Issues

KUUL-FM provides is listeners with programming and public service announcements that address issues of concern to our local community. Among the issues determined to be of most concern to the community during the preceding calendar quarter were:

- Bullying: A nationwide effort to eliminate bullying includes behavior by students in schools as well as on the internet.
- Education: Providing educational opportunities for our area's children—as well as secondary education for our adults—are
 important building blocks to continued quality of life in our community.
- Environment: Our natural resources need to be protected for future generations; the price we pay for the "technology now" style of living we currently enjoy has ramifications—both now and for our descendants.
- Health: Recruiting doctors, nurses, and health techs has become more difficult as this need is everywhere in our country and, as a result these persons are living where quality of life is best.
- Local Politics: As 2012 was a Presidential election year, the Midwest—and particularly lowa with the 'first-in-the-nation'
 caucus—has been a second home for the biggest names in Republican politics, and there has been no less interest in local
 races.
- Mental Health As cutbacks have occurred in our federal spending; perhaps no area has been harder hit than the funding of mental illness programs.
- Psychology: In today's world the study of psychology is leading to breakthroughs in the area of mental health.
- Tourism: Many cities in the Quad Cities two-state area rely on tourism revenues. The rich history of the region is a big reason people like to visit.
- Hurricane Sandy: This horrific storm swept over the east coast of the United States in late 2012, leaving hundreds of thousands homeless and without resources to rebuild.
