### Issues

KUUL-FM provides is listeners with programming and public service announcements that address issues of concern to our local community. Among the issues determined to be of most concern to the community during the preceding calendar quarter were:

- Activism: More and more consumers are working with others to have their voices heard. Social media is often the tool that sparks the movement.
- Arts and Entertainment: Research shows that the availability of Arts and Entertainment—everything from museums to parks
  and recreation systems—can greatly improve an area's quality of life
- Economic Growth: As more signs are evident that the economy is on the rebound, businesses in the Quad Cities are doing all
  they can to attract new customers.
- Education: Providing educational opportunities for our area's children—as well as secondary education for our adults—are
  important building blocks to continued quality of life in our community.

- Internet Security/Technology: As the internet has increasingly become the backbone of our financial system, preventing the
  theft of identities and resources is a major issue in our society.

- Mental Health: Modern-day life stresses and a variety of contributing factors may make this the most stressful era in history.
   Americans treat these stresses in a lot of different ways.
