CONSUMERISM: Topics in this category includes price hikes and tips to consumers.

CBS 2 NEWS AT 5:30 PM: 7/24, Correspondent Michael Pomeranz discussed how analysts believe the cost of gasoline will be reduced significantly during the summer months despite much skepticism by consumer advocates; CBS 2 NEWS AT NOON: 8/15, Correspondent David Diaz discussed how the office of the New York State Attorney General has initiated an investigation against a mortgage broker in Bayshore, Long Island for allegedly charging fees for services that were never contracted; 8/25, Correspondent Michael O'Looney discussed how consumers can save money on prescription drugs by comparison shopping and consulting with representatives of the New York City Department of Consumer Affairs.

CRIME: Topics in this category includes scams and organized crime.

CBS 2 NEWS AT 6:00 PM: 7/18, Correspondent Dana Tyler discussed the arrest of several Brooklyn women for allegedly scamming college students of thousands of dollars through information obtained in their college admission's record; CBS 2 NEWS AT NOON: 7/25, Correspondent Paul Fleuranges discussed how parents in Queens Village, New York are alarmed after a six year-old boy was struck by a stray bullet while sleeping in bed; CBS 2 AT NOON NEWS: 7/27, Correspondent Cindy Hsu discussed how a congressional investigation has found that one in five nursing homes failed to report incidents of abuse; 8/29, Correspondent David Diaz discussed how neighbors in Bronx and Brooklyn, communities transformed abandoned trash-filled lots into gardens as a way to promote their fight against drugs; CBS 2 FIRST NEWS AT 4:00 PM: 9/7, Correspondent Pablo Guzman discussed how some believe that the triple stabbing in the Claremont Village section of the Bronx may have connections to organized crime.

EDUCATION: Topics in this category include educational opportunities and recruitment efforts.

NEWS 2 AT NOON: 8/22, Correspondent Vince Dementri discussed the efforts made by the New York City School Board to recruit qualified teachers prior to the start of the new school year; 8/24, discussed how this year more than 900 colleges and trade schools could be eliminated from the Federal Student Loan Program because of their default student loan record; CBS 2 NEWS AT 6:00 PM: 9/17, Correspondent Hazel Sanchez discussed how New York State Governor George Pataki has proposed a free tuition plan at New York public colleges for the families of the victims of the September 11 World Trade Center attack.

GOVERNMENT AND POLITICS: Topics in this category includes the New York City mayoral race and political reforms.

CBS 2 NEWS THIS MORNING: 7/14, Correspondent Lisa Hill discussed how an American flag was burned outside a United States Naval base on the island of Vieques, after a group of angry protesters heard the Navy's decision to continue naval exercises despite strong opposition; SPECIAL REPORT CBS 2 FIRST NEWS AT 4:00 PM: 8/26-30 "Breakfast With Hillary," Political Corespondent Marcia Kramer and New York Senator Hillary Clinton discussed her years in the white house as the nation's first-lady and her current involvement with social security and Medicare reforms; SUNDAY EDITION: 9/23, Political Correspondent Marcia Kramer, mayoral candidates Fernado Ferrer, Herman Badillo and Mike Bloomberg discussed how their leadership experience and people's support will help them rebuild New York City if elected and the role of Rudolph Gulliani in their administration; 9/30, New Jersey Senator Robert Torricelli discussed how he has assembled support from New Jersey corporations in order to assist New York base companies secure office space in the aftermath of the World Trade Center attack and his vision for a safer America.

HEALTH: Topic in this category include medical achievements.

CBS 2 NEWS AT 5:00 PM: 7/29, "Healthwatch," Health Correspondent Paul Moniz discussed how scientists estimate that for every New Yorker diagnosed with encephalitis or meningitis from west Nile virus, there are over one-hundred milder infections that have gone undetected; 8/13, discussed how a study conducted by the Medical Heart Association has revealed that hormone replacement therapy reduces a woman's risk of strokes and heart disease; 8/16 discussed how researchers at the University of Pittsburgh have discovered that the female hormone estrogen may increase the risk of lung cancer in women; 9/5, Correspondent Lou Young discussed how a vaccine for Lyme disease that protects laboratory animals and eliminates the bacteria from the ticks that spread the illness has prompted researchers to suggest that Lyme disease could be wiped out altogether.

TEENS: Topics in this category includes teenage runaways and fashion trends.

have completed their education and face the difficulties of finding jobs and coping with relationships; 8/27, Correspondent Dana Tyler discussed reactions by teenagers to the new trend in fashion design for youngsters and peer pressure.

TERRORISM: Topics in this category includes the attack on the World Trade Center and its effects on the nation's economy.

FACE THE NATION: 9/16, CBS Special News Correspondents Bryon Pitts, David Martin and New York Senators Charles and Hillary Clinton discussed the rescue and recovery efforts at the World Trade Center after the terrorist attack of September 11; 60 MINUTES II: 9/16, "How Secure Is Your Airport?" Correspondent Steve Kroft discussed a report on the lack of security in United States airports, which critics say enabled nineteen terrorists to hijack four airliners and turn them into weapons of mass destruction; "An American Town" Correspondent Ed Bradley discussed how the terrorist attack on the World Trade Center has impact the residents of Summit, a New Jersey town, many of whose commuters work in or near the twin towers; CBS 2 NEWS SPECIAL REPORT: 9/12, Correspondent Ernie Anastos and Richard Sheirer, Director, New York Office of Emergency Services, discussed plans to organize rescue efforts at the World Trade Center attack site; 9/15, Correspondent Michael Pomranz and Richard Grasso, Chairman of the New York City Stock Exchange, discussed the re-opening of Wall Street in the aftermath of the terrorist attack and interviewed World Trade Center survivor Eileen Hillock about September 11; 48 HOURS: 9/18, "Who Is The Enemy?" Correspondent Erin Moriarty, former CIA officer Milt Bearden, and terrorism expert Steve Emerson discussed the profile of today's terrorists and their motivations.
