in a 24-hour period.</p> <p>The National Guard is moving high-water vehicles into place along the Mississippi River in the SE part of the state and setting up command posts along coastal Louisiana, especially in Plaquemines Parish.</p> <p>The temporary Bayou Chene flood barge is still in place and will assist 5 parishes with water levels and drainage, including Assumption, Iberville, Lower St. Martin, St. Mary and Terrebonne parishes.</p>

				<p>An update on Tropical Storm Barry, which is almost a Category 1 hurricane by tomorrow when it hits the Louisiana coastline.</p> <p>Expect very serious flooding. Some areas could get up to 25 inches of rain. If you're in a low-lying area, you've been ordered to evacuate-including parts of Jefferson Parish. If you live in Jean Lafitte, Lower Lafitte, Barataria, and Crown Point, you need to evacuate immediately if you haven't already done so. Pack an emergency bag and include your medication. A state of emergency has been issued for Plaquemines Parish-the entire East Bank is under a mandatory evacuation. The West Bank has a mandatory evacuation for people that live from Oakville to Venice only. The rest of the West Bank is under voluntary evacuation. The parish government has set up pickup points on both sides of the Mississippi River. From there, school buses will take you to a registration point and then to evacuation centers. Cats and dogs will taken in separate vehicles and if you don't have your own travel crates, the parish will provide them. The town of Grand Isle is calling for a voluntary evacuation. For more information, call Jefferson Parish Emergency Management at 349-5360 and Grand Isle at 985-787-2204. The Lafourche Parish Sheriff's Office says there's a mandatory evacuation for Port Fourchon and other areas south of the Leon Theriot Lock in Golden Meadow. Alcoholic beverages, drugs or drug paraphernalia, weapons or contraband of any kind is not allowed in the shelters. The parish government has set up pickup points on both sides of the Mississippi River with school buses available to get you to those evacuation centers if you need it.
