Issues

KUUL-FM provides is listeners with programming and public service announcements that address issues of concern to our local community. Among the issues determined to be of most concern to the community during the preceding calendar quarter were:

- Arts and Culture: Research shows that the availability of Arts and Culture—everything from museums to parks and recreation systems—can greatly improve an area's quality of life.
- Business: Creation of new businesses, as well as growth from existing businesses, is vital to the Quad City community in 2012...
- Casino Gambling: A major source of recreation in the Quad Cities, casino gambling is also a large employer. In 2013 the City of Davenport has been considering investing city resources in this industry.
- Children & Family: Raising children has never been easy, but in today's world, a myriad of new issues have come in to play which
 complicate things even further.
- Children-At-Risk: In today's society, so many young people are simply left to grow up on their own that there is an impact on people of all ages
- Crime: Local communities that are particularly experiencing problems are Rock Island, Moline and portions of Davenport. A major contributing factor is the poor economy.
- Domestic Violence: Often unreported and most often affecting women and children, these crimes leave scars that can last generations.
- Economic Development: Greater coordination is needed between economic development efforts for the various communities that
 make up the Quad Cities metropolitan area. The Quad City Development Group is vital to this effort.
- Education: Providing educational opportunities for our area's children—as well as secondary education for our adults—are important building blocks to continued quality of life in our community.
- Health Care Reform: President Obama's health care initiatives have been set into motion with the passage of the health care bill.
 The bill's impact will be felt for years to come.
- Health: Recruiting doctors, nurses, and health techs has become more difficult as this need is everywhere in our country and, as a
 result these persons are living where quality of life is best.
- Juvenile Diabetes: Breakthroughs are occurring in many areas of children's health—none so dramatically as juvenile diabetes.
 Research today is making it possible for a healthier tomorrow for thousands more children.
- Mental Illness: Modern-day life stresses and a variety of contributing factors may make this the most stressful era in history.
 Americans treat these stresses in a lot of different ways.
- Public Health: Includes issues concerning the diagnoses of mental and physical problems, the ethics of healthcare and concerns
 over ever-increasing consumer health costs.
- Tourism: Many cities in the Quad Cities two-state area rely on tourism revenues. The rich history of the region is a big reason people like to visit.
- Veterans Services: Those serving in wars overseas and those who have served—and their families—often find themselves dealing
 with a unique set of issues, for which there is not always government assistance.
