Programs

WLNY-TV 10/55 9PM NEWS - hosted by Dick Brennan. Monday – Friday, 9 p.m. – 10 p.m.

Public Service Announcements - WLNY-TV 55 is airing and sponsoring PSAs. PSAs in rotation stem from various organizations that include topics such as, Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure, Tunnel to Towers Run, JDRF One Walk,

Health: Topics in this category include: Heat Illnesses and Measles Exposure.

WLNY 10/55 NEWS AT 9PM: 7/12 Dr. Max Gomez reports about a measles exposure in New York and New Jersey. The Rockland County Health Community says the exposure occurred at the Auction Mart on Rte. 39 in Monsey. Anyone who visited the store may be at risk. 7/19 CBS2's Cindy Hsu reports that heat stroke is a serious concern during the summer. 8/1 WLNY's Max Gomez reports on a rare robotic surgery to repair damage from scoliosis 8/5 WLNY's Max Gomez reports on the new link found between Heart Medication and Allergies and how you can treat the side effects. 8/13 WLNY's Max Gomez reports on a super fish oil that helps prevent strokes and heart attacks. 8/19 WLNY's Reena Roy reports on the increasing amount of vaping related illnesses causing concerns around the country and forcing many officials to look into a way to protect its constituents.

Government and Politics: Topics in this category include: Subway and Homelessness

CBSN New York: 7/24 CBS2's Marcia Kramer reports about the growing problem with homelessness on the subway. The MTA has created a task force to reduce the number of homelessness underground. 9/2 WLNY's Carolyn Gusoff reports on the move from Suffolk County officials to expend the red light camera program an additional 5 years. Some residents feel it has kept streets safer while others feel it is just a revenue maker for the county. 9/10 CBS2's Marcia Kramer reports that tens of thousands of New York City homeowners get a tree reprieve from Mayor De Blasio. They will no longer have to foot the bill for sidewalk repairs if the cracks are caused by a city tree. 9/26 WLNY's Jennifer McLogan reports on a new program called the Opioid Job Program which will place former opioid abusers who are in remission in jobs that will not discriminate and will in fact be understanding of their previous history.

Education: Topics in this category include: Westchester School safety and a follow-up on our year long series on the Hempstead School District.

WLNY 10/55 NEWS AT 9PM: 8/1 Hempstead School Bills pending in Gov. Office. Carolyn Gusoff reports on a follow-up on the on-going issues in the Hempstead school district. The bills that would allow a monitor to be assigned to the school districts remains unsigned on the Gov's desk. We demanded answers of Gov. Cuomo office to find out why. 9/18 Dick Brennan reports about Westchester school safety. A new school safety report shows the best ways of keeping Westchester children and teacher safe. Dozens of recommendations were made including: the development of school threat assessment teams consisting of administrators, counselors, and police officers to help identify students in mental distress, adding a police officer point of contact for each of the county's 400+ schools, and special crisis response training for school resource officers and staff to prepare them for possible shooting situations.

Crime: Topics in this category include: A new hate crime office

WLNY 10/55 NEWS AT 9PM: 9/3 Dick Brennan reports about a new NYC hate crime office. With hate crimes on the rise, New York City has created a new office to try and deal with them. Deborah Lauter is the new Executive Director of the Office for Prevention of Hate Crimes (OPHC). The agenda for the new office includes putting together an inter-agency committee made up of the NYPD, City Commission on Human Rights, Department of Education, Mayor's Office of Immigrant Affairs and Department of Health and Mental Hygiene. 9/27 WLNY's Meg Baker reports on a 9/11 Plaque that has been stolen from the middle of town 2 weeks after the 18th anniversary of 9/11 ceremonies.
