Warner described the three main programs: clinical and rehabilitation services, conservation education, and a citizen scientist program called *Audubon Eagle Watch*. There are over 18 different species of raptors -- eagles, hawks, and owls -- housed at the Birds of Prey Center. The upcoming *Baby Owl Shower* is an event at which people can learn about these programs. (May is the height of baby bird season, so there will be lots of baby birds for people to view.) Admission to the event is free but visitors are asked to donate items that the

Center needs such as gauze and alcohol.
