Public Affairs Related Program Descriptions

The following summarizes a representative sample of programming that provided the most significant treatment of community issues during the past quarter. Programming frequently deals with more than one issue.

Coverage addressing the following issues

- 1. High rate of health and domestic issues in the Ozarks that exceed other parts of the Country
- 2. Interstate 44 passes through the heart of Laclede County and with it comes the issues of being a major drug route and the associated crime and substance abuse that comes with it
- 3. The Missouri Legislature is in session and local Representatives are working through over 1,000 bills that have been introduced that could have an effect on our communities
- 4. Funding for Rural Fire Departments and coping with the lack of man power and equipment is also an issue for City run departments as well
- 5. This is a serious possibility that Fort Leonard Wood in neighboring Pulaski County could lose up to 5.000 paid civilian and military personnel due to proposed budget cuts. The Fort is the 5th largest employer in the State and its economic impact on the Ozarks is very significant. All Counties surrounding the Army Facility would be affected.
- 6. Laclede County is suffering due to bridges and roads not being maintained by Missouri Department of Transportation. MoDot says that the money is not there.
- 7. High School and Adult Education is an on-going effort as the Ozarks has a very high rate for Drop Outs and many who cannot read well enough to get and keep employment.
- 8. Area not for profits reach out to serve but funding is always and issue in accomplishing their goals.
- 9. The Ozarks is well known for it's outdoor activities including hunting and fishing. With that comes the responsibility of maintaining a good environment.
