THE REAL ESTATE MARKETING COMPANY ZILLOW SAYS THE MONTHLY MORTAGE ON A TYPICAL HOME IS NEARLY DOUBLE THAN IT WAS IN JANUARY OF 2020...NOW AROUND \$2,200. Rachel DiMatteo Realtor "So, you really have to be strategic in, in buying. So you, you know, as opposed to four years ago, maybe even 10 years ago, you can buy your first home and it's, it's a lot easier and so today it's a lot harder, especially, you know, with the wages kind of just creeping up but not to exactly where they need to be." MORTAGE RATES HAVE FLUCTUATED SINCE 2020...NOW AROUND 6.9 PERCENT FOR A 30-YEAR-FIXED....THAT'S A TWO MONTH HIGH SAYS FREDDIE MAC. -- MEANWHILE, HOME VALUES HAVE RISEN ABOUT 42 PERCENT IN THAT TIME. AND ZILLOW SAYS HOUSEHOLD EARNINGS HAVE NOT KEPT UP WITH THE INCREASING COST OF GETTING A HOME. THE COMPANY SAYS YOU NEED AN INCOME OF AROUND \$106,500 TO AFFORD THE MORTGAGE ON A TYPICAL HOME. SO, HOW ARE FIRST TIME HOME BUYERS DOING IT? ZILLOW SAYS HALF OF FIRST TIME HOME BUYERS SAY THEY GOT AT LEAST PART OF THEIR DOWN PAYMENT AS A GIFT OR A LOAN FROM FAMILY OR FRIENDS. Rachel DiMatteo-Realtor: "So, you know, you don't have to, especially as a first-time home buyer, you don't have to have 20% down. But you have to, you can have anywhere between 2 to 5% down. Rachel DiMatteo -Realtor: "Another thing you can do is ask help, ask the seller for help. So, you can say, hey, I'm interested in this home and here's my offer and also here's we'd like to ask for some concessions to help for the down payment on the home." IT ALSO DEPENDS ON WHERE YOU LIVE. LOOKING FOR A GOOD DEAL? PLACES LIKE PITTSBURGH, CLEVELAND AND MEMPHIS REQUIRE LESS THAN 6 FIGURE INCOMES TO COMFORTABLE AFFORD A HOME. THE FEDERAL RESERVE BEGINS ITS TWO-DAY POLICY MEETING TODAY. WHILE WE'RE NOT EXPECTING THE FED TO REDUCE ITS KEY INTEREST RATE --- IT'S SET TO RELEASE NEW FORECASTS FOR THE ECONOMY, INFLATION, AND INTEREST RATES. THE MEETING COMES ON THE HEELS OF CAPITOL HILL TESTIMONY- FROM THE FED CHAIR JEROME POWELL LESS THAN TWO WEEKS AGO. THERE HE TOLD LAWAMAKERS- THE POLICY RATE HAS LIKELY PEAKED... AND CUTS ARE EXPECTED TO BEGIN AT SOME POINT THIS YEAR. THE FUTURE OF INTEREST RATES. THE INTEREST RATE PERHAPS ON YOUR CREDIT CARD WILL BE IMPACTED BY A BIG FEDERAL RESERVE MEETING THAT BEGINS TODAY. THE TWO-DAY MEETING WILL CONCLUDE WEDNESDAY WHERE FEDERAL RESERVE CHAIRMAN JEROME POWELL WILL ANNOUNCE WHETHER THE FEDERAL RESERVE HAS DECIDED TO CUT INTEREST RATES OR KEEP THEM THE SAME. THERE IS NO EXPECTATION OF AN INTEREST RATE HIKE. THIS TIME. ECONOMISTS ON WALL STREET ARE PREDICTING NO CHANGE IN INTEREST RATES. THAT'S BECAUSE CORE INFLATION DATA FROM JANUARY AND FEBRUARY STILL HAD INFLATION RUNNING A BIT HOTTER THAN THE FED WOULD TYPICALLY LIKE. REMEMBER THE GOAL OF THE FEDERAL RESERVE IS INFLATION TO BE AROUND 2% YEAR OVER YEAR AND THE ECONOMY IS NOT QUITE THERE YET. THE FEDERAL RESERVE RAISED INTEREST RATES INITIALLY TO COMBAT AND BRING DOWN INFLATION. ONE THING TO WATCH THIS

WEEK, WHAT DOES THE FEDERAL RESERVE SAY ABOUT THEIR FUTURE PLANS FOR CUTTING INTEREST RATES PREVIOUSLY? THEY SAID MULTIPLE CUTS SHOULD BE EXPECTED BY THE END OF THIS YEAR. IS THIS STILL CASE? IS THERE ANY TROUBLE SPOTS IN THE AMERICAN ECONOMY? AGAIN? WE'LL LEARN MORE. WEDNESDAY. THE AVERAGE 30-YEAR MORTGAGE RATE IS HOVERING AROUND 7.4% IN THIS COUNTRY, SIGNIFICANTLY HIGHER THAN 3%. 4% INTEREST RATES FROM A FEW YEARS BACK. FURTHER, IT IS NOT HIS PLACE (NOR WAS IT ANY ADMINISTRATOR'S) TO CONDUCT AN IN-DEPTH INVESTIGATION INTO THIS MATTER. John Howe, attorney – "Oh it was his duty to investigate." ELECTRORECEPTION IS KNOWN AS THE ABILITY TO SENSE ELECTRIC CURRENTS IN WATER, AND DOLPHINS COULD BE USING IT TO AVOID PREDATORS, FIND FOOD, NAVIGATE, OR EVEN COMMUNICATE WITH ONE ANOTHER. "Ready, so let's put these in the water." (DOLPHINS BEING TESTED) ONE SENSORY ABILITY WE ALREADY KNEW DOLPHINS HAD IS ECHO-LOCATION...THE ABILITY TO SEE USING SOUND. (FOOTAGE OF NICK THE DOLPHIN GETTING HIS EYE CUPS PUT ON FOR A TEST) "They emit sound, it bounces off of objects in their environment, and after that sound bounces off an object it returns to the animals in their lower jaw and inner ear." IN THIS TEST, KELLY, AND HER TRAINERS SHOW US THAT WHEN HIS ABILITY TO SEE IS TAKEN AWAY...NICK THE DOLPHIN...CAN SWIM ACROSS THE POOL...AND AS KELLY AND I HOLD THREE DIFFERENT OBJECTS...NICK IS ABLE TO CORRECTLY IDENTIFY THE OBJECT HIS TRAINER WANTED HIM TO. (DOLPHIN DOING THE TEST) "So now a red boat, so he's moving his head back and forth, he picked the right one, good job buddy." KELLY AND I SHUFFLED THE TOYS, THE TRAINER IDENTIFIED DIFFERENT ONES FOR HIM TO CHOOSE... (DOLPHIN DOING THE TEST) "See if we can get it right, and a superstar, great job." AND HE KEPT ACING THE EXERCISE. I ASKED KELLY THAT IF DURING HER CAREER SHE CAN POINT TO ANYTHING SHE'S OBSERVED THAT MIGHT EXPLAIN DOLPHINS USING ELECTRO RECEPTION. SHE POINTED TO DOLPHINS IN HER CARE WITH HEARING IMPAIRMENTS LIKE THIS ROUGH TOOTH DOLPHIN NAMED RUDY...AND WONDERS IF MAYBE THIS PROVIDES AN EXPLANATION FOR WHAT HE CAN STILL DO... "We have had situations pool side where we will provide a stimulus, a tap on the water, tap on wall, movement of gate system, toy in environment, an animal that can't hear definitely responds, could this be a part of it, potentially." WE DID THE SAME DRILL WITH RUDY, AND WHILE RUDY CAN SEE THE TOY HE NEEDS TO IDENTIFY, BECAUSE HE'S DEAF, THE ONLY WAY THE TRAINER CAN COMMUNICATE WITH HIM FROM ACROSS THE POOL...IS BY SQUIRTING WATER, SOMETHING HE IMMEDIATELY RESPONDS TO. (DOLPHIN DOING TESTING) "Ahhh nice job, good job buddy." SEVERAL DOLPHIN RESEARCH PROJECTS ARE ONGOING AT C-M-A – KELLY SAYS. "it really feels like we haven't even scratched the surface." "Stop appreciate from afar and know there is still a lot to learn about these amazing animals, and we are in the beginning stages of what we can do and how we can help each other."

SHANON GANN/ BREVARD ZOO SEA TURTLE PROGRAM - "When it expresses itself it's like cauliflower sized warts and it can be everywhere on their bodies." THEY CAN GET VERY LARGE AND START TO MAKE LIFE DIFFICULT. SHANON GANN/ BREVARD ZOO SEA TURTLE PROGRAM - "It can slow them down if they are on their flippers. They can have large tumors on flippers, rear flippers. It can maybe slow them down to avoid predation or a boat strike." THE ZOO NOW HAS A NEW TOOL TO HELP REMOVE THESE TUMORS. SHANON GANN/ BREVARD ZOO SEA TURTLE PROGRAM - "A novel approach, only a few facilities are doing this. Is called electrochemotherapy." THAT BECAUSE THE VIRUS CAN SPREAD THROUGH WATER. IT'S STILL NOT KNOWN HOW THE VIRUS IS PASSED ON. AMY - "Just already here it goes, so it begins...Lake Okeechobee." THE THUNDEROUS SOUND OF BILLIONS OF GALLONS OF WATER COURSING THROUGH THE ST. "Unexpectedly as we were looking for toads we happened to run into this creepy looking--looks like a leach almost worm and realized it was an invasive species." SHE DID HER RESEARCH AND LEARNED SHE WAS UP AGAINST A TOXIC THREAT. THE FLATWORM COATED WITH A TOXIN- BUT THE BIGGEST DANGER SHE SAYS- IS THE RAT LUNGWORM PARASITE THEY CARRY THAT CAN KILL ANIMALS- AND CAUSE A FORM OF MENINGITIS IN HUMANS. "We have seen so many of them. Like scary numbers. It's something for me of major concern." THE NEW GUINEA FLATWORM MADE ITS WAY INTO THE US THROUGH SOUTH FLORIDA-IN 2012. AND IS NOW IN A MAJORITY OF FLORIDA COUNTIES- PREYING ON SNAILS, SLUGS, AND EARTHWORMS ESSENTIAL TO OUR NATIVE ECOSYTEM. "Look for the shiny black." WITH HER TRAINED EYE- THEY'RE NOT TOO HARD TO SPOT. OUR LIGHTS REFLECT RIGHT OFF OF THEIR BLACK SLIMY AND TOXIC SKIN. "A lot of times they'll hang out in the middle of these." BUT EVEN ONCE YOU FIND THEM- HERE'S THE PROBLEM AND WHY THEY'RE CONSIDERED ONE OF THE WORST INVASIVE SPECIES IN THE WORLD. "They're very hard to kill. There are very few things that actually kill them." POURING BOILING WATER ON THEM FOR NOW IS THE BEST WAY TO KNOW THEY'RE DEAD. EVEN IF YOU CUT THEM INTO A DOZEN PIECES- THEY'LL JUST GROW INTO A DOZEN NEW WORMS. HERE'S ANOTHER LITTLE DETAIL YOU MIGHT FIND UNSETTLING. JEANNINE SAYS TYPICALLY WHEN SHE'S LOOKING FOR THESE WORMS SHE'LL FIND AS MANY AS 50 TO EVEN 60 IN AN AREA NO BIGGER THAN THIS FLOORMAT. "I mean I've been on properties where we've killed probably 60 worms in a matter of 10 minutes." "I just went to see a client who has a major infestation in Orlando. I'm getting calls from all over the place. "SHE ALSO WORRIES ABOUT THE WORMS SLITHERING OVER GARDENS WHERE PEOPLE EAT, AND PLAYSETS WHERE CHILDREN SPEND TIME. SO, SHE KILLS WHAT SHE CAN- UNTIL THERE'S A BETTER PLAN OF ATTACK." I know just when people start realizing how thick they are here and how dangerous they can be what it does with our environment something has got to be done."

SHERIFF WILLIAM SNYDER/MARTIN COUNTY "To shoot a coyote in a residential neighborhood risks several things. Injury to an uninvolved person in the neighborhood. You also risk a civil liability and criminal liability for discharging a firearm in a residential neighborhood." WE ALSO SPOKE WITH BUSCH WILDLIFE SANCTUARY WHO TELL US THAT HUMANS OFTEN MAKE IT EASIER FOR COYOTES TO ADAPT TO A MORE URBAN ENVIRONMENT BY LEAVING GARBAGE CANS UNSECURED AND BIRD FEEDERS OUT. COYOTES ARE MOST ACTIVE AT DAWN AND DUSK, AND IF YOU DO FIND YOURSELF FACE TO FACE WITH ONE, YOU CAN MAKE A LOUD NOISE TO SCARE IT OFF.

THE FLORIDA OCEANOGRAPHIC SOCIETY AND EVERGLADES FOUNDATION GROUPS TELL US THAT THEY'VE BEEN IN CONTACT WITH THE ARMY CORP ABOUT THE POSSIBILITY OF WATER DISCHARGES INTO THE ST. LUCIE ESTUARY. WE CALLED THE ARMY CORPS AND THEY COULDN'T COMMENT TODAY - BUT TOLD US AN ANNOUNCEMENT WILL BE COMING TOMORROW. HOWEVER, THEY DID CONFIRM THAT THEY HAVE BEEN CONSIDERING RELEASES. MARK PERRY WITH THE FLORIDA OCEANOGRAPHIC SOCIETY SAYS ALTHOUGH THERE CURRENTLY ISN'T ANY ALGAE BLOOMS IN LAKE OKEECHOBEE THESE RELEASES CAN STILL BE DETRIMENTAL TO THE ENVIRONMENT... MARK PERRY/EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR & CEO - FLORIDA OCEANOGRAPHIC SOCIETY - "Any kind of water release to the estuaries right now particularly going into the spawning season in March for Oysters and Seagrass growing season and so forth is not good because you put too much artificial fresh water into the brackish water estuaries, and it really affects those habitats." HE'S ALSO CONCERNED THAT AN ALGAE BLOOM COULD COINCIDE WITH THEIR RELEASE SCHEDULE. CONGRESSMAN BRIAN MAST WROTE A LETTER TO THE ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS URGING MORE TRANSPARENCY ABOUT THE BENEFITS OF SPENDING ONE POINT FIVE BILLION DOLLARS TO STRENGTHEN THE HERBERT HOOVER DIKE AROUND LAKE OKEECHOBEE. RUSSELL SINGSON/STUART DIVER - "I would just hope that the water gets cleaner and bluer, and we can see more. I mean this place is an amazing place. It's just the water is not really good right now." JIM DIRKS -"I think the fine was miniscule. There have been other people who have done less harm and were fined a lot more than sandpiper bay." THEN SHE WAS PRESENTED THE OPTION OF RECOVERING AT HOME. SHE SAID... OKAY. JANET SAVARESE - "In a hospital, they're constantly waking you up. You never sleep right. You're not in your own bed, not in your own bathroom." DR. RICHARD ROTHMAN - "The way we deliver care today, is going to look much different tomorrow." Dr. Richard Rothman is chief of medical operations for Cleveland Clinic in Florida. He says a team evaluates whether a patient is eligible to participate in the new "Care at Home" program. ROTHMAN – "Hospital Care at home allows us to provide care beyond physical footprint, also opens a bed for our sickest patient." JANET IS ONE OF THE FIRST PATIENTS TO USE THE "CARE AT HOME" PROGRAM THROUGH CLEVELAND CLINIC TRADITION HOSPITAL. IT BEGAN A FEW MONTHS AGO AT CLEVELAND'S CLINIC INDIAN RIVER HOSPITAL, AND IT WILL EXPAND IN THE COMING WEEKS TO CLEVELAND CLINIC'S MARTIN COUNTY HOSPITALS. SAVERESE WAS BROUGHT HOME BY PARAMEDICS AND THEN A TEAM SET UP HER HOME WITH THE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT, AND THE MEDICINES SHE WOULD NEED. JANET SAVARESE - "They put up an iPad with someone 24/7. All I had to do was touch it and there was either a nurse or a doctor there." DR. RICHARD ROTHMAN -"Nurses are able to respond in less than 30 seconds." DR. ROTHMAN SAYS READMISSION RATES ARE LOWER, HOSPITAL INFECTIONS HAVE BEEN ZERO SO FAR, AND AN UNEXPECTED POSITIVE HAS COME WITH REGARDS TO NURSING AND STAFF RECRUITMENT, AS EMPLOYEES WORK SPECIFICALLY WITH "CARE AT HOME" PATIENTS. DR. RICHARD ROTHMAN - "Avoid the physical detriment of working within hospital and really focus on

interacting with patients without physical burden, so we're seeing number of applicants outpace number of positions we have available." Reporter - "What feedback would you give me for hospital care at home? JANET SAVARESE "I thought it was amazing." SAVARESE SAYS NOTHING IS GOOD ABOUT GETTING SICK... BUT THAT A HOME STAY IS BETTER THAN A HOSPITAL STAY.

RIVIERA BEACH UTILITIES DIRECTOR MICHAEL LOW SAYS EVEN THOUGH WELL WATER WAS CONTAMINATED, IT WAS FILTERED AT THE TREATMENT PLANT, AND MADE CLEAN, SAFE AND DRINKABLE WHEN IT REACHES PEOPLE'S HOMES. ACCORDING TO THE ECONOMIC POLICY INSTITUTE, AS OF 20-22, THERE ARE ROUGHLY 2.4 MILLION FARMWORKERS IN THE U.S. AND AS HEAT WAVES CONTINUE TO GROW IN FREQUENCY AND INTENSITY, MANY OF THESE WORKERS ARE FINDING THEMSELVES FACE TO FACE WITH INCREASINGLY DIRE WORKING CONDITIONS. DOMINIQUE O'CONNOR - "It's not enough to just say that like, farm workers like, need to drink more water, you know, and to take more breaks because, like, that's not easy. Like in practice." DOMINIQUE O'CONNOR IS THE CLIMATE JUSTICE ORGANIZER FOR THE [FARMWORKER ASSOCIATION OF FLORIDA](https://floridafarmworkers.org/). SHE SAYS MANY PEOPLE HAVE NO CLUE JUST HOW DIFFICULT IT CAN BE WORKING FOR LONG HOURS OUT IN THE SUN, WITH LIMITED ACCESS TO SHADE, BREAKS AND AT TIMES WATER. ACCORDING TO THE [ENVIRONMENTAL DEFENSE FUND](https://www.edf.org/report/heat-stress-threatens-agricultural-workers-health-us-temperatures-rise), "MORTALITY FROM HEAT-RELATED ILLNESS IS 20 TIMES HIGHER FOR CROP WORKERS IN THE U.S. THAN PRIVATE

NDUSTRY AND NON-FEDERAL GOVERNMENT WORKERS." IN ADDITION, THE AVERAGE U.S. AGRICULTURAL WORKER IS EXPOSED TO "21 WORKING DAYS IN THE SUMMER GROWING SEASON THAT ARE UNSAFE DUE TO HEAT." DOMINIQUE O'CONNOR - "Farmworkers usually know how to take care of themselves. The problem is, is that they're not able to." CURRENTLY, THERE IS NO FEDERAL STANDARD THAT PROTECTS WORKERS FROM EXTREME HEAT. DOMINIQUE O'CONNOR - "There is so much that people don't know about the agricultural industry and the agricultural supply chain, which is fraught with injustices and inequities and, even cases of forced labor." MIKE RIOS HELPS TO OVERSEE THE FAIR FOOD PROGRAM, A PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN FARMERS, FARMWORKERS AND FOOD COMPANIES THAT IS GEARED TOWARD IMPROVING WORKING CONDITIONS FOR FARMWORKERS. IN RECENT YEARS, THE PROGRAM HAS ESTABLISHED A SET OF HEAT STRESS STANDARDS WITH ITS PARTICIPATING FARMERS: INCLUDING PROVIDING FARMWORKERS WITH SHADE, WATER, REGULAR REST BREAKS, TRAINING ON HEAT STRESS SYMPTOMS, MEDICAL TREATMENT AND THE ABILITY FOR WORKERS TO STOP IF THEY FEEL ILL. MIKE RIOS - "The fact that a worker can, without fear of retaliation, that's the key right there, without fear of retaliation, has the ability to set themselves aside, rest, take shade, drink water for however long they need is an incredible step in worker protection." WHILE RIOS SAYS THE PROGRAM HAS BEEN APPLAUDED BY THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE, IT'S THE FEEDBACK FROM THE FARMWORKERS THAT HAS BEEN MOST MEANINGFUL. MIKE RIOS - "More than we can try to count of people that have expressed the huge difference between working on a fair food program farm than working at a non-fair food program farm." ULTIMATELY, THE FUTURE OF OUR CLIMATE REMAINS UNCERTAIN, BUT RIOS SAYS THE WELLBEING OF FARMWORKERS DOESN'T HAVE TO BE MEG HILLING, SCRIPPS NEWS.

It tells some very important stories. "DR. CATHERINE LOWE/OPHTHALMOLOGIST -"This is an interesting picture I think we got that picture from the Black Historical Society. They had a lot of documented photographs, swimming at Singer Island circa 1925. That was almost one hundred years ago. Singer Island was the first local beach for blacks here in Palm Beach County." INSPIRING HER YOUNG PATIENTS. DR. CATHERINE LOWE/OPHTHALMOLOGIST - "It really does inspire them, especially it's healing for them. So often children have a lot of things going on, they have a lot of stress now, and it's almost perform, perform, perform. And I tell them you all are so talented; you are so knowledgeable." DR. CATHERINE LOWE/OPHTHALMOLOGIST - "The piece 'I voted' is extremely important was done by Dr. Arthur Bacon he was from West Palm Beach, a WPB native, a professor who taught biology and has done so much research and lectured all around the world." DR. CATHERINE LOWE/OPHTHALMOLOGIST - "This artist is Mary Anne Carroll and the Florida Highwaymen as far as I am concerned they started a movement of art here in South Florida. It's a picture and sometimes we see parts of it and sometimes we don't see the other parts of it." CARON BOWMAN HAS SEVERAL PAINTINGS HERE. CARON BOWMAN/ARTIST - "This is one of your pieces. Yes, it is. It's called soul sisters. It was inspired by the unity of African people, especially among women. And how the sun is rising, and these women are holding hands with African masks." HER WORKS OF ART GO BEYOND A CANVAS... YOU CAN SEE HER MURALS IN DOWNTOWN WEST PALM BEACH. CARON BOWMAN/ARTIST - "The mural talked about artists who basically created music talking about social justice and change in America." CARON BOWMAN/ARTIST - "We did a wonderful life with Louie Armstrong. Louie Armstrong played at the Sunset Lounge in 1944. The Sunset was the crowning jewel of the northwest community of our city. Some of the great virtuosos of the 20th century music came to the Sunset. CREECH AS THEY LOVINGLY REMEMBER HER.

LAVOISE TAYLOR SMITH, BELLE GLADE - "she had a personal interest in us as little girls to make sure that we had experiences like all other little girls had, and therefore she created the doll." CARDONA says: "To say that this morning was probably one of the most impactful experiences of my life is an understatement." U-S SECRETARY OF EDUCATION MIGUEL CARDONA REACTED TO TOURING THE CAMPUS AT MARJORY STONEMAN DOUGLAS HIGH SCHOOL IN FLORIDA, WHERE A SHOOTER KILLED 17 PEOPLE BACK IN 20-18.

AND SOME OF THIS MAY SOON BE STATE LAW AS WELL. WITH THE ADDITION OF METAL DETECTORS MAKING THEIR WAY TO ALL HIGH SCHOOL CAMPUSES IN PALM BEACH COUNTY... SCHOOL LEADERS ARE PUTTING THE RULES FOR USING THEM INTO POLICY ON PAPER... AS WELL AS OTHER SECURITY BEST PRACTICES LIKE HAVING A DESIGNATED SAFE SPACE MARKED OFF IN EACH CLASSROOM. AT THE SAME TIME- A NEW SCHOOL SAFETY BILL JUST PASSED THE FLORIDA SENATE AS THE LEGISLATIVE SESSION WRAPS UP. THE NEW LAW WOULD MANDATE CLASSROOM DOORS BE LOCKED... WHICH IS ALREADY REQUIRED IN PALM BEACH COUNTY... AND ALSO REQUIRES THOSE SAFE SPACES MARKED OFF IN EVERY CLASSROOM. STUDENTS MUST BE TOLD ABOUT THAT AREA WITHIN THE FIRST 10 DAYS OF THE SCHOOL YEAR. STUDENTS AND TEACHERS WILL BE ABLE TO SPEAK FREELY ABOUT SEXUAL ORIENTATION AND GENDER IDENTITY IN FLORIDA CLASSROOMS - AS LONG AS IT'S NOT PART OF INSTRUCTION. A SETTLEMENT WAS REACHED TODAY BETWEEN FLORIDA EDUCATION OFFICIALS AND CIVIL RIGHTS ATTORNEYS WHO HAD CHALLENGED A STATE LAW WHICH CRITICS DUBBED "DON'T SAY GAY." THE SETTLEMENT CLARIFIES WHAT IS ALLOWED IN FLORIDA CLASSROOMS FOLLOWING PASSAGE TWO YEARS AGO OF THE LAW PROHIBITING INSTRUCTION ON SEXUAL ORIENTATION AND GENDER IDENTITY IN EARLY GRADES. UNDER THE TERMS OF THE SETTLEMENT, THE FLORIDA BOARD OF EDUCATION WILL SEND INSTRUCTIONS TO EVERY SCHOOL DISTRICT.
